

HEAVY FINE FOR MAN WHO KILLED COW MOOSE

VIOLATIONS IN EASTERN COUNTIES INCREASING

Four Cow Moose Killed Near Sackville—The Chief Game Warden's Dept. Active in Matter.

Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon has returned from Sackville where he prosecuted in a charge of violating the Game Act. He secured a conviction before Magistrate G. A. Gass of that town and the offender was fined one hundred dollars with fifteen dollars costs. The crime was the killing of a cow-moose.

Many Violations

Four cow-moose are reported to have been killed within a few miles of Sackville during the game season. Game Wardens are active and other prosecutions will follow.

In former seasons the northern sections of the province produced the bulk of the game law violations but this year the eastern counties have provided more than their share. Many have been in the open season hunters appearing to take the view that if they secure a game license they can shoot at anything.

Harry Claybourn, a negro from Barker's Point who was sentenced to serve a three years' term at Dorchester Penitentiary, was sent to Dorchester this morning under the charge of Constable Charles Barker.

Two bowling matches took place at the Palace Bowling Alleys last evening. The Jeppers Club and Business College splitting even two points each; while the Camp Couac team won three out of four points in a game with the Y. M. C. A.

The Fredericton friends of Mr. Edwin T. McKnight, Massachusetts State Senator will be pleased to hear that he was re-elected in the election on Tuesday. Mr. McKnight ran in Medford, Middlesex County as a Republican. Senator McKnight is a native of Kings County and a U. N. B. graduate.

Late Mrs. Annie Cassidy

The funeral of the late Mrs. Annie Cassidy took place this afternoon, the remains arriving in the city this morning from St. John. Solemn service was conducted by Very Rev. Dean Carney at St. Dunstan's Church at 2.30 o'clock interment being made at the Hermitage.

Concerning Vendors

Rev. W. D. Wilson, Chief Prohibition Inspector for New Brunswick, was in Moncton on Tuesday, and left in the forenoon for Dorchester and Sackville. Speaking to the Moncton Times, Mr. Wilson said the present vendorships under the prohibition act would continue in force until the meeting of the provincial government next week, when further regulations would be made.

The White Ensign

The Lords of The Admiralty, London, have issued an order under date of October 2, that the naval flag or white ensign must not be used either ashore or afloat by any private person but must be flown only on His Majesty's ships, naval establishments or naval barracks. This means, therefore, that any one using this flag is liable to a penalty, as it is and has always been a distinctive naval flag. The Union Jack can, of course, be flown by any one on shore.

Sentences Handed Out

The two girls and two men who were caught lying and lurking in a summer camp outside the city by the police appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick yesterday afternoon. The married girl was fined twenty dollars and two months in jail on the understanding that if she were to go West and live with her husband the two months' sentence would be suspended. The two men were fined twenty dollars each or one month in jail and the other girl who claims she is under sixteen was remanded for three days.

HEAVY STORM RAGING OVER EAST'N CANADA

ONLY 4 LONG DISTANCE PHONE LINES OPERATING

Telegraph Service Interrupted Completely—Newspapers at Disadvantage—Thirty Mile Gale.

Beginning yesterday morning Fredericton has for two days been in the grip of a severe storm which has played havoc with telephone and telegraph wires. The meteorological bureau at the University of New Brunswick reports that some two inches of rain and snow have fallen, combining to make the walking bad and the weather cold and disagreeable. A high northeast wind blowing about thirty miles an hour has been prevalent for the last day and a half and with the temperature standing at thirty two degrees the weather has been enough to make one wear overcoat and raincoat combined.

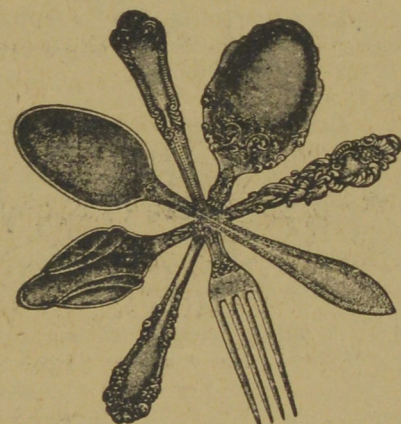
Wires Interrupted

Only four long distance telephone lines leading out of Fredericton to the various parts of the province are in order and a number of local lines have been broken by the violence of the storm. The Canadian Press and other wires are interrupted and the newspapers are considerably handicapped by that fact. It is reported that a train wreck has taken place somewhere in this section but the railways report no information concerning it.

Travelling in such slush as is evident on the city streets is hard work and many people are choosing to remain indoors today. The storm has been general over Eastern Canada.

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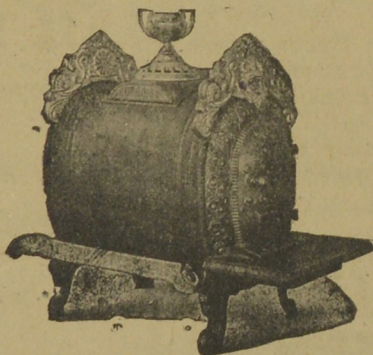
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REVALUATION FOR ASSESSMENT VERY PROBABLE

ASSESSORS WILL ACT IF APPOINTMENTS NOT MADE

Real Estate Has Not Been Revalued for Many Years—New Basis of Assessment Needed.

A general increase in the valuation of real estate for purposes of assessment in this city is likely to be made before the next assessment is made. Had the City Council not taken first steps toward revaluation last year the Board of Assessors under powers conferred upon it by legislation, would have undertaken a readjustment of real estate valuations. The City Council, however, by taking the step of appointing valuers, prevented the Assessors from acting and by failing to have the Board of Valuers act, prevented any revaluation at all.

Revaluation Much Needed

Revaluation is greatly needed on account of changed conditions in Fredericton, on account of increased population and on account of general upward trend in real estate values. The latter have been very evident in the prices paid in some of the property transfers which took place during the past summer and this autumn.

Assessors Will Act if Necessary

It is probable that the matter of revaluation will be discussed by the present City Council or that which will be in office after the next civic election and action taken. If it is not, however, the Board of Assessors will act.

May Affect Rate

There is little doubt that the total valuation of Fredericton will be greatly increased by revaluation and it is expected that such increase will affect the rate of assessment. If the total assessment is not greatly increased the rate will be reduced and with an increased assessment it easily could remain at its present figure, two dollars.

Loss of Child

The sympathy of the community is extended to Mr. and Mrs. Abram Batty of North Devon in the loss of their infant son Daniel at the age of six months. The deceased child is survived by one brother Raymond and two sisters Josephine and Marion. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock, interment being made at Sunnybank Cemetery.

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
