ENCOURAGING RESULTS FOR VICTORY LOAN

**C. M. B. A. SUBSCRIPTION
TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND**

**Obtained Through W. E. Farrell,
Grand Trustee—Can-
vassers Making Satis-
factory Progress.**

Reports from the various districts of York County District re the Victory Loan campaign are very encouraging so early in the campaign. One district outside of Fredericton has reported \$10,000 so far subscribed to Victory bonds while another district not so populous has reported \$4,000. This shows the interest that is being taken in the campaign throughout the country. The city is also forging ahead and in one of the wards the canvassers report that some \$16,000 worth of bonds have already been subscribed.

C. M. B. A. Donation

One of the most encouraging features of the campaign so far recorded is the subscription of \$25,000 for Victory bonds from the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association through one of its Grand Trustees W. E. Farrell. In past campaigns such subscriptions of the C. M. B. A. have gone to Upper Canadian cities but through the practical interest and energetic work of Mr. Farrell the amount of \$25,000 will be credited to York County.

At the local office Dr. D. W. Roberts and staff are very well pleased with the way in which subscribers are coming in. One woman a widow with a son of twelve years of age showed her patriotism. She stated that she had been saving up her money to get her son a fitting Christmas present and after due deliberation had considered that she could do nothing better than buy a Victory Bond for him.

WERNER HORN'S CASE WAS BEGUN HERE TODAY

**WITNESSES WERE
DELAYED BY TRAIN**

**Counsel Probably Assigned for
Horn's Defence—W. G.
Clark Foreman of
Grand Jury.**

Werner Horn, the German charged with dynamiting the C.P.R. bridge across the St. Croix River came before the Court of King's Bench here today, His Honor Judge Barry presiding. Owing to the fact that witnesses from McAdam came on the C. P. R. train which was not due until noon, Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne was the only witness who went before the Grand Jury.

The matter of counsel for Horn still is undecided. No person appeared on his behalf this morning and it is expected that Judge Barry will assign him counsel in the event of the Grand Jury bringing in a true bill as is expected.
