ARMISTICE DAY BILL WAS KILLED IN THE HOUSE

Six Months Hoist to Mr. Pedlow's Bill was Given on Division—
Majority Against the Measure was Small—Opposition and
Cross-Bench Members Voted Against the Bill—A Speech
Four Hours in Length on the Soldier Vote..

Ottawa, Sept. 25—The house this afternoon slaughtered I. E. Pedlow's bill to make the second Monday in November a permanent Thanksgiving Day so that it would be observed in commemoration of the blessings of peace as well as being a day of thankfulness for the gifts of Providence. On the third reading Dr. Michael Steele, South Perth, moved the six months' hoist and the amendment was carried on a division of 78 to 73.

While the division could be correctly described as a non-party one, the seventy-eight votes which threw out the bill were cast by Unionists or cross-bench members. Members who favored the bill included Sir George Foster, who was leading the house ten other Unionists and all the Opposition members.

When the bill left committee the other night it was November 11 (Armistice Day) a permanent thanksgiving day. This afternoon the house, on the motion of A. R. McMaster, adopted an amendment changing this date to the second Monday in November. Then came the six months' hoist motion, and the demise of the proposed measure.

Debate Continued

The debate on D. D. McKenzie's resolution calling for the appointment of a committee to inquire into the alleged sending of a code telegram signed by Hon. Arthur Meighen to Sir Robert Borden relation to the placing of soldiers' votes in Manitoba constituencies was continued but not concluded. It was adjourned until Monday, when it will close with a division.

A. R. McMaster followed for the opposition when the house met. He maintained that there had been a widespread system of manipulation of soldiers' votes.

Dr. Michael Clark, from the cross-benches made a vigorous speech in defense of Mr. Meighen. He deprecated the raising of such issues, and declared that the opposition had failed to establish its case from a legal standpoint.

Speaks Four Hours

GRENIER IS CONVICTED OF MURDER

Andover, Sept. 25—After being out for almost two hours the jury in the trial of Joseph Grenier for the murder of Felix Francoeur returned the verdict, guilty of murder. The prisoner received the announcement calmly and will be sentenced tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock.

The prisoner took the stand in his own defence and pleaded justification on the ground of self-defence, but though his story awakened some considerable sympathy, having no witnesses to support his story and several strong witnesses against him, his plea was unavailing.

The old man, almost in a spirit of resignation to his fate, waited during the two hours of the jury's deliberation with the same impassionate calm with which he heard the verdict. While much sympathy is felt for the old man who is more than seventy years of age, public sentiment seems to approve of the finding of the jury.

Grenier is lodged in the jail at Andover and is receiving careful, kindly attention from the authorities who have a man looking after him. The case will be closed by the pronouncement of sentence tomorrow morning.

from 5 to 6 o'clock, he kept going until after 11 o'clock.

Mr. Archambault dealt almost entirely with the inquiry by a Royal Commission into charges made by him in the house as to the taking of the soldiers' vote in Chambly-Berchères. He maintained that he had proved every charge he made, but that the government had restricted the scope of the inquiry. Despite the finding of the judges, he maintained that six or seven hundred soldiers had been induced to perjure themselves. Mr. Archambault referred to the findings of Judge McLellan as "a most extraordinary document of partisanship" and was called to order by Deputy Speaker Bolvin.

Dr. Edwards of Frontenac, who followed Mr. Archambault, spoke until 12.45, when the debate was adjourned by J. A. Robb, chief Liberal whip, and the House rose.

BANK ENGLAND STATEMENT

London, Sept. 25—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes: Total reserve decreased £755,000; circulation increased £709,000; bullion decreased £46,816; other securities decreased £1,616,000; public deposits decreased £732,000; other deposits increased £5,635,000; notes reserve decreased £708,000; government securities increased £6,706,000.

The proportion of the bank's reserve to liability this week is 21.42 percent; last week it was 23.03 percent. Rate of discount five percent.

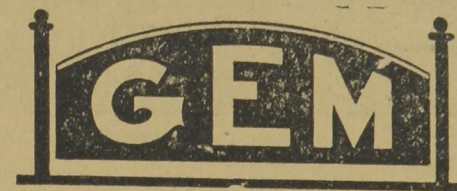
