

ARRANGEMENTS FOR MILITARY DISPLAY MCH. 6

**CAPT. R. SMITH WILL
COMMAND GUARD HONOR**

**Lieuts. Deane and Holder Sub-
alterns—Major V. Heron,
G. S. O., in City in That
Connection.**

Major Victor Heron, G. S. O. arrived in the city last evening on military business. He is here in connection with military matters at the District Depot. He reports that the District Depot Staff is making excellent progress under the supervision of Major H. H. Donnelly and that the work is being very successfully and satisfactorily carried out.

Opening of Legislature

While in the city Major Heron will complete the arrangements for the opening of the House of Assembly on March 6th. Two guns are being shipped here from Montreal to be used permanently for saluting purposes. The salute of thirteen guns is to be fired by a volunteer detachment of artillerymen from the District Depot, who have been in service with the artillery in France. The guard of honor together with the District Headquarters Band will arrive here on the morning of March 6th by two special cars and will be quartered at the Queen Street Barracks. They will return to St. John on the same evening. Major Heron, who was in charge of the guard of honor during the visit of His Excellency the Governor General, expects that this guard will make a far better showing than that guard did.

When asked about the Dispersal Station at St. John Major Heron stated that the opening will take place on the arrival of the 26th and 44th New Brunswick Battalions. Plans are already being made to welcome these men back to St. John.

BOARD OF HEALTH FOR YORK CO. APPOINTED SANITARY INSPECTORS AND SUB-DEPUTY REGISTRARS

Matter of Salary of Inspectors Left Until Later Date—Half of Appropriation for Sub-Deputy Registrars to be Divided Equally Among Them and Balance to be Divided in Proportion to Assessment—Some Appointments Still to be Made—New Maryland Presented Problem.

The York County Board of Health met yesterday at the County Court House and practically completed organization as far as the appointment of sub-deputy registrars and sanitary inspectors is concerned. With the exception of the Parish of St. Mary's all sub-deputy registrars were appointed and with the exception of the inspectorial area composed of the Parishes of St. Mary's, Stanley and New Maryland, all seven areas into which the county was divided, had inspectors appointed.

Dr. M. L. Jewett of Millville was the only member of the Board who was not in attendance. The members present were Dr. J. A. Wade of St. Andrews, District Medical Health Officer who is chairman, Dr. B. H. Dougan of Harvey, Coun. Alex. Brewer of Mouth of Keswick, Coun. T. W. Brewer of Dumfries and C. N. Goodspeed of Penniac. Mrs. A. O. J. Glen, the Secretary was present.

Sanitary Inspectors

The county was divided into seven areas for the purpose of sanitary inspection and inspectors were appointed for the areas as follows:

North Lake, Canterbury and McAdam—H. W. Clelland, McAdam.

Prince William, Manners Sutton and Kingsclear—S. A. Robison, Harvey.

Dumfries, Queensbury and Southampton—Norman Lawrence.

Bright and Douglas, Beverley Lawrence, Burt's Corner.

St. Mary's, Stanley and New Maryland—To be appointed.

Devon—Town Marshal, Leo. Hayes.

Marysville—Samuel Stafford, Jr.

Sub-Deputy Registrars

To Be Appointed Later

Mr. Goodspeed has under consideration the appointment of a sub-deputy registrar for St. Mary's and of a sanitary inspector for the area comprising Stanley, St. Mary's and New Maryland. It is probable that Napudogan although located in Douglas will be dealt with as part of that area. Mr. Stafford appointed both sub-deputy registrar and sanitary inspector for the Town of Marysville, was chairman of the Board of Health which that town formerly had. In Devon the Town Marshal will combine with his existing duties those of sanitary inspector and the Town Clerk Wm. Jaffrey will be sub-deputy registrar. New Maryland presented a problem in the creation of areas but finally was united to Stanley and St. Mary's.

Matter of Salaries

In the matter of salaries for the sanitary inspectors the Board reached no decision and will consider the matter at a later date. In the matter of salaries for the sub-deputy registrars half the appropriation of \$400 was taken to be divided among the registrars and the balance will be apportioned according to the assessment valuation of the various areas.

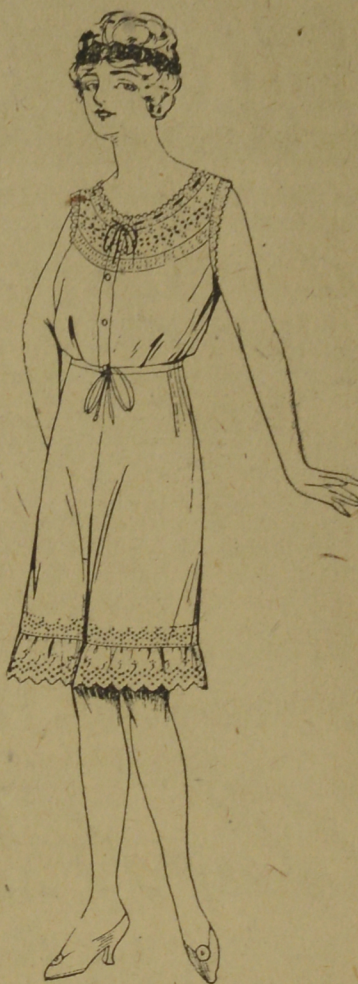
