

CONNECTED IN NO WAY WITH SPOUL MURDER

DEPUTY SHERIFF LONG
EXAMINED MRS. COWAN

**Her Incoherent Remarks When
Arrested Apparently Have
No Meaning—Charge
of Drunkenness.**

Deputy Sheriff John J. Long of Penobscot County, Maine, arrived in this city from Bangor last night concerning the woman Mrs. Priscilla Cowan who was arrested here on Thursday evening by the Fredericton police, charged with drunkenness and who it was thought had some connection with the murder of James Sproule at Orono, Maine, on Wednesday, July 23rd. Deputy Sheriff Long knew the woman and recognized her but stated that as far as he knew she had nothing to do with the Sproule murder case. When arrested the woman made some very incoherent remarks which led to investigations by the police.

In No Way Concerned

Police Sergeant Nathaniel Jones got in touch with the Chief of Police at Bangor who notified Sheriff Fernandez of Penobscot County, about the woman. Sheriff Fernandez notified Deputy Sheriff John M. Long who left Bangor yesterday and arrived here last night. He stated that the name the woman had given was correct and that she was well known by him. He further stated that in no way, as a witness, principal or instigator, could he connect the woman with the crime, unless something further developed.

The woman says she is the wife of Lewis Cowan, 126 Centre Street, Bangor, Me.

She came before Police Magistrate Limerick this morning and was remanded until Tuesday for judgment.

Early Vegetables

Market Gardeners at Margerville and other points in this locality are now getting their produce on the market. The first native cucumbers and tomatoes arrived this week and there was an eager demand for them. A week ago imported cucumbers were selling in local groceries for fifteen cents each; now the native grown product, a superior article can be had for eight and ten cents. A big drop in the price may be looked for in the next few weeks. Native grown tomatoes promise a good yield but the price is likely to remain high.

AMUSEMENT FEATURES
TO BE BETTER THAN EVER

**Entries Pouring Into Secretary
Hooper's Office—New Trans-
portation Bldg. About
Half Built.**

Mr. W. S. Hooper, Secretary of Agricultural Society No. 34, announced that entries for the Fredericton Exhibition were numerous and are coming in fast. Everything is very promising and the Fredericton Exhibition of 1919 promises to be one of the biggest events ever held here. A great line of amusement attractions has been promised a number of which have been for the past season at Coney Island, New York.

The rate of admission will be slightly advanced.

Airplane to be Here

Among the foremost of the attractions is Capt. E. J. Stevens with his flying machine. Capt. Stevens has seen over three years' service in France with the Royal Flying Corps and will perform once a day at the Exhibition. He will fly here from Truro, N. S., on the first day of the exhibition Sept. 15th expecting the trip to take him about two hours.

A New One

Another attraction to be presented at the Exhibition will be the latest riding device known as the "Whip" which has been the sensation at Coney Island. It is absolutely new and something never seen in Fredericton before.

Other Attractions

From Coney Island also comes the latest model Ferris Wheel, some seventy feet in height and seating twenty four passengers. A merry-go-round for the kiddies is also included in the attractions. It is of the latest design and one of the best ever brought land Circus from Coney Island car-borhood of \$15,000, with thirty six horses and a number of chariots.

Another feature will be the Dream-land Circus from Coney Island carrying an immense tent covering about 15,000 square feet with fifteen separate attractions.

One of the attractions that has always pleased the citizens of Fredericton is a coon-show with a jazz band and some fifteen people taking part. This show is also direct from Coney Island.

The Submarine Girls will offer another attraction in their performance in a huge glass tank which will occupy a prominent position on the midway. Many other small shows will also perform and every inch of space

MOVEMENTS OF SALMON PUZZLE FISH EXPERTS

NFD. HAS PLENTY, THE
MARITIME PROV. FEW

**Sea Dogs Blamed by Some—
Other Lines of Fishing
Good—Neglected Food
Sources.**

This season has been one of the most puzzling to those who follow fishing and are acquainted with the habits of salmon. No section of the Maritime Provinces has had the usual run of this excellent fish. Inspector H. E. Harrison reported to the Department that St. John River salmon fishery failed almost absolutely this summer. A reply was to the effect that similar reports had come from Nova Scotia and that no reason had yet been found. The Miramichi and Restigouche, both famous salmon rivers in New Brunswick, have practically no salmon this summer. Noted pools on the Restigouche on the estimate of experienced anglers have not more than one tenth the usual number of fish.

Abundant in Newfoundland

What makes the situation all the more strange is that reports from Newfoundland, which also has a great reputation as a country for salmon, are to the effect that the salmon-fishing there is excellent this summer. Sportsmen from this section are planning to go to the Ancient Colony after salmon. It always had been thought that the salmon-run which filled Maritime Provincial rivers was the same which reached Newfoundland streams but evidently such is not the case. There still is the possibility and probability that there will be an autumn
