PLANNING AHEAD.

With a Small Allowance it is Wise to  
Plan in Advance in the Matter of  
Spring Clothes.

For if she makes a mistake because of hasty decision then it doesn't matter so much, for she can buy something else and not wear the coat or frock or suit that proves not just what she wants. So for most of us now is the time to begin to take on inventory to see what we have on hand that will see us through the spring and possibly into the summer and then decide which of the many things we would like to have we can best afford to get.

And always comes the question, suit or coat? As prices are now, there are more women than ever who cannot afford both of these things every spring. Of course one of the first things to consider is what you have on hand and just what your clothes requirements will be. But another thing to consider is what sort of suits and coats you can get. For some seasons the long or separate coat would be more attractive than another season, and some seasons the suit would be available when other seasons the one piece frock would be, and then the coat would be the choice.

But if you are hesitating this year over the choice of a smart and at the same time durable fabric you cannot make a mistake either for a coat or a suit if you choose covert.

## COLORED SPORT TOGS.

Jade, brilliant green and bright clear red are the proper colors for sport togs this season. Purple some way is not quite the thing for sports. Pale yellow and orange color are all right, but better in winter than in summer. White is perhaps the best of all, perfect in summer and winter too if you can accord it.

## CHOCOLATE CREAM FILLING.

Place one cupful syrup, one cupful water, one half cupful cocoa, one half cupful cornstarch, in saucepan; dissolve the cornstarch in syrup and water, bring to a boil, cook slowly for five minutes; remove from fire and add one teaspoonful vanilla, one-half teaspoonful cinnamon. Beat to blend, and when partly cool spread between the cake, ice with water icing.

SIR LOUIS WAS

Ottawa, April 4—Sir Louis Davies chief justice of the supreme court of Canada attending parliament yesterday in his capacity as Deputy Governor-General, to assent to bills so far passed had an experience of the inconvenience of the doubtful system of time under which parliament is at present carrying on business. The Deputy Governor General was to arrive in the senate chamber at 3.30 in the afternoon. His Honor attended by Viscount Molloyneux as aide de camp was at the parliament building sharp on time—but summer time. He entered only to find that the two houses of parliament had not assembled and that he would not be required for another hour. He was compelled therefore to drive away and return when the clocks throughout the city were marking 4.30 although there was in the building only half the members.

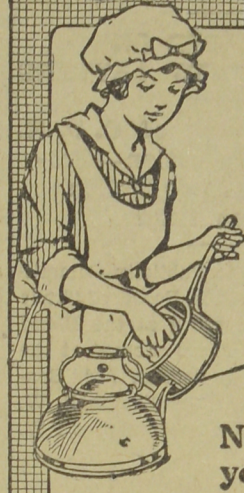

## HOUSEKEEPERS' HANDY REFERENCE

## BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Gilt Frames.—Rub with a sponge moistened with turpentine.

Drive Away Ants.—A little quicklime placed in the infested places.

Kill Insect Life.—Burn sulphur in a tightly closed room. It will kill almost all insect life and their eggs and larvae.

Make Leather Waterproof.—Saturate it with castor oil; to stop shoes squeaking, drive a peg into the middle of the sole.

Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it well with turpentine till every trace is removed.

Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with common salt.

Fruit Stains on Hands.—Wash the hands in clear water, dry slightly and while still moist strike a sulphur match and hold your hands around the flame.

Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda 1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.

Clean Gloves.—Pour a little benzine into a basin and wash the gloves in it, rubbing and squeezing them until clean. If much soiled, they must be washed again through clean benzine and rinsed in a fresh supply. Hang in the air to dry.

Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a little soda in warm water and pour in a small amount of ammonia. Hold the brushes with the bristles downward and avoid wetting the back as far as possible; shake until the grease is removed; then rinse in cold water and put in the air to dry.

Remove Stains from Linen.—Wet

the part stained and lay on it some salt of wormwood; then rub without diluting it with more water.

How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—Apply a red hot iron to the head for a short time, the screw-driver being applied immediately while the screw is hot.

Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a quart of water, strain it twice, then dip the mildewed places in this weak solution and lay in the sun. If not effective the first time repeat.

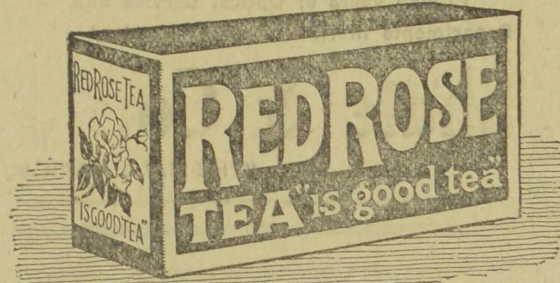
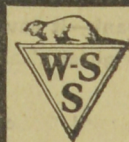
Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops of refined carbolic acid into an ounce of rose water; shake well and apply. (If you hold your breath while a mosquito has its bill in you it cannot withdraw it until you breathe again).
