

## FIFTEEN CENT BREAD AFTER NEW YEAR'S

**BAKERS HAVE AGREED TO  
ADVANCE PRICE 3 CENTS**

**Rise in Price of Flour Accounts  
for Two Cents, Wrapping  
Said to Cause the  
Other.**

The local bakers have agreed that bread shall advance the first of the year to 15 cents a loaf. At present bread is selling for 12 cents a loaf which is considerably cheaper than in most Canadian cities. This advance is occasioned because of the fact that the new law of the Department of Public Health provides that each loaf of bread shall be wrapped in paper for sanitary reasons. This wrapping, according to the bakers adds one cent a loaf to the cost of the bread and the further increase is occasioned by the rise in the price of flour amounting to \$2.25 a barrel.

The bakers say they were holding out against a possible raise as they thought conditions would soon combine to warrant a reduction in the price of bread.

The annual ice-harvest is under way. Almost a foot and a half of clear ice can be cut in the river already and there is practically no snow to be cleared away before the ice can be cut. It can hardly be expected, however, that these factors will produce cheaper ice next summer.

### Going to Cuba.

Steamer Elaine, formerly running on the St. John River, which has been chartered by Cuban parties is expected to leave for that country in a few days, via American ports. Captain O. Swanson, formerly on the coastal steamer Scotia, is going to command of the Elaine. The steamer will undergo some repairs at New York, before proceeding to Cuba.

### Death in Kingsclear

Caleb F. Fox aged thirty seven years died this morning at his home in Kingsclear, after a lingering illness. He is survived by his parents and three sisters. The latter are Mrs. Henry Strange and the Misses Fanny and Nellie Fox all of Kingsclear. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock service being conducted by Rev. Mr. Jones. Interment will be made at the Baptist Cemetery.

## REV. DR. ROBERTS MAY LOCATE IN ST. LOUIS, MO.

**LEFT FOR THAT CITY  
ON SATURDAY LAST**

**Resigned as Secretary of York  
Commercial Club—Friend  
of Manufacturer Whose  
Son He Knew.**

Rev. Dr. D. W. Roberts who was recently appointed secretary of the Commercial club in this city is at present visiting his son Cyril at St. Louis, where the latter is employed in a boot and shoe factory. Dr. Roberts handed in his resignation as secretary of the Club before he left the city and J. Bacon Dickson was appointed secretary pro tem. On leaving Dr. Roberts stated that he would probably remain at St. Louis and accept a position in the same factory as his son. The president of the company conducting the factory is an old friend with whom he became acquainted while overseas with the American Red Cross.

Too much can not be said in praise of Dr. Roberts who has been active in two Victory Loan Campaigns and who was one of the first to take an active part in the organization of the Commercial Club.

### With American Red Cross

While Dr. Roberts' absence was accepted he was released from the duties of Secretary in the hope that he would find it to his advantage to return to the city. Dr. Roberts came here shortly before the war and after the United States entered into the war he joined the American Red Cross and was stationed at Liverpool. While with them the "flu" epidemic broke out and a large number of American soldiers died of this contagious disease.

While overseas Rev. Dr. Roberts made the acquaintance of a young soldier from St. Louis and comforted him during illness which proved fatal. The father of the young soldier is the manufacturer in St. Louis.

### Death at Marysville

Mrs. Elizabeth Peterson died last night at her home in Marysville aged ninety years. Four sons and four daughters survive. They are T. A. ## REV. J. G. A. BELYEA DIED MONDAY AT CROSS CREEK

**LONG SERVICE IN THE  
BAPTIST MINISTRY**

**Had Heart Trouble for Some  
Time—Rev. G. C. Warren  
to Conduct Funeral  
Service.**

It is with profound regret that we record the death of Rev. J. G. A. Belyea, pastor of the Baptist Church of Cross Creek, York County, which occurred yesterday in the parsonage at that place. The deceased had been in failing health for some months, suffering from heart trouble, and the end came suddenly but not unexpectedly. Besides a sorrowing widow, he leaves to mourn their loss a family of three sons and four daughters.

The deceased was born at Belyea's Cove, Queen's County, some sixty-five years ago. He was graduated with the degree of B. A. at Acadia University in 1882. He then entered the teaching profession in this province, and was a most successful teacher for some fifteen years. In 1897 he was ordained to the Baptist ministry and for over thirty years has been a faithful and successful pastor and preacher. He held pastorates in each of the three Maritime Provinces, but the major portion of his ministry was spent in his native Province. He served the Baptist churches at Middle Sackville, Doaktown, Fredericton Junction and Cross Creek with much acceptance. He was beloved and respected by the constituencies which he served and by the wider constituency of the Maritime Baptist Convention which honored him with positions of trust and responsibility. A few years ago he filled the position of Moderator of the Baptist Association of New Brunswick and at the time of his death was the efficient secretary of that body. For many years he served on the Home Mission Board of New Brunswick and has acted as chairman of that organization.

The funeral service will be held tomorrow at two o'clock at the parsonage at Cross Creek. Rev. G. C. Warren will conduct the service, assisted by other Baptist clergymen. The remains will be taken by train to Petitcodiac on Thursday for interment.
