

SHEEP DIPPING DURING WINTER BEING TRIED

DEPT. OF AGRICULTURE
HAS EXPERIMENTED

Campaign for Spring Ordered
by Hon. J. F. Tweeddale
—Dip Tested by the
Department.

The Provincial Department of Agriculture is about to inaugurate a campaign of winter-dipping for sheep it being reported that flocks are much infested with ticks. Winter-dipping will serve to fill in the period which will elapse before the spring campaign of dipping, docking and castrating.

The Department has strongly advised dipping both spring and autumn for ticks and sheep-lice but in New Brunswick the advice has been generally disregarded by sheep-raisers and a winter dip for that reason is necessary. The Department has experimented with a particular dip over two hundred sheep having been dipped, and there has been marked success.

The following dip is recommended to sheep-raisers: 1 lb. arsenic, ¼ oz. mercuric oxide, 1 lb. soft soap, to be boiled in 15 quarts of soft water and cooled by addition of water to bring the bulk to 30 quarts. The mixture is to be boiled twenty minutes and about one quart to a sheep is to be administered by means of a small-mouthed container.

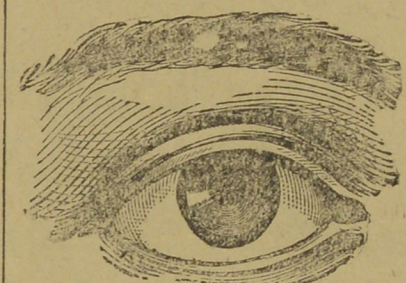
Good Start at Burt's Corner

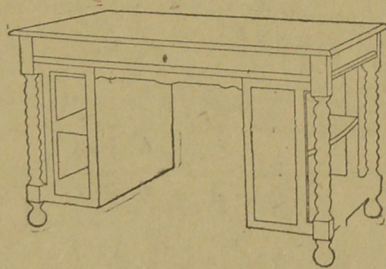
