CARLETON-VICTORIA.

The Federal by-election yesterday in the united counties of Carleton and Victoria resulted in the triumphant return of Mr. Thomas W. Caldwell, the United Farmers candidate, by a majority close to the 4,000 mark. The Unionist candidate, Lieut. Col. Melville, who was to give the Federal government an independent support, will forfeit his deposit. It was generally conceded that the farmers' candidate would win hands down, but nobody expected that his opponent, an old-time Tory with a war record, would be hit by a cyclone. The defeated candidate had the active support of the Tory press and two Federal cabinet ministers who journeyed to the constituency and campaigned in his behalf. They utterly failed, however, to stem the tide and their candidate was simply overwhelmed.

Woodstock, the county seat of Carleton, gave 400 majority for Col. Melville, and he also carried Andover, the county seat of Victoria, and in one rural poll in Carleton he had a small majority. In all other districts the farmers' candidate carried the day with a sweep. It was certainly a great victory for Mr. Caldwell and an awful black eye for the Canada-West Indies and patriotic potato politicians of the united counties.

Mr. B. Frank Smith, M. P. P., of patriotic potato fame, was the logical campaign leader of the Tories, but he saw the way the wind was blowing and contracted cold feet early in the campaign. He called a hole-and-corner meeting a few weeks ago which persuaded Dr. Rankine, of Woodstock, to enter the field. The genial doctor, after taking a squint over the ground, decided that he had not accumulated sufficient of this world's goods to enable him to sit in Parliament, and wisely dropped out of the race. The Tory machine was then appealed to and a convention was called which placed Col. Melville in the field, after Mr. Smith had once more declined.

The Tory bosses of the constituency rallied to the support of the "independent" candidate, but the main body failed to respond to the crack of the party whip and it is the main body which counts in a political campaign. Mr. Caldwell proved himself an excellent candidate and in all the rural sections of the constituency Liberals and Tories who had become weary of the existing state of affairs rallied to his standard. The returned soldiers also entered heartily into the spirit of the occasion and assisted in rolling up a majority for the farmers' candidate. It was certainly a notable victory and the farmers of the two counties and their candidate are deserving of the heartiest congratulations.

### THE BY-ELECTIONS.

The Unionist government lost three of the five by-elections which took place yesterday. In Quebec East, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's old constituency, Mr. Ernest Lapointe, Liberal, was returned by a majority of 3,800 over Gallibois, Labor-Liberal. In Victoria, B. C., Hon. Dr. Tolmie, the new Minister of Agriculture, defeated T. A. Bernard, the soldiers' candidate, by a majority of 2,100. In Carleton-Victoria Mr. T.

W. Caldwell, U. F. O. candidate, defeated Col. Melville, Unionist, by a majority of 3,800. In Assiniboia, Mr. Gould, U. F. O., defeated Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Liberal, by a majority of 3,700, and in Stormont-Glenarry Mr. W. J. Kennedy, the farmer candidate, led Brigadier General Hervey by 300. In the seven by-elections held during the week the government elected two members both ministers of the Crown.

The Mail, in commenting on the Carleton-Victoria by-election on Friday last, said: "The old-time Tories of Carleton county are confidently predicting the election of Col. Melville by a large majority. If they would stop to think a moment they would probably arrive at the conclusion that if there had been the ghost of a chance of winning the seat B. Frank Smith would have grabbed the nomination." Mr. Smith, with rare good judgment, declined the nomination. In other words he "passed the buck" to Col. Melville.

Col. Melville, the rejected, of Carleton-Victoria, is a man of "many parts." He went overseas as a Tory, but returned as an independent. He ran in Carleton-Victoria as a Unionist, but was prepared to give the government only an independent support. He claimed to be a staunch friend of the farmers, but the *Hart and Observer* looked up the records and found that his only connection with agriculture had relation to that modern South Sea Bubble, the Canada-West Indies Company.

The Standard has been telling its readers all along that Premier Foster and Hon. Mr. Tweeddale were in bad with the electors of Victoria county, and that the people of that county were going to take a slam at their local members by rallying to the support of Col. Melville. The returns show that the electors of Victoria did not do a thing to the gallant Colonel. In one large polling division he failed to get a single vote, the score standing 133 to 0.

The Standard's "young Irish lawyer from Grand Falls," who presided at the Unionist convention, and who wired the organ optimistic reports from Victoria during the campaign, seems to rank high as a blind guide and false prophet. It is extremely doubtful if he is ever again given another chance to preside at a Tory Unionist convention.

As a result of the by-election in Carleton-Victoria, the New Brunswick portfolio in the cabinet is likely to remain vacant for some time longer. At last accounts Chief Justice Hazen had about made up his mind to remain on the bench.

All the provinces are doing splendidly and the Dominion executive are most optimistic of the final results as shown by the premier performance. The Dominion special subscriptions committee reported on Monday subscriptions totalling \$66,950,000. All of these large subscriptions are not yet entered in the books and allocated according to the wishes of the subscriber to the various provinces and districts.

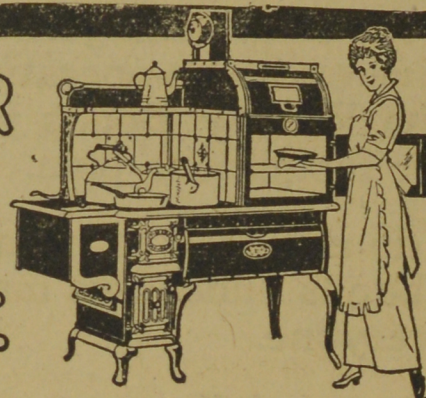

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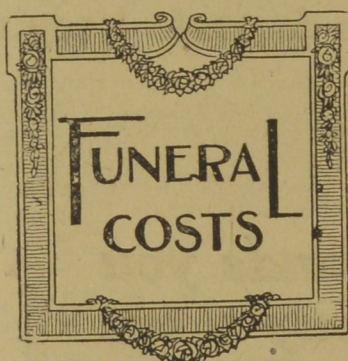

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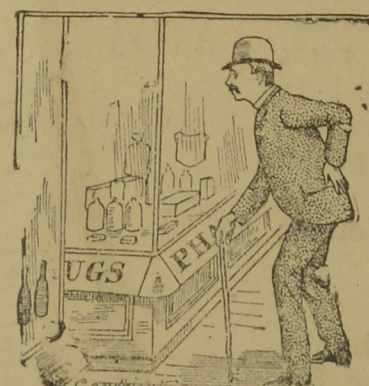
