COL. J. A. CURRIE M. P. IN A SCRAP WITH WESTERNER

Becoming Enraged at Dr. Cowan of Regina He Gave Him a Slap in the Face—The Doctor Retaliated With Blows From a Cane—The Incident Caused Great Excitement in The Corridors of Parliament.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 5.—That "Bonnie Fechter," Colonel John A. Currie, M. P., for North Simcoe and Dr. W. D. Cowan the doughty dentist of Regina enlivened the proceedings of parliament this afternoon when they came to blows in the main corridor. It was the sequel to a taunt hurled at the Highlander in the commons' chamber while Hon. James Calder was speaking on the report of the special committee of soldiers' civil re-establishment. The colonel had been heckling the minister, and Dr. Cowan who is also a Tory Unionist, but a greater admirer of Union government than the North Simcoe member exclaimed: "Better get back to your dugout."

Shortly afterwards the members took dinner recess and Colonel Currie approaching the Regina man, said: "Cowan, you insulted me." His follow through was a punch on the jaw. The dentist is a lame man, but was shift enough to give the Highlander a blow over the head with his walking stick before they could clinch.

James Robb, the chief Liberal whip jumped in between them and prevented further hostilities.

The corridor was crowded at the time and the incident was the sole topic of conversation in the parliamentary restaurant during the evening meal.

"I didn't intend to hurt him," said Colonel Currie to The Telegraph reporter, "I merely slapped him on the face a couple of times."

No blood was spilled though Dr. Cowan has a slight cut on the right cheek. If he could only get Currie in his dentist's chair for a few minutes—?

Regrets Incident

Dr. Cowan gave The Telegraph his version of the fight. "Colonel Currie was interrupting the minister of immigration and accusing him on dodging," said the doctor. "Members all about me thought this was an unfair remark as the minister was making a straightforward statement. I said to Currie: 'Anyway, he's not dodging out of the trenches into a dugout.' As I

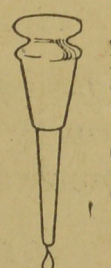
"Sir William Pugsley has arrived in town from St. John, N. B."

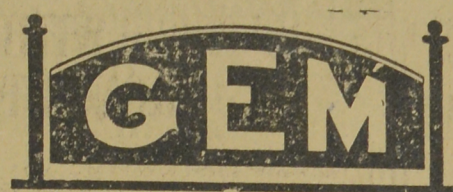
New Brunswick Authors

Toronto Saturday Night of November 1 devotes a page and a half to New Brunswick as a Canadian background of fiction. The article is written by E. J. Hathaway, and there are photographs of Rev. H. A. Cody, Theodore Goodridge Robert and Charles G. D. Roberts, with a view of Halifax harbor in 1760 and a sketch of Fort Howe, St. John, made by Ben Marston in 1781. The article deals with the early history of the province and the fiction writers already named, with a tribute also to the late Dr. Weir Mitchell and Dr. Henry VanDyke, the American diplomat, both of whom made this province the setting of stories and books. There is also a reference to Miss Alice Jones, who made the New Brunswick woods the scene of a novel and to Mrs. Harriet Vance Cheney.

Fraser's at Campbellton

Campbellton is to have two new lumber mills, and work is to be commenced at once and the plants in operation for next season. Members of the construction department of the Fraser Companies, Limited, are now advertising for men to begin the work of erecting two large mills on the B. A. Mowat property, which the Fraser Companies, Ltd., acquired some time ago. Crews are already in the woods cutting logs for next season's operation. One mill will be for the manufacture of long lumber while the other will manufacture cedar shingles. The Fraser Companies, Ltd., are perhaps the largest lumber operators in the province. They have plants in the following places: Cabano, Glendyne, Estcourt, in Quebec; Edmundston, Baker Brook, Plaster Rock, Fredericton and Nelson in New Brunswick, and now Campbellton is to be included in the chain.
