

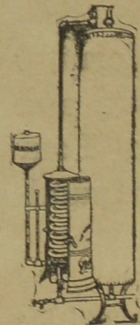

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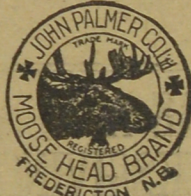

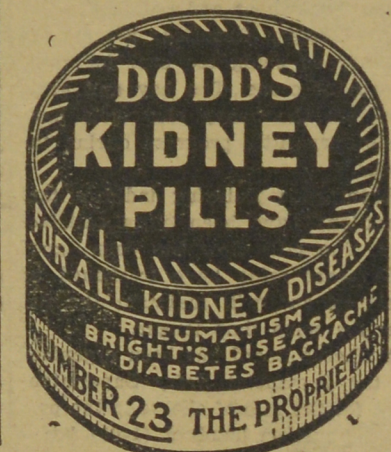

A NEW TRACK RECORD PUT UP YESTERDAY BY ADIOO GUY IN THE FREE-FOR-ALL—GREAT RACING

Exposer, Owned by H. C. Jewett, of Fredericton, Put Up New Stallion Trotting Record of 2.14 1/4, for Maritime Provinces
New Track Record by Adioo Guy, 2.11 1/2—Tommy Cotter Beat Exposer Out in 2.16 After Five Heats—Large Attendance and Interest in Racing at Highest Pitch.

There was another big crowd at the race track yesterday afternoon and it saw some of the best racing ever pulled off in Fredericton. Among the special features offered were two heats better than track record, which now stands at 2.11 1/2, the time made by Adioo Guy yesterday in the first heat of the Free-for-all. The Halifax horse did the second heat in 2.12, also better than the record. A nother feature was a new trotting record for stallions in the Maritime Provinces by Exposer, owned by H. C. Jewett, of this city. Exposer made the new mark of 2.14 1/4 in the third heat of the 2.16. The previous record was 2.15 1/4, made at Halifax by Mayor Todd.

Much Speculation Indulged In.

It is said that the speculation on yesterday's races was the heaviest ever experienced in this city and greatly exceeded expectations. The St. John sports were bumped rather hard in the Free-for-all, as they backed Peter Farren heavily, but Adioo Guy had the race in hand at all stages. In the 2.16, however, they got their own back, for Tommy Cotter won from Exposer in the fifth heat. A win by the Fredericton stallion would have been very popular, but as it was the close finish between him and Tommy Cotter brought the crowd to its feet yelling.

Greatest Race on Track.

The Free-for-all is generally conceded to be the greatest race ever run on the local track and the advance notices which it received were not too highly colored. A faster field never faced a starter in this part of Canada. The first heat was the fastest. The horse got away to a poor start after scoring six times. The time was 2.11 1/2, one and a half seconds better than the previous track record. Peter Farren broke badly in this heat, a fault which he displayed at various times during the race, and John A. Hal finished second.

In the second heat it looked for a while as if the St. John crowd was going to see its favorite take a heat, for Peter Farren closed on Adioo Guy and passed him on the back stretch of the first half mile, leading at the wire. In the second half Adioo Guy showed what he had by passing Peter Farren on the back stretch and winning handily. In the third heat John A. Hal and Peter Farren both went off their feet at the first turn. The Hal horse recovered himself, however, and took the lead. He broke, however, under the wire at the end of the first half. Peter Farren then came to the front and pressed Adioo Guy hard, but the Halifax horse had a good margin.

The 2.20 Mixed Class

The 2.20 Mixed Class went four heats. Jubilee won the first in the fastest time of the race but failed to get a better position than fourth after that. Siska T. won the next three heats, Jubilee breaking in the second heat and not showing very well in the others. Bravas won third money being second in each heat.

The 2.16 a Hummer

The 2.16 went five heats and was a hummer from start to finish. The showing of Exposer caused many to back him and as Tommy Cotter had a strong following there was some excitement in the last heat when Cotter won the heat race and first money. The race was between these two. Jesse H. and Jenny Penn were ruled out after the third heat and Carry A. and Little Gillagh after the fourth. The third heat in which Exposer put up the new stallion record was one of the best of the day Tommy Cotter making him race right to the wire. The final heat saw the two horses away to a bad start but Driver Dryden nodded for the word. It looked as if Exposer had the race sure until the second half when Cotter came up on the back stretch and took the lead. The two horses raced right to the wire but Exposer did not seem to have the reserve speed and Tommy Cotter had about ten feet to spare.

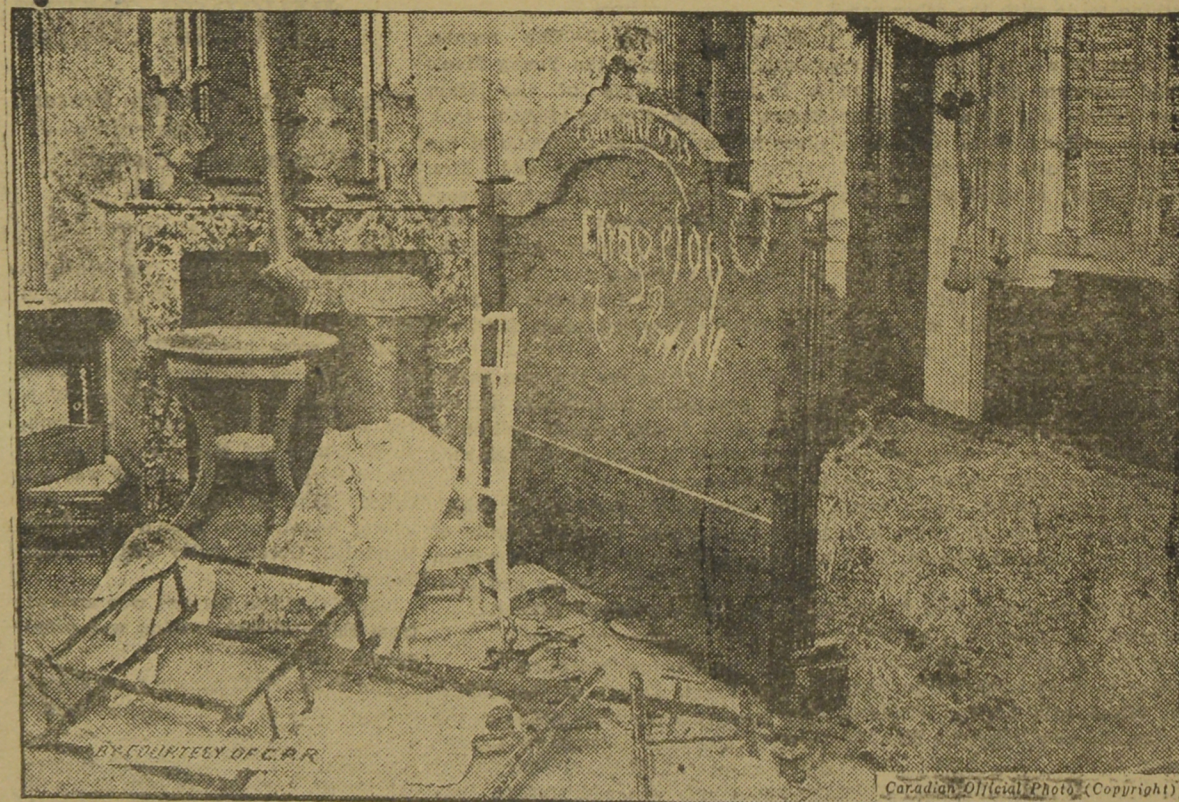
