ST. ANDREW'S NIGHT OBSERVED BY THE SCOTS OF FREDERICTON

Songs, dances and readings constituted the program for the evening and time seemed to have the proverbial golden wings as it was after midnight when those present left for their homes.

Applause for Greetings

The greetings from the various societies were read and applauded particularly one from Ottawa which bewailed in Scottish tongue and poetry the absence of "Scotch" spirits from the festivities.

Address by President

The celebration opened with an address of welcome from the President Hon. O. S. Crockett. He referred to the fact that the society was celebrating its 94th birthday and that the good old-fashioned toast could not be carried out.

TERRIFIC GALE SWEEP TORONTO

generally mixed up. Almost simultaneously with the rising of the gale, adequate steps were taken to restore telegraphic communication. Gangs of repairmen patrolled every line throughout the night on trains, motor cycles and afoot, carrying searchlights to locate the breaks. The principle routes were re-established late today.

The Canadian Press, Limited, was enabled to begin its Sunday evening services at the usual hour as a result of the repair work having been carried out with dispatch on its leased wires.

Despatches from Hamilton, Sarnia, Woodstock, Ingersoll, Stratford, Chatham, London, Galt and Ottawa all tell of the extent and damage caused by the storm in their respective districts.

From Ohio and Michigan also come reports of the damage done by the storm.

Severe in Montreal.

Montreal, Dec. 1.—Several trees sign boards, and electric wires were uprooted, overturned or broken by the force of the wind yesterday. The wind storm was not by any means the most severe that Montreal has seen, but was bad enough to cause considerable damage. The wind travelled at its fastest at noon, when it attained a speed of 42 miles an hour. At two o'clock it had dropped down to 31, but at three o'clock went up to 37, while four o'clock found it back to 31.

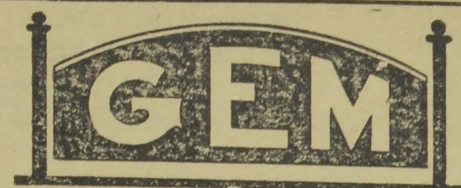
