

# Buy Victory Bonds Through the Banks on the Instalment Plan

CANADA'S banks will make it possible for every Canadian man and woman to buy all the Victory Bonds they can pay for in ten months.

The Finance Minister has made arrangements with the bank managers throughout the Dominion to give every co-operation to enable you to buy all the Victory Bonds you can possibly pay for on the instalment plan.

You do not need to be a customer of a bank to buy bonds under this instalment plan—it is open to everyone.

Put every dollar you can gather together into Victory Bonds—and then go to any bank and buy on the instalment plan all the Victory Bonds you can pay for during the next ten months.

Under this plan you pay ten per cent. on or before November 15th, and ten per cent. each month till August 16, 1920, when you will get your bond. The interest charged you by the bank is balanced by the interest you get on your Victory Bonds.

Any branch of any bank will store the Victory Bonds of small investors for safe keeping for a year without charge.

**Buy all the Victory Bonds you can pay for — then buy more on the instalment plan. The banks will help you.**

**Employers' Credits**—The banks have decided to make loans to employers of labour covering the subscriptions of their employees—the rate of interest to be the same as the yield of the bonds—5½%—the loans to be made for 90 per cent. of the amount subscribed—and to be paid off in monthly instalments. The banks have unanimously agreed that these loans will not be considered as impairing the amounts of credits for other purposes.

**Advances to Investors**—The banks have agreed also to grant reasonable credits to subscribers to the Loan at the rate of 5½% per annum, on loans to be repaid within one year. The amount loaned will be 90 per cent. of the subscription.

## CAN. NATIONAL RAILWAYS WILL JOIN CMPAIGN

To Boost Victory Loan—Energetic Campaign to be Carried On Over All Parts of Govt. System.

"Every employee a Bondholder in the 1919 Victory Loan."

This is the keynote of the Campaign that is being carried on over the entire system of the Canadian National Railways to further the Bond Issue.

From the Atlantic to the Pacific the employees of the great system of railways under Government control and operation are being urged to join in the movement to boost the Victory Loan and to invest their savings so that Canada may be enabled to carry on the stupendous task of reconstruction—and make payment of her Debts of Honor.

The railway employees are being asked to join with all true Canadians in the great effort to restore Canada commercially, to help her keep her factories busy and her farms productive.

The proceeds of this Loan will be spent in Canada for capital outlay in ship building and in purchase of rolling stock and steel rails for our railways. It will be used to establish the credits whereby European Nations hungering for our products may be supplied, thus stimulating our export trade, and giving employment to countless thousands. Canada asks her people to lend—not to give their money. The Victory Bonds bear interest at 5½ per cent. and no better investment for savings could possibly be found.

The Railway has again arranged with its bankers to increase the subscriptions of employees on the extended payment plan based on payroll deductions of ten (10) per cent monthly.

The Management of the Canadian National Railways has addressed an appeal to all employees asking their co-operation and the Railway organization is being completed to carry on the campaign in every section of the Railway system.
