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A SILVER TONGUED ORATOR

The late Sir Wilfrid Laurier was beyond a doubt the greatest orator in Canadian public life, and had few, if any, superiors in the British Empire. Many eloquent tributes have been paid to him since his sudden death a week ago, but none have surpassed the beautiful tribute which Sir Wilfrid paid to the late Sir John Macdonald, when he passed away twenty-eight years ago. Speaking from his place in parliament on that occasion, Sir Wilfrid said:

"The place of Sir John Macdonald in this country was so large and so absorbing that it is almost impossible to conceive that the political life of this country, the fate of this country, can continue without him. His loss overwhelms us. For my part, I say with all truth that his loss overwhelms me, and it also overwhelms this parliament, as if indeed one of the institutions of the land had given way. Sir John Macdonald now belongs to the ages, and it can be said with certainty that the career which has just closed is one of the most remarkable careers of this century. It would be premature at this time to attempt to fix or anticipate what will be the final judgment of history upon him; but there were in his career and in his life features so prominent and so conspicuous that already they shine with a glow which time cannot alter, which even now appear before the eye, such as they will appear to the end of history. I think it can be asserted that for the supreme art of governing men Sir John Macdonald was gifted as few men in any land or in any age were gifted—gifted with the highest of all qualities, qualities which would have made him famous wherever exercised, and which would have shone all the more conspicuously the larger the theatre. The fact that he would congregate together elements the most heterogeneous and blend them into one compact party, and to the end of his life keep them steadily under his hand, is perhaps altogether unprecedented. The fact that during all those years he retained unimpaired not only the confidence but the devotion—the ardent devotion—and affection of his party, is evidence that besides those higher qualities of statesmanship to which we were daily witnesses, he was also endowed with those inner, subtle, undefinable graces of the soul which win and keep the hearts of men."

It will be generally admitted that Sir Wilfrid's graceful words, spoken in reference to the great Conservative leader, are singularly applicable to his own case.

Plans for the proposed new department of public health were discussed at a conference in Ottawa yesterday between prominent medical men and J. H. Keefer, M. P., parliamentary under secretary for external affairs, representing the government. That a bill to create such a department will be brought down during the session was intimated in the speech from the throne. It is proposed to take the work of organization in hand with the least possible delay.

Twenty two members of the National Women's Party, carrying suffrage banners, were arrested in front of the State House at Boston Monday, when they refused to comply with orders of the police to move on. The women were charged with failing to obey a city ordinance. They had taken their position in front of the reviewing stand several hours before the presidential parade was due to pass. Some carried banners with characteristic inscriptions and others displayed suffragette colors.

Toronto Globe: A British House of Commons without Asquith, Grey, Simon, Samuel, McKenna, Runciman, and Harcourt is intellectually weaker than its predecessor, but men of this calibre are never long out of public life in Britain. There are always constituencies ready to rise above parochialism and welcome distinguished outsiders. Few eminent British public men even live in the constituencies which they represent.

The Liberal caucus at Ottawa yesterday selected Mr. D. D. McKenzie, M. P., for North Cape Breton, as temporary leader, pending a selection to be made at a national convention to be called after the close of the session of parliament. Mr. MacKenzie was Sir Wilfrid's desk mate in the last parliament. He is a prominent Cape Breton lawyer, of Scotch extraction, and was at one time a county court judge. He will be assisted in his duties by a parliamentary committee of which Mr. J. A. Robb is chairman.

The total number of Canadians taken prisoners of war was 3,729, of which 236 were officers. The number so far repatriated consists of: Officers, 201; other ranks, 3,080, making a total of 3,281.

DIVISION No. 1—For all voters residing or owning property above the northwest centre line of Carleton Street prolonged, at or near the City Hall, in the said City.

DIVISION No. 2—For all voters residing or owning property in the remainder of the said City, at or near the County Court House, in said City.

NOMINATIONS

Every candidate for the office of Mayor or Alderman shall be qualified to vote at the election for which he is nominated, and shall be nominated in writing by at least TWO ratepayers residing in the City of Fredericton, and qualified to vote at the ensuing election for which such candidate is nominated.

Every nomination paper (with the certificate of the City Treasurer shall be filed with the City Clerk or at his office and not later than four o'clock on the afternoon of Monday, the third day of March, 1919, and the City Clerk, before receiving such nomination paper, shall ascertain from the same that the requirements of the Election Act have been complied with.

No candidate is qualified to be nominated for Alderman unless at the time of the nomination he is a resident of the Ward for which he is nominated. The acceptance of each candidate and the signatures of at least TWO resident qualified voters, who must sign the nomination paper, shall be proved by a witness by affidavit attached to the nomination.

In case of a contest, each elector shall be entitled to vote for ONE candidate for Mayor, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Wellington Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for St. Ann's Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Carleton Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Queen's Ward, and for ONE candidate for Alderman for King's Ward.

TURNS UP AT CONFERENCE

Dublin, Feb. 25.—Zan Busan O'Cealligh, who yesterday presented himself at the peace conference at Paris as an accredited envoy of the Irish government, was formerly in business here and was secretary of the Gaelic League. He was not prominent in the disorders on Easter Sunday, 1916, but was deported immediately after the government had suppressed that rebellion. He was released in December, 1916, but re-arrested in February, 1917, but not detained very long.

He was not placed under arrest last May when many members of his party were placed in jail.

O'Cealligh was elected to parliament on the Sinn Fein ticket in the recent elections. He was married last year to Miss Mary Ryan, professor of modern languages at the National University.

ELECTED HONORARY PRESIDENT
Fredericton Tourist Association to Publish 15,000 Booklets.

A meeting of the Fredericton Tourist Association was held yesterday afternoon at the office of Mr. R. H. Simonds, Secretary of the Board of Trade. Those present were Ald. T. S. Wilkinson, J. J. McCaffrey and F. B. Edgecombe. It was decided to order 15,000 copies of the new booklet instead of 10,000 and to change the color of the booklet from green to khaki. Hon. W. E. Foster was elected Honorary President of the Association and Hon. E. A. Smith, Minister of Lands and Mines, Honorary Member. The Association considered numerous advertising schemes but came to no decision concerning them. The absence of comfortable steamers along the river forced the Association to eliminate references to river boats, as a tourist attraction, from the booklet.

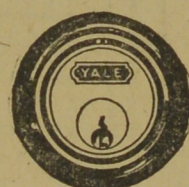
