QUESTIONS OF GREAT IMPORTANCE TO COME UP

Meeting in Vestry of Brunswick Street Baptist Church
—Elections of Officers
for Next Year.

The New Brunswick Temperance Alliance will hold its annual convention in the vestry of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church tomorrow. The executive of the Association will meet in the morning at ten o'clock to prepare the annual report. Following this meeting the regular business will be transacted. The election of officers and appointments of committees will occupy the attention of the meeting for a considerable time.

Mr. Donald Fraser, President of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance will occupy the chair. Rev. F. E. Boothroyd Organizer for this Province and Rev. W. D. Wilson Liquor Inspector for the province will also be in attendance as well as Rev. C. Flemington of Andover, the Secretary. In the afternoon a meeting will be held from 2.30 to 5 o'clock to be followed by an intermission for luncheon after which the evening meeting will open at 7 p. m.

The meetings will be open to the public and as the business to be discussed is very important it is expected that a large attendance of members as well as others will be present.

Among the many subjects to be discussed are "The Prohibition Aspect", "The Temperance Situation, mainly in New Brunswick, but also in the Dominion," and the "Referendum on Prohibition."

The meetings of the Alliance were to be held at the Y. M. C. A. building on York Street but the place of meeting had to be changed.

Large Congregation

A particularly large congregation attended the Sunday night service at the Fredericton Methodist church. The service took an unusual form, lantern views of scenes from the life of Christ being shown with remarks by the pastor, Rev. G. M. Young. The choir sang from the old choir-loft at the front of the church which has not been used for that purpose since the installation of the pipe organ upwards of thirty years ago.

EAT B. C. FRUIT AND EXPORT OUR OWN APPLES

CURIOUS SITUATION IN THIS PROVINCE

Commission Men and Retailers
Prefer Pacific Coast Fruit,
While Montreal Clamors
for N. B. Product.

The fact that New Brunswick apples are commanding a top price on the Montreal market with the supply of first class fruit insufficient to meet the demand draws attention to the fact that the bulk of fruit of this kind retailed in New Brunswick is grown on the Pacific Coast either in British Columbia or in the United States. This modern version of carrying coals to Newcastle is rather difficult to account for but those in touch with the fruit business say that it is the result of prejudice on the part of commission men and other dealers against a fair market price for New Brunswick-grown fruit although the same persons are willing to pay a much higher price for Pacific Coast products.

Not Unique Situation

Experts say that the situation in this province is not unique as far as food products are concerned and instance the fact that Canadian food-stuffs in many lines sell for lower prices in England than they do in this country.

High Price for B. C. Stock

Last week wholesalers in St. John were paying \$4.50 per box for British Columbia apples of the Macintosh Red variety. This is at the rate of \$13.50 per barrel. The same apple grown in New Brunswick was being sold at the same time for \$12 per barrel on the Montreal market. It is said that \$7 per barrel is the price for which New Brunswick-grown fruit of this kind can be purchased by the wholesalers but they refuse to pay that price.

Advertising Did It

The fact that Pacific Coast fruit can be shipped into an apple-producing country on the Atlantic Coast in competition with the local fruit is said to be due to organization on the part of the growers and advertising on a huge scale. The bright-colored lithographs on the neatly packed boxes seem to aid the selling of the fruit.

Not Greatly Interested

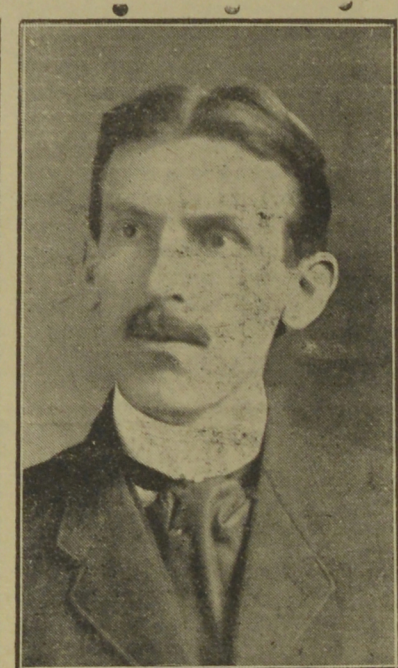

It was announced this morning by the local office of the Victory Loan Campaign that the County had exceeded its allotment and was now in the

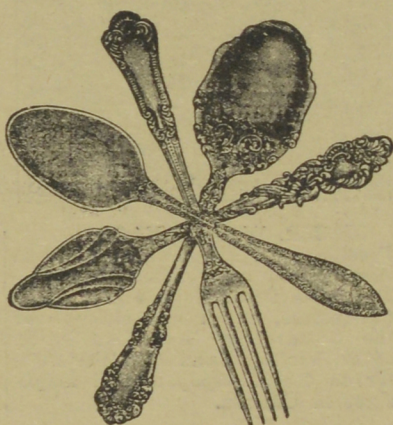

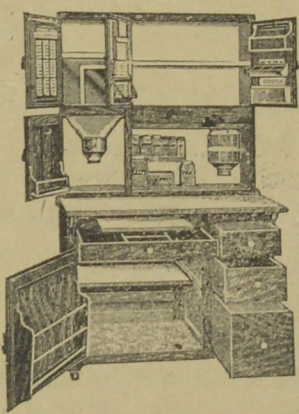
