

INSURANCE ON DAIRY SCHOOL BLDG. IS PAID

MINISTER OF AGRIC.
HAD GIVEN DUE NOTICE

Total Claim of Upwards of
\$11,000 Paid—Expert on
Spraying to Address
Meetings.

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, announced this morning that the Department had received upward of \$11,000 as insurance on the Dairy School Building at Sussex which was destroyed by fire while occupied by troops as barracks. Of that amount \$6,000 was paid some time ago but the insurance companies demurred at paying the balance claiming that notice of occupation of the building by troops had not been given. It was proven however that it was under the administration of Hon. J. A. Murray that the formality had been omitted and that Hon. Mr. Tweeddale had given the required notice. This made it necessary to pay the balance of the insurance.

BIG TRANSFER IN REAL ESTATE IN YORK ST.

R. CHESTNUT & SONS BUY
CAMP BROS. PROPERTY

Modern Building Connected
with Store to be Erected—
Camp Bros. Also
to Build.

One of the largest real estate deals which has taken place in Fredericton in some time is about completed. By it R. Chestnut & Sons acquire a large frontage on York Street which they will connect with their present premises in Queen Street, devoted to retail and wholesale hardware business. The property is that which has been occupied for many years as a livery stable, recently by Camp Bros. The new owners will erect a modern building as soon as possible. Camp Bros. intend to secure a site in York street between King and Brunswick on which it had been intended by Mr. R. L. Phillips to erect a garage, where they will build a modern building.

Business Expansion

This purchase by R. Chestnut & Sons follows others which the same firm made recently in the expansion of its business. The so called Mitchell property in Phoenix Square was converted into an apartment house by that firm with its plumbing department occupying a portion of it. Within the past few days a brick building at the rear of the property of Mrs. J. H. Harvey in Queen Street, was purchased for warehouse room. The purchase of the Camp property will give R. Chestnut a wide frontage in York Street. It is understood that the livery stable will be removed as soon as possible. The building to replace it, under the building laws must be of brick or similar material.

Many Years a Livery Stable

The building which Camp Bros. have sold, for many years was a livery stable. The late George Atherton occupied it as such for many years and was succeeded by the late George Gunter. The late Israel Golding followed him his estate selling the business to the late Dell Gunter who was succeeded by Camp Bros.

Will Build in Brick

Camp Bros. intend to build in brick or concrete, the building to be two or three stories. It will be used as a livery stable but will be capable of conversion to other uses.

Depot Battalion No More

The First Depot Battalion, New Brunswick Regiment, has been completely demobilized, and its commanding officer, Major F. F. May, having wound up the accounts and records of this unit, left St. John for Halifax to take up his new duties on the staff of the chief inspector of accounts.

RETURNED SOLDIERS TO BE VISITORS

THE GOLF CLUB MAKES
CHANGES IN ITS RULES

Will Start a Juvenile Section—
Members of Management
Com. Must Retire After
One Year.

The meeting of the Fredericton Golf Club at the Board of Trade rooms last evening was fairly well attended. Two amendments to the bye-laws of the club were passed. One of these was with regard to the election of members of the Management Committee and the other was with reference to the introduction of Juveniles into the club.

With regard to the first it was decided that the three members of the committee appointed yearly on the highest votes would not be eligible for a second year on the committee but would retire and give place to three new members.

Admission of Juveniles

With regard to the introduction of Juveniles into the club it was decided that ten boys and ten girls up to the ages of eighteen would be admitted and on reaching that age they would become full members of the club without the introductory fees. There were several restrictions placed on the admittance of Juveniles to the club. They are as follows:—Juveniles do not come in with the transportation scheme; they cannot play after three o'clock in the afternoon; and cannot play on public holidays.

Returned Soldiers Visitors

A discussion arose over the question of allowing returned soldiers to visit the club and it was decided that returned soldiers, whether citizens of Fredericton or otherwise, were eligible to become visitors to the golf links. This is a change for in recent years citizens of Fredericton who were not members of the club were not allowed to visit the links.

Indian Agent B. J. Griffiths, left last evening for St. John and from there he will proceed to Norton, Sussex and other points where he will look into Indian affairs.

Visiting His Old Home

Prof. Robert C. Colwell of the University of West Virginia is revisiting his old home in this city. He will remain here for several weeks. He is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick and the Fredericton High School, at both of which he had distinguished courses. During the war he was an officer in the signalling service of the United States Army specializing in wireless telegraphy. Prof. Colwell was a member of the teaching staff of the Moncton High School.
