GLORY OF THE PRINCESS PATS WILL NOT FADE

(Boston Transcript).

The "Princess Pats", a famous Canadian fighting regiment, will disembark from a returning steamer at Halifax today, but of the original battalion, which set forth in pride in the autumn of 1914, there will be but eight soldiers and one officer at Halifax. Forty-four of the original remnant paraded in London, but of these only nine returned from England with the organization. If these nine men are, for the sake of the tremendous story which they and their surviving comrades tell, separated from the rest of the regiment and paraded alone, they will represent a human sacrifice seldom recorded in active warfare. It balances the sacrifice of the 2nd Battalion of the Coldstream Guards in this war, of which only eight of the original members are left. The loss of the famous Light Brigade in the battle of Balaklava was a small affair compared with it, for of the 673 men composing that organization when under Lord Cardigan, it rode into the "wild charge" at Raglan's blundering order, 247 men and 197 horses were lost, leaving more than half the brigade unharmed. There has been a much higher percentage of loss than that of the Light Brigade in many an American, Canadian, British or French organization in the great battle of this war. The proportions of the sacrifice of the Princess Pats approach more nearly to the dimensions of the great military massacres of our own history, such as that of Custer, when on the Little Big Horn, in 1876, that brilliant commander rode with 471 men of the 7th Cavalry in the attack on the Sioux Indians—an attack from which only one man is known to have escaped.

The sacrifice of the Princess Pats has not been celebrated as yet in a poem so stirring and so immortal as Tennyson's Charge of the Light Brigade. Perhaps it never will be. The poets of this war do not show the dramatic genius, the epic quality of Tennyson. Their muse seeks rather to reveal the inner and personal emotions of the conflict rather than to celebrate its achievements. Their one great success thus far in touching the popular heart has been won with McCrea's in Flanders Fields—a poignant little chant in which the sadness

BETTER TERMS DEMANDED FOR MARITIME PROVINCES

Able and Illuminating Speech in the Legislature by Mr. Fred Magee of Westmorland—The Government's Administrative Record is Praised—Maritime Union is Urged as a Means of Obtaining Justice from Ottawa—More Revenue Must be Provided.

The Legislature last evening listened to two speeches on the budget—one by Mr. Potts, the chief whip of the opposition, and the other by Mr. Magee, the chief whip of the government. Mr. Potts' speech was ridiculous; Mr. Magee's was sublime; and that is all that need be said by way of comparison.

Mr. Magee spoke for little more than an hour, and was followed with breathless interest by members on both sides. When he had concluded his remarks he was paid a most unusual compliment. Cries of "Go on," came from both sides and was followed by a hearty outburst of applause from members on the right and left of the Speaker.

Graceful tributes to the late George Y. Dibblee, Clerk of the House, were pronounced by Premier Foster and Mr. Baxter, and it was decided that the House take recess for an hour this afternoon to permit the members to attend the funeral.

Mr. Guptill, of Charlotte, moved the adjournment of the debate.

Assembly Chamber, March 31, 1919. The House met at 8.30 p. m.

HON. MR. FOSTER moved that the time for introducing private bills be extended until Wednesday next, inclusive.

MR. SMITH (Carleton) presented the Petition of the Town of Hartland for the passage of an Act vesting the Water and Fire Protective system in said Town and to change the date for holding Civic Elections.

HON. MR. VENIOT introduced a Bill to confirm an agreement between the Minister of Public Works and St. John Railway Company. He explained that the Bill had reference to the tolls which the Company was to pay for the use of the Reversing Falls Bridge and would take the place of an agreement

entered into several years ago which had disappeared.

HON. MR. FOSTER requested leave of absence for Hon. Mr. Roberts until Wednesday next on account of family matters.

MR. BAXTER said he felt sure that Hon. Mr. Roberts had the sympathy of all hon. members in the bereavement that had come upon him.

HON. MR. FOSTER on behalf of Hon. Mr. Roberts presented the petition of the Municipality of Saint John for an amendment to the Act relating to the Government of St. John by an elective commission.

HON. MR. MURRAY introduced a Bill to amend the Act which provides

HON. MR. MURRAY said he had promised a gentleman who was active in opposing the Bill that he would have an opportunity to present his views. He had since learned from the Secretary-Treasurer that that gentleman had become satisfied with the measure and would not oppose it.

MR. BAXTER thought Hon. Mr. Speaker should give a decision with reference to the Bill.

HON. MR. SPEAKER expressed the opinion that the Bill was properly a Government measure and had it read the first time.

Clerk Dibblee's Death

HON. MR. FOSTER said that before the Order of the day was called he desired to refer to an event which he felt sure that every hon. member had heard with deep regret. He had reference to the death last evening of George Young Dibblee, Clerk of the Legislature. For upwards of twenty years the late Mr. Dibblee had occupied a position on the floors of the House, first as Clerk Assistant, from which position he had recently been promoted to the position of Clerk. During all those years he had performed his duties in a proper and dignified manner and he (Foster) felt sure had earned the respect of every member of the House. He knew he was voicing the sentiments of all when he stated that Mr. Dibblee would be greatly missed by all. As the funeral had been arranged for tomorrow afternoon he proposed moving when the House adjourned that it stand adjourned until four o'clock so that hon. members would have an opportunity of paying to the deceased gentleman a last tribute of respect.

MR. BAXTER said that he heartily concurred in what had been stated by his hon. friend the Premier. No member of the House except perhaps his hon. friend from Northumberland could date back beyond the days of Mr. Dibblee's appointment. Practically all hon. members had known nobody except the late Mr. Dibblee and the Clerk Mr. Rainsford, who had passed away recently. Mr. Dibblee appeared to provide for every emergency and was very courteous to all hon. members. He had an efficient training and gave careful attention to his duties and kept everybody in order. He gave of his best to the House and was undoubtedly a most valuable official. His death meant the loss of a personal friend to every hon. member.
