

COL. GUTHRIE HAS LOCATED IN BOSTON

**BOSTON GLOBE ON
HIS MILITARY CAREER**

**Has Applied for Naturalization
Papers and Will Practice
His Profession at
The Hub.**

The Boston Globe of July 2 contains the following concerning Lieut. Col. P. A. Guthrie, which will no doubt be read with interest by his Fredericton friends:

Lieut. Col. Percy A. Guthrie, the first Canadian to enlist following the declaration of war, and who organized and commanded the New England-Canadian Regiment, the MacLean Kilties, likes Boston so well that he has taken out first citizenship papers. He intends to form a legal partnership with James D. Colt of Colt & Newell, Brilliant Lawyer.

Col. Guthrie started his career as a brilliant criminal lawyer in Fredericton, N. B. Just previous to the war he won several criminal cases which attracted widespread attention. When the war began he placed across the door of his office a sign which said, "Gone for the duration of the war," and enlisted by telegraph.

At Ypres

He went abroad as a lieutenant colonel, and at Ypres passed through a gas attack from which in one battalion 83 men and four officers came out alive of an original complement of 1067 men. He received 27 wounds and was blinded. Later he recovered his sight and became active in recruiting.

He became familiar to New England men when he organized here the 236th Overseas Battalion, or the McLean Kilties. In March 1918, this battalion reached France, where its members were distributed among other battalions.

Col. Guthrie was transferred to the Black Watch and remained with it until the end of the war.

Massachusetts Bar

He has applied to the Massachusetts State Bar for permission to practice. By securing the indorsement both of the Chief Justice of his own Province and of Massachusetts lawyers, he can receive permission to practice law here pending naturalization.

Col. Guthrie has a wife and three children at Fredericton, N. B. who will remain there until he has arranged a home for them in Boston.

SUBORDINATE BODIES REPORT GREAT ACTIVITY

**PRESBYTERIAL AGAIN
IN SESSION TODAY**

Special Grant for Work at Minto—Change in Regard to the Grace Stevens Memorial Fund.

The Thursday morning session of the Presbyterial opened with the usual Devotional exercises by Mrs. B. A. Gough which were followed by the reading of the minutes of yesterday's meetings by Mrs. James Ross.

Mission Bands

The report of the Mission Bands was given by Mrs. B. A. Gough. Thirty two of the Mission Bands had adopted the Thank Offering, twenty the study book, twenty the message and thirteen the mite-box. Eighteen reported increased membership. The work on the whole was very good as outlined by the reports and the Juniors deserve much credit for their fine showing.

Young Ladies' Branches

The Young Ladies' Branch report was delivered by Mrs. R. C. Crulshank of St. John. No new branches had been organized and the prospects of opening several had been interfered with by the influenza epidemic. The branches all showed good progress both the interest in the work and the membership increasing.

The reports were then continued showing the donations to the Foreign and Home Missionary Funds. Moncton showed the largest increase and the Young Ladies Club of the First Church Hest St. John showed the largest increase in membership. The Student Missionary Conference at Wolfville, N. S. was referred to and the importance and usefulness of the training here for leadership was brought out.

A resolution was passed as follows. That a strong recommendation be sent down to the congregations of our Presbytery to pay the expenses of our delegates to the Holville Conference to secure more assistance in the work of the societies.

The Deaconess reported entire satisfaction with her work.

Treasurer's Report

The treasurers report showed as follows. Total Foreign Missionary Fund \$3,484.77; Total Home Missionary Fund, \$1,898.63; Total Missionary Fund, \$5,383.40.

Miss Murphy whose field of work is at Minto was granted \$50 to assist her in her work and a grant of \$150 was made to the Moncton Auxiliary fund to uphold the expenses in preparation of a woman missionary to Korea.

FIRST PROVINCE TO GET ACTION RE HOUSING

**ORDER-IN-COUNCIL
PASSED AT OTTAWA**

Copies of Agreement to be Forwarded to Municipalities—Inland Wharves Transferred.

Premier Foster announced at noon today that New Brunswick was the first province to have the order-in-council passed at Ottawa which would permit of action in regard to the applications made through the municipalities for assistance under the Housing Act. The Provincial Government has received a copy of the order-in-council passed by the Dominion Government. The municipalities will be furnished with copies of the agreement which must be passed by the municipal councils in order to receive financial assistance for the applicants under the Act.

Inland Wharves Transferred.

Premier Foster also announced that in accordance with legislation passed at the last session of the New Brunswick Legislature, plans of the inland wharves and wharf sites in New Brunswick had been prepared and the transfer to the Federal Department of Public Works affected. In future that department will repair and maintain the wharves.

The Provincial Government began its session last night and will complete its business tonight.

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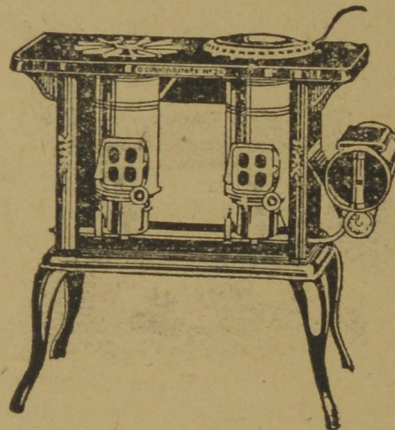
