UNIONIST CANDIDATES WAS OVERWHELMINGLY BEATEN

Col. Melville Was Caught By a Landslide in Carleton-Victoria—Mr. T. W. Caldwell the U. F. O. Candidate Elected By Nearly 4,000 Majority—Result of the Election a Big Surprise—Unionist Candidate Loses His Deposit.

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 27—By-election results did not cause much surprise at the capital tonight. The five constituencies in which contests took place went about as anticipated, the chief surprise being the size of the U.F.O. majority in Carleton-Victoria, while reports from Victoria, B. C. indicated a strenuous fight, there were few who thought that on H. S. F. Tolmie the new minister of agriculture was likely to be defeated.

The net result of the by-election is that while the government loses three seats carried by the Unionists in 1917 the regular opposition has not been strengthened. In the three seats lost to the government, Victoria-Carleton, Gengarry-Stormont, and Assiniboia, United Farmers candidates have been elected to sit on the cross benches. In 1917 Victoria-Carleton elected Hon. F. B. Carvell by acclamation and Gengarry-Stormont did the same thing for John McMartin, Unionist. In Assiniboia, J. G. Turiff, Unionist now in the senate was elected by a majority of over four thousand. The seat now goes to Mr. Gould, the Farmer candidate who took it over a Liberal, the Unionists not having a candidate in the field.

Lapointe's Majority

Ernest Lapointe's election in Quebec East has been conceded since his nomination. His majority will not equal that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1917, when the then opposition leader had a majority of over six thousand. The Liberal as the result of the by-elections, including the acclamation of Hon. MacKenzie King in Prince, P. E. I., stand where they did after the general election by retaining Prince and Quebec east. The government retains Kingston which returned Sir Henry Drayton by acclamation, and Victoria, B. C., but loses Assiniboia, Gengarry Stormont and Carleton-Victoria. In North Ontario which was a government seat the voting is still to take place.

N. B. Farmers Win

Woodstock, Oct. 27—Thomas W. Caldwell candidate of the United Farmers' party was elected to the house of commons as the representative of the constituency of Victoria-Carleton in the by-election which was held today to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. F. B. Carvell on the latter's appointment as chairman of the dominion railway board. Opposed to Mr. Caldwell was Lieut.-Col. W. W. Melville, Unionist nominee. There were no other candidates, the Liberals having decided against putting a man in the field and Mrs. Adney having failed to file her papers.

Returns are incomplete tonight but the figures received from the various polling places which were available show a total of 6,925 for Mr. Caldwell and 3,042 for Col. Melville, giving a majority of 3,883 for the farmers' candidate, and indicating that his opponent may lose his deposit. Another unofficial count not quite complete, makes the majority 3,596 but the United Farmers claim a majority of 3,596. Colonel Melville's only majorities were in towns of Woodstock and Andover.

and a large vote was polled. There was little excitement in Woodstock during the day, but throughout the rural districts interest was at a high pitch. The returns were awaited this evening with intense eagerness and the result, at least so far as the size of the majority was concerned, seemed to be a complete surprise to every one, the most optimistic forecast by Mr. Caldwell's supporters having been an estimate of a majority of 1000.

In Victoria

Victoria, Oct. 27—Dr. F. S. Tolmie, federal minister of agriculture was re-elected to the house of commons today by a majority of about 2,100 over T. A. Barnard, a returned soldier, who ran as a candidate of the Federal Labor party.

The contest was a sharp one and many meetings were held which drew crowds and the keenest interest was displayed by the polling of the unprecedented total of more than 11,000 votes.

Quebec East

Quebec, Oct. 27—Ernest Lapointe, who recently resigned his seat in the house of commons for Kamouraska, to run on a Liberal ticket in Quebec East to succeed Sir Wilfrid Laurier was returned today by a majority of 3,852 votes over his opponent F. X. Galibois who lost his deposit.

Considerable interest was manifested in the election although it is estimated that of the 13,500 electors in the constituency scarcely more than half the votes were polled. Both candidates made special appeals to the ladies and a considerable number of women voters went to the polls.

Mr. Lapointe was acclaimed by hundreds of electors after the results were known. He addressed them in the Garde Champlain Hall, thanking them for the victory and assuring them that he would do all in his power to continue in the footsteps of Laurier and to promote the best interests of Quebec.


Mr. Galibois stated after the election that he had lost everything but his honor and added that the Liberals could no longer boast of the purity of their tactics.

Gengarry-Stormont

Ottawa, Oct. 27—Kennedy, U. F. O. leads Hervey, Unionist, by 300 majority in Gengarry-Stormont. Cornwall gives Hervey 1,432 majority, but rural parts evidently going to farmers' candidate.




