SESSION OF PARLIAMENT EXPECTED TO END JULY 5

This Day Has Been Fixed by the Government—
Important Pieces of Legislation Have Been
Under Consideration—Machinery for Carry-
ing on by-Elections to be Provided—Board of
Commerce to be Appointed.

Ottawa, June 24—It is understood that at the meeting of the council today that July 5th was agreed on as the date of prorogation of the House.

Ottawa, June 24—The cabinet has been in session tonight considering two important pieces of legislation which will be presented to the House tomorrow or next day in all probability. One has to do with the appointment of what will be known as a Board of Commerce and has been decided upon as the result of an interim report presented by the living committee. It will consist of three members, one of whom the chairman must be a judge or a lawyer and will have jurisdiction and powers of a wide nature dealing with trusts and mergers illegal or extortionate profits, and generally such matters as are covered by the United States Federal Trades Board, with power to prosecute for infringement of laws. The name of W. F. O'Connor is mentioned as chairman of the board.

Re By-Elections

The other bill will provide machinery for carrying on the by-elections. This has been more contentious and it is understood that there has been some disagreement in the cabinet regarding it. As outlined in an article recently published there is no machinery now existing for the carrying on of the elections and some special legislation will be introduced for this specific purpose. Messrs MacLean and Carvell have been urging that they be held on the existing provincial lists, so far as possible, while the Conservatives on the government side of the house desire the enumerator or some other system. It is possible that a proposal may be made giving full manhood and womanhood franchise for the by-elections. A proposal urged by the opposition is to revert to conditions as they existed before the War Times Election Act was made law and this has much support.

Force to Be Increased

Ottawa, June 24—There was a spirited debate in the commons tonight over Major-General Mewburn's bill to authorize an increase in the permanent military force of the dominion from five to ten thousand men. The minister defended the bill on the ground that a force of ten thousand was none too large for a country like Canada, more particularly in view of the present conditions. He contended that it was not the intention to increase the force by more than a couple of thousand.

Opposition to the measure came from Hon. T. A. Crerar, Dr. Michael Clark, A. R. McMaster, W. F. Nickle and other members of the house. Mr. Crerar thought it unwise to maintain law and order by the maintenance of large armies others thought the present was not a good time to create a larger force.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, referring to the Winnipeg situation, advised Sir Robert Borden to follow the example of Premier Lloyd George by proceeding to Winnipeg and endeavoring to settle the strike by the application of conciliatory methods.

Strong support for the measure came from R. L. Richardson, General

Griesbach, W. F. Cockshutt, H. A. MacKie, G. W. Allen, and other members of the house. The clause increasing the size of the force was carried on a division of fifty-six to thirty-four Messrs Crerar, Nickle, Clark and Johnston being among those who voted "nay."

H. H. Stevens, south Vancouver, argued that the elevator companies have robbed the farmers of the west of millions of dollars. His statements were denied by Hon. T. A. Crerar, J. A. Maharg and other western members.

At a late hour the house considered the bill relating to the business war tax and the income tax.

Jack Kearns, manager of Dempsey, last night furnished Rickard and officials of the Army, Navy and Civilian Board of Boxing Control, a list of officials acceptable to the challenger.

The list included among several others, Billy Roche of New York; Jack Welch, of San Francisco, and Kid McParland of New York.

Welch was referee of the Willard-Johnson championship contest in Havana.

Eggs Advanced—Strawberries Now on Sale—Prices High.

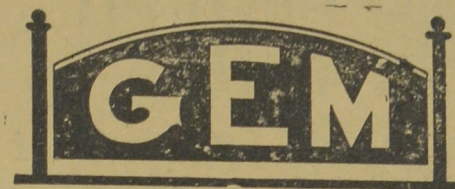
