## BUYING FUTURE PROSPERITY

The circumstances which led to the introduction of the Victory Loan idea, which has been so fruitful of benefits to Canada, were peculiar. In 1917 financial experts were dubious about the affairs of Canada. The war with its drains upon leading countries prevented her from borrowing abroad. It was necessary that she should have a large available capital, not merely to carry on war, but to finance those credits to Great Britain and other countries which were destined to bring such vast returns to this country.

Canada was thrown upon her own resources and appealed to her people for funds.

We all know how magnificently that and subsequent appeals were met. The remarkable over-subscriptions of the past two years completely changed the outlook for Canada, and dissipated uncertainty. They gave a new impetus in agriculture and commerce; they established a prosperity such as this country had never previously known. They enabled the provincial governments and municipalities to finance reasonable undertakings at home. In short, they gave a new lease of life to Canada's commercial activities. But the process once set in motion must be continued. Upon the ready response of the small investor, as well as the capitalist, depend the immediate economic future of Canada. Everyone's prosperity is involved; the purchaser of 1919 Victory Bonds will buy continued and future prosperity.

The pleasing announcement is made that the province's territorial revenue for the fiscal year ending October 31st will exceed the estimated revenue by \$15,000. In bringing down the budget last session, Hon. Mr. Murray estimated the territorial revenue at \$809,500, and \$15,000 added to this will make the actual receipts \$824,500. Considering the fact that the lumber cut was much smaller than in some previous years, this is a remarkable showing and easily break all records. Hon. Mr. Smith is deserving of hearty congratulations on his success in administering the most important department of the government. It may be truly said that this province never had a Minister who strived so faithfully to fulfil his obligations to the people.

The Woodstock Press says that Messrs. C. Gordon Sharp, C. L. Smith and T. W. Caldwell, all Liberals, were the organizers of the U. F. O. in Carleton county. It goes on to say that "the organizers being Liberals, three-quarters of the Liberal party in this county soon enrolled as members." If our memory serves us right, the editor of the Press was a speaker at one of the U. F. O. meetings and subscribed quite heartily to its principles. When the by-election was called on, however, he responded to the crack of the party whip and came out flatly against the U. F. O. candidate. He had not a word to say then against the combines and monopolies, which he roundly condemned when speaking at the farmers' meeting.

## SOME PARISHES DOING WELL FOR VICTORY LOAN

FREDERICTON STILL LAGGING BEHIND

Eight Days Remain for Allotment to be Reached—The District as a Whole Doing Well.

A comparison of New Brunswick with the rest of the Dominion is most unfavorable to New Brunswick, which is several millions of dollars behind requirements for Victory Loan.

Fortunately York County while a laggard is not quite so bad as some other districts and the prospects of recovery here during the few days left are not hopeless, nevertheless when it is considered that nearly two thirds of the time of the canvassers has been expended in securing only slightly over one third of the requirement for the County it will be realized that the need for whole hearted participation is urgent.

From the parishes generally there is evidence of effort, McAdam is working hard so is Harvey but Canterbury, St. Marys, Lincoln and New Maryland are not doing their share. Bright is coming along and so is Southampton, while the City of Fredericton is away behind and this position is due to indifference in places where self interest alone should bring big subscriptions.

There are eight days left to recover this position, York County can do it if it will.

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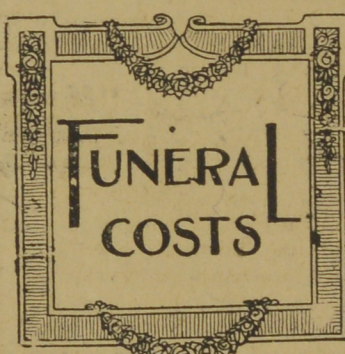
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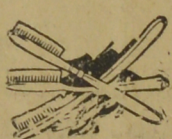
