

## OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

### APRON POSSIBILITIES.

The Bride May Wear Something Coquettish, but the Average Housekeeper Wants Something Practical.

An apron is really a pretty and a charming thing when its artistic possibilities are considered. Usually it is the little bride who affects aprons that have charm; her morning aprons are tricky affairs of pink striped material with a smart flare in the skirt part and a coquettish little bib above the waist line—and very crisp ends that tie in a big bow behind.

An older housekeeper would feel a bit foolish in such an apron, even if when she goes to a matinee she wears a dainty blouse quite as youthful as any the little bride would select.

The house apron of the average good housekeeper is made of checked gingham with narrow belt band that pins at the back. This unbeautiful but extremely practical affair is donned when household labors demand protection of the gown, but you seldom catch the housekeeper at the front door in it, as sometimes you catch the little bride in her bewitchingly becoming pink print apron.

But every house apron can have the qualities of grace and becomingness. Why wear checked brown gingham if pale blue chambray matches one's eyes, or blue checked gingham if a shade of pink print will set off one's complexion?

And why a straight, shapeless apron when a really smart one with circular shaped skirt with a bib with extensions that button at the back of the neck can be obtained at modest price or manufactured in an hour or two in the home sewing room?

### HOUSEWIFE'S SCRAPBOOK.

If the fire is dull and the meat must be broiled in a hurry, drop a handful of salt on the fire and you will speedily have a clear fire.

To clean faucets use sand with a small amount of water. When through rub briskly with a woolen rag.

For cleansing rugs, dampen with ammonia in soapy water. It makes the rugs look bright and new.

Warm tights for the youngsters may be made from one or two pairs of discarded stockings.

When boiling fresh fish put a drop of vinegar to the water. It makes the fish white and firm.

If you want to serve the sirloin or rib roast rare, allow scant fifteen minutes to the pound in cooking. A five-pound piece should be done in sixty-five minutes. If you desire it well done it will require twenty minutes to the pound.

If there is no library paste at hand, add one and a half teaspoonfuls of flour to a cup of water and stir until perfectly smooth. Then cook it five minutes and you will have a good substitute.

After frying fish or onions, throw tea leaves and left-over tea into the pan, add water if necessary and a little washing soda and let it boil. This will remove all odor.

One housekeeper uses the potato ricer to cream the butter for cake. It saves time and labor and has excellent results.

An inexpensive chocolate cake is made with one cup of sugar, a quarter cupful of shortening, one cup sour milk, one teaspoonful of soda, one tablespoonful of cocoa, one and a half cupfuls of flour, one teaspoonful of vanilla extract and a half-teaspoonful of cloves.

Boiling is one of the most satisfactory methods of preparing the cheaper cuts of meat. To secure best results entirely submerge the meat into rapidly boiling water. Let it boil hard for five minutes and then reduce the heat nearly one half. Continued rapid boiling will destroy the connective tissues and make the meat hard and tough. For boiling select a piece of the round, the clod or the lower end of the loin.

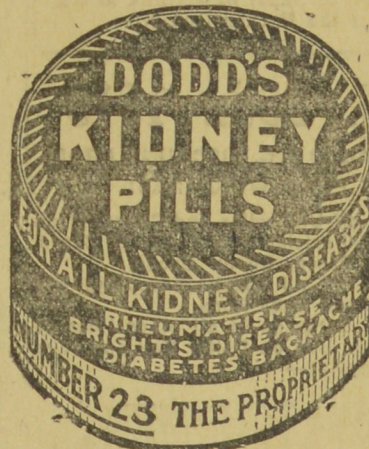
## WHY BELGIANS STILL NEED HELP

"In travelling through Belgium with the Belgian armies, I have been able to see the country recently tenanted by the Bochs in the condition in which they left it, and never was there such desolation anywhere. One cannot get away from signs of destruction, no matter where one goes, along the country roads or in the city streets.

Not only has property been destroyed and every means of livelihood taken away from the people, but the peasants, especially in the country districts, have been left destitute both of home and food. We travelled twelve miles yesterday through open country and as but one small instance of the vast plundering of the Germans, let me state that in all twelve miles not one solitary live animal did we see, and practically every tree had been felled, so you can imagine the dreary aspect of the scenery.

All the peasant women and children we met on our way, said a news correspondent, while they greeted us with cheers and received us into their homes with open arms, those that had homes, showed the greatest suffering from insufficient food and nourishment. They did not complain, but merely stated as a fact that they had not tasted meat for two months and had lived largely on soup and coffee.

## ARRESTS MADE IN HOLD UP AT EVERETT, MASS.

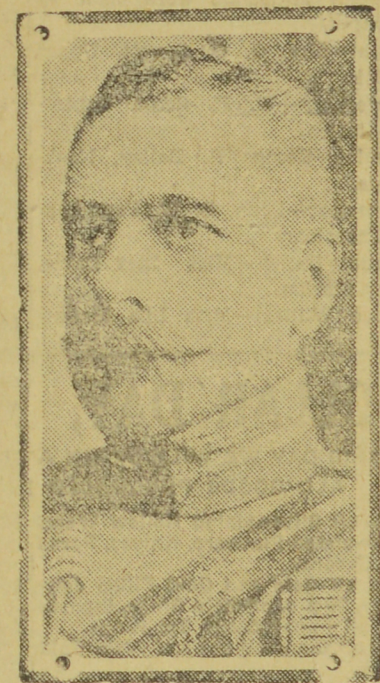
Everett, Mass., Feb. 24.—Charles S. Whittemore, general auditor for the General Electric Company, was arrested at his home in Malden today on a charge of conspiracy and assault in connection with the attack on Frank D. Brown, assistant paymaster at the plant of the company, who was held up on December 20th last and robbed of the weekly pay-roll, amounting to \$12,000.

Louis Bennett, of Boston, and Chas. Moratill, alias Charles Celeste, also were arrested today in the same connection, a charge of assault being placed against them. Four men who were arrested in New York are already under indictment.

Brown was on his way from a bank here to the company's plant, riding in an auto, with the money for the weekly pay in a leather handbag, when another machine suddenly drew across the roadway and Brown's driver had to come to a halt. Almost immediately half a dozen men stepped out and forced Brown to deliver the bag. Their appearance was so sudden that neither Brown nor a guard riding with him had opportunity to resist.

As the highwaymen turned and motored away one of them fired point-blank at Brown, seriously wounding him. He recovered after several weeks.

While a lot of literature is sent out from Ottawa each week on "soldiers' re-establishment," many of the returned men are having some trouble in finding employment. The various schemes of the government seem to be all right in theory, but are not working out just right in practice. Much more might be accomplished for the returned soldiers if the government authorities would co-operate with the Boards of Trade in various cities and towns.

### PROGRESS THE WATCHWORD

Sir Edmund Walker, President of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, in his annual address to the stockholders of that great financial institution, said:

"Progress appears to be the watchword in New Brunswick. The Department of Agriculture has the whole-hearted support of the Government, and is giving the farmers of the province inspiring leadership. This is evidenced by a general increase in production, the amount of land cultivated in 1918 being 125,000 acres more than in 1917. Of this increase 33,000 acres were planted in oats, 34,000 acres (or 200 per cent increase) in wheat, and 13,000 acres in turnips and potatoes. The potato crop is estimated at 8,650,000 bushels, somewhat below the average, but 50 per cent, more than in 1917. The yield of hay was good and that of oats and wheat excellent, but of only fair quality owing to the bad weather which prevailed during harvesting. Reference was made in our report last year to the effort being made under government auspices to improve the quality and number of live stock. This policy has been continued, with specially good success in the case of sheep."
