## REPORT THAT F. B. CARVELL IS TO QUIT PUBLIC LIFE

Inform Sir Robert Borden That He is Desirous of Resigning  
His Portfolio—Is Now on His Way to New Brunswick—  
May Become Chairman of the Railway Commission—Sir  
J. Douglas Hazen to Succeed Him in Cabinet.

Ottawa, Aug. 1.—The Citizen, today, says Hon. Frank B. Carvell minister of public works is retiring from the government and from political life. He authorized the announcement this afternoon, just before leaving for New Brunswick, but he didn't care to discuss his future beyond stating that he is out of politics.

After informing Sir Robert Borden at 11 o'clock this morning that he desired to resign his portfolio, Hon. Mr. Carvell cleared off what arrears of work still remained in time to take an early afternoon train for St. John. The minister has indicated that he has no intention of attending the national Liberal convention and at the department of public works one is informed that he will not return for a week. The resignation is said to be informal up to date, and it is said that the formal letter of resignation will be sent in later.

Hon. Frank Carvell by his action to day has fulfilled the pledge that he made when entering the Union Cabinet, to support it during the war and afterwards until the demobilization would be accomplished. The soldiers are not all demobilized as yet, but as the government has indicated by order-in-council that it considers demob-

to the St. John harbor board.

The resignation of Hon. Frank Carvell will probably be followed very soon by a vacancy in Carleton constituency.


It has been prophesied openly that Sir George Foster would resign that people today are still taking with a grain of salt a persistent report today that his resignation is already in the hands of Sir Robert Borden. That, however, chimes in with the idea that Sir Henry Drayton should go to North Toronto for election. Lady Foster is very ill, and it is said that Sir George would be glad to be freed from cares of state.

To succeed Hon. T. A. Crerar it is said that Dr. A. F. Tolmie, member for Victoria, has already wired to Sir Robert Borden his acceptance of the portfolio of minister of agriculture. This would make one minister too many for British Columbia, and afford Hon. Martin Burrell the opportunity he has been long looking for to resign as secretary of state. Rumor here suggests that he may succeed M. J. Griffin, parliamentary librarian as the latter wishes to conclude his long and meritorious service by retiring to the Pacific coast.

Mr. Doherty Retiring

Sooner or later it is expected that Judge Doherty will retire from active political life as his desires tend that way and then Hon. Arthur Meighen is in line for the succession.

Hon. A. K. MacLean is expected to be minister of trade and commerce after Sir George Foster. If Sir George remains Hon. Mr. MacLean will undoubtedly retire to private life. Some predict that he will do so in any case. Other shuffles are in prospect, but for the present there are troubles enough for the Unionist administration. The defections from the Unionist cabinet of Hon. Frank Carvell and Hon. T. A. Crerar have undoubtedly weakened the claim of the government to be a real Union government, and the new appointments expected indicate a rather rapid reversion to torquism. The least partisan of all the appointments is that of Sir Henry Drayton who, however, is considered a Conservative.

lization to be accomplished so far as the war-time elections act is concerned, it is open to any minister to consider it practically over so far as he himself is concerned. That Hon. Mr. Carvell has done; but he may stay a little longer on the job if necessary. When asked by a friend if he would attend the national Liberal convention his reply was: "I am quitting public life."

Hon. Sir Douglas Hazen, chief justice of New Brunswick, being in Ottawa at present, a strong belief has grown up that he will get into the public arena again. He himself says that he is here on international fisheries business. Those who think Sir Douglas Hazen would be willing to come to Ottawa as minister of public works believe that Hon. Mr. Carvell will be the next chief justice of New Brunswick, stating that the exchange had practically been decided upon a week or two ago. Others give credence to the idea that Hon. Mr. Carvell will become chairman of the dominion board of railway commissioners to succeed Sir Henry Drayton when the latter's appointment as minister of finance is announced noon tomorrow. There is little doubt that if either of these courses is under consideration it would most likely be that of the exchange of positions between Hon. Frank Carvell and Sir Douglas Hazen.

Election Prospects

It is hinted that Sir Douglas will run in St. John or York. It is possible that a way may be opened through the appointment of R. W. Wigmore, M. P.
