

## MORE THAN HALF THE WOMEN ARE REGISTERED

REVISORS STILL TAKING  
NAMES AT OFFICE TODAY

A House to House Canvass in  
Devon—Rev. Father Carney  
Urges Registration and  
Gives Reasons.

The revisors for the City of Fredericton continued to register electors today in order to give all women who wished an opportunity to register. Up to noon today 996 women had registered in Fredericton. This is slightly in excess of the estimated total. In Devon the Revisors made a house-to-house canvass to secure the names of women.

### Rev. Father Carney's Reference

Rev. Father Carney pastor of St. Dunstan's Roman Catholic Church in this city, yesterday made reference to registration of women. He said that he personally had not favored women's suffrage but the legislature having made it the law of the land it should be observed. Registration would give women the opportunity of making their voices heard on issues concerned with moral uplift but they should not rush to the polls on every occasion such as the last Federal election which had contemptible features.

### To Leave Position.

Miss Kathleen McAdam, who is at present employed as a stenographer in the Agricultural Department, is leaving her position soon and will be one of the principals in an interesting event which will take place in the near future.

### Drunks Appeared

Dr. W. D. Camber, the well known dentist, of Woodstock, who has been in poor health for some years, died last Friday night, aged 70 years. He is survived by his wife, one daughter, Miss Faye, and one son, Clyde. The deceased was a native of Kingsclear, and leaves one brother, Mr. John A. Camber, residing at that place.

### Will Deny Report.

A clipping from the Montreal Standard was brought to the notice of the press today by the members of the Fredericton Board of Health. The clipping comments on the fact that Dr. G. C. Melvin and the local Board of Health met recently in conference over a typhoid situation in this city and ends with the following: "The thickly populated district at the eastern end of Fredericton has given the most cases, seven having come from three families." Someone, either a correspondent or other, has made a mess of things, getting this city substituted for some other, as there has been but one case of typhoid here recently and the patient has been able to be about for some time. Steps are being taken to deny the report and the secretary of the local board will without doubt be instructed to write to the Montreal Standard, requesting a correction.

## SHIPPERS OF POTATOES HAVE LOST HEAVILY

ROT AS HIGH AS 60 P. C.  
ON SOME SHIPMENTS

Irish Cobblers Still Being Purchased, but Late Varieties are Barred—High Price Expected.

The rain which set in today will not help the potato situation as it will prevent the farmers from getting into the fields to dig. The estimate of dealers is that late potatoes will not be more than a fifty percent crop and that later the price which the farmer will obtain will be high enough to make up to him the loss sustained through rot. The consumer however will have to pay.

Shippers have stopped buying potatoes except Irish Cobblers which being an early variety ripened sufficiently early to escape the late blight.

### Shippers Have Lost Heavily

Shippers in all sections have lost heavily through the rotting of potatoes in transit. W. W. Boyce of this city the largest shipper in this section went personally to Boston to see one of his shipments which U. S. government inspectors had given a very high percentage of rot. On his arrival he found that the rot was even worse than the inspectors had reported.

This has been generally true. Potatoes shipped from Fredericton in perfect condition have reached their destination some eight days later with sixty per cent of rot.

### Did Not Spray

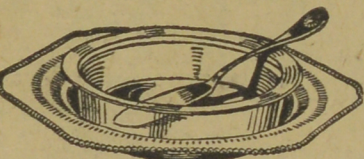
Failure to spray accounts for the great advances made by rot. Where Bordeaux was used extensively there is a low percentage of rot. The fact that the Colorado beetle was not as plentiful as usual made many growers slacken their spraying and they now are paying for their slackness.

### Denied Rumor.

Major R. M. Luton, M. C., O. C., of the N. B. Military Hospital, denied the report this morning that the Military Hospital was closing in a short time and that the patients there were to be removed to Quebec.

### Two Byelections

The Municipality of York is to have two byelections early in November one in Quensbury where Coun. Elect Harley Brown has resigned and in Prince William where but one councillor was elected by reason of the withdrawal of Ex-Warden Wm. McMullin from the contest. Coun. Elect Brown in withdrawing states that there are reasons why he cannot fill the office of councillor. He had been elected by acclamation.

ABOUT \$450 SATURDAY

Lumber for Houses to be Sawn  
on Site of River Valley  
Lumber Company's  
Mill.

The Ashburnham Chapter of the Red Cross conducted a tag day on Saturday and in all \$439.78 was realized. Taggers were busy in all parts of the city and their efforts are as follows:

The money was deposited in the Bank of Nova Scotia for the relief of the people of Oromocto to be used according as those in charge see fit.

On Saturday quantities of supplies including food and clothing of all descriptions were carried to Oromocto. Today more supplies are being sent.

P. this morning stated that a portable mill was being brought in and would be at work on the site of the old mill sawing the lumber for the frames of the building which will be erected soon.
