## Baltimore Cake.

One pound of flour, one pound of sugar, one-half pound of butter, four eggs, one cup of milk. Melt the butter in the milk, add the sugar, then the flour, then the eggs, well beaten. Just before baking add two teaspoons of cream of tartar dissolved in one-half wineglass of water, beat it well and add one teaspoon of soda dissolved in same way, lemon or nutmeg and cinnamon flavoring. Bake in a quick oven. Instead of cream of tartar and soda, three even teaspoons of any good baking powder may be used. A very good light cake.

## Philadelphia Cake.

One-half pint of milk, one pound of sifted flour and one pound of white sugar, five eggs and one half pound of butter, three teaspoons of baking powder, one-half wineglass of rose water, one grated nutmeg and one teaspoon of powdered cinnamon.

Instead of the rose water and spice flavoring one and one-half wineglasses of milk and a large tablespoon of any essence with grated rind of a lemon may be used.

## Boston Cake.

One cup of butter, one cup of sugar, one cup of molasses, three eggs, three teaspoons of baking powder, three pints berries (black cap raspberries or huckleberries) and enough flour to make a batter of dough about as stiff as for a pound cake.

It should be eaten hot.

## Newark Pudding.

One quart of milk, five eggs, one large cup fine breadcrumbs, two table-spoons of rice flour, one-half pound of seede raisins, cut in two, and dredged with flour, two table-spoons melted butter, two teaspoons of vanilla extract and one-half teaspoon of soda.

Soak the crumbs in one pint of milk, beat the yolks of the eggs thoroughly and add to the crumbs. Stir in the rice flour, which must be wet with cold milk. Stir in next the other pint of milk, then the butter, the flavoring, the raisins and last of all the whites of the eggs beaten to a froth. Bake in a greased mold for one hour. Eat with hard sauce.

This trimming is usually applied to wide-brimmed shapes and no other ornament is employed.

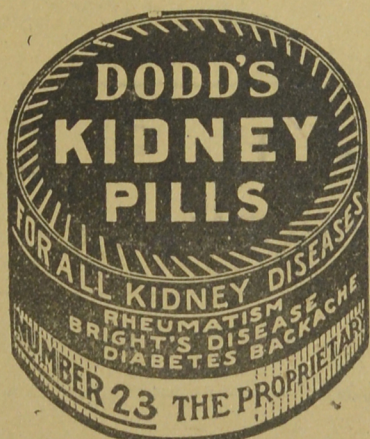
