## INTERESTING REPORTS AT PRESBYTERIAL MEETING

Substantial Progress Made in the Home Mission Field — A Strong Plea on Behalf of the Girls — An Excellent Address by Miss Robb, on Missionary Work in Korea—Dr. Kenneth Baird Also Gave an Address.

The Wednesday afternoon session of the Presbyterial opened with Mrs. John Thompson in the chair. The devotional exercises were led by Mrs. W. S. Morrison with a short prayer by Miss Jennie Robb of Korea. The minutes of the morning meeting were read by Mrs. James Ross, the acting secretary and were followed by the Secretary's report for the year by Mrs. Ross.

She referred to the death of the Honorary President of the Presbyterial, Miss Grace Stevens, dwelling upon the beautiful character portrayed by Miss Stevens in her work. She regretted the removal from the position of President of Mrs. J. H. A. Anderson but congratulated the Miramichi Presbytery in gaining such a valued member. She also referred to the removal from the position of Secretary of Miss Barbara Walker, who has held that position for some eleven years. She reported excellent progress in the work of the many auxiliaries and the increase in those taking the missionary studies. To offset these there was a decided falling off in membership and a decrease in the number of delegates taking the "Message."

### Home Mission Report

The Home Mission Report was delivered by Mrs. R. A. Jamieson. Out of forty-four auxiliaries thirty-five had done their share in contributing to Home Mission Work. Mrs. Jamieson urged a greater effort in order to meet the need for mission work at home.

### Deaconess Work

Miss Cora Sinclair, the Deaconess delivered her seventh annual report describing the work carried on during the year in St. John. A plea was made by Miss Sinclair for more earnest work for unfortunate girls and little children and for better conditions in prisons. At the close of her address a vote of thanks to Miss Sinclair was moved.

A splendid address was given by Miss Josephine Strothard, superintendent of the Maritime Home for Girls at Truro dealing with the class of girls admitted to the Home, their work and the treatment in the Home. Miss Strothard made a very strong plea for girls who live in vicious surroundings and are contaminated by their environment.

### Forward Movement

Mrs. R. A. Jamieson then gave an excellent address on the Forward Movement and charts showing the work. The charts were divided as follows:

- I. History of the Women's Missionary Society.
- II. The Achievements.
- III. Foreign Missionary Problem.
- IV. Canada for Christ.
- V. Forward Movement.
- VI. Our Own Responsibility.

Mrs. R. D. Ross spoke a few words in appreciation of Mrs. Jamieson's very helpful address which was followed by suggestions given by Mrs. James Ross concerning a canvass for more W. M. S. members.

### Work at Minto

Miss Murphy then delivered an address dealing with the work being done for foreign children at Minto. She spoke of the terrible suffering during the influenza epidemic and the many difficulties which had to be overcome by those performing the work.

### Wednesday Evening Session

Owing to the absence of Rev. Principal McKinnon of Halifax and Rev. Mr. Armstrong, the Associate Foreign Missions Secretary of Toronto, the services of Rev. Mr. McPherson, of Nashwaak and Stanley, Moderator of St. John Presbytery, Miss Robb of Korea and Dr. K. A. Baird of this city were solicited to address the assembled delegates at St. Paul's Presbyterian Church.

Rev. Mr. McPherson conveyed the best wishes of the Presbytery of St. John for a successful meeting to the women delegates and thanked them all for the splendid class of work they were doing. He stated that he had been present at the sessions and that from what he saw the men of the Church had much to learn from the women regarding the successful conducting of meetings.

He was followed by Miss Robb of Korea who gave an excellent address dealing with the nature of the work conducted among the Koreans. She spoke of the great blessing the work had been and how over 210,000 Prot-

estant Koreans and 80,000 Roman Catholic Koreans had been brought to Christ. About thirteen Presbyteries and one General Assembly are at present established in Korea. One of the principal causes of the rapid Christianization of the Koreans was the wide itineration of the first missionaries to Korea in travelling through all parts of the country settling down in each place for a short period. Over one million and a half copies of the Scriptures have been translated for the benefit of the people by the British and American Bible Societies. Bible Classes were first formed for the benefit of the Koreans which were later remodelled into Bible Institutes which sometimes lasted the greater part of the year.

### Japanese Question

Miss Robb then dealt with the seizure of Korea following the Russo-Japanese War in 1905. She described the subjection of the Koreans and the events from that time on which led to the Korean uprisings of March in this year. She told of the horrible cruelty practiced by the Japs in putting down the uprising. In ending her address she referred to the extensive work yet to be done and asked for the cooperation of all the local societies in its performance.

Dr. Kenneth A. Baird of this city followed with a splendid address dealing with the types of Christianity. He referred to the origin of the Presbyterian Church and dealt with the expansion of Christianity through the centuries. He referred to the mistaken idea many people held of the Foreign Missionary work stating that they often placed the conditions of Pioneer Missionaries in place of those of the present day.

Following Dr. Baird's address a full communion service was held by Rev. J. S. Sutherland in which all the delegates and other members of the Church present were asked to partake.

a man was not fit to be a representative.

Coun. Pat Graham was opposed to establishing a Home.

Coun. Fox favored deferring action until the new council should come in.

Coun. Stairs favored a Municipal Home. Two years ago he had changed his view. He was willing to go before the people on that issue or to take a plebiscite. He believed Southampton would go into it.

Coun. Jones said the discussion was out of order.

Coun. Thompson said the motion had been put and passed. Reconsideration was all that could be taken up.

### Reconsideration

Coun. Cowperthwaite moved reconsideration and the motion was carried.

Coun. Cowperthwaite said he favored a Home from a business point of view. It would be much more economical than the existing system. Some suggested that it be called Home for Aged and Infirm.

Coun. Fox seconded by Coun. Manuel moved that consideration be postponed until the January session. The election in September would give an opportunity of placing the matter before the electors.

Coun. Walker wanted action at once.

Coun. Everett said the legislation had been secured in underhand fashion and the working of a Municipal Home was not all it was said to be as the record in St. John showed.

Coun. Allen strongly advocated immediate action.

Coun. Pond could see no reason for postponing action.

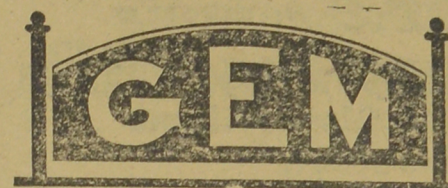
Coun. Stairs said that if the Municipal Home was established by some of the parishes the other parishes never would come in. For that reason there should be postponement until January.

Coun. Dougan said Councillors should be willing to decide without reference to their constituents for they were elected to decide just such matters.

Coun. Cowperthwaite wanted a plebiscite taken on the question.

Adjournment was made without action on the motion.
