

EXHIBITION TO BE GREATLY EXPANDED

NEW BUILDING WILL
BE ERECTED SHORTLY

W. E. Farrell While Away will
Confer with Hon. F. B.
Carvell on Exhibition
Matters.

Mr. W. E. Farrell accompanied by Mrs. Farrell will leave tonight for Ottawa where Mr. Farrell will attend the annual meeting of the Dominion Executive of the C. M. B. A. which will be in session Tuesday and Wednesday next. While away Mr. Farrell will confer with Hon. F. B. Carvell, Minister of Public Works, on matters connected with the Fredericton Exhibition. A settlement of the claim against the Militia Department for damages to the buildings of the exhibition is expected shortly.

New Building

The settlement of that claim will be followed by extensive building operations at the Exhibition Grounds. Agricultural Society No. 34 intends to erect a substantial building to take the place of the structure burned while troops were quartered at the buildings. This will be two stories in height and will provide additional exhibition room for motor vehicles and heavy machinery.

Many Applications Already

Concessions have been applied for already to such an extent that the main building will be entirely occupied by them. This will compel the placing of agricultural exhibits in another building and what has heretofore been used for poultry will be used for them. Poultry and horticultural exhibits are expected to be greater in this year than ever before expansion having taken place in both branches since the last exhibition in Fredericton four years ago.

MERCHANTS' LETTERS

Industrial Comm'r of C. P. R.
Asks for Information—Pro-
vince Will Have Motion
Pictures Taken.

A meeting of the Publicity Committee of the Fredericton Board of Trade was called last evening at the Board of Trade Rooms. Those present at the meeting were Ald. Barker, Ald. Baxter, G. W. Hodge, H. S. Campbell, W. T. Chestnut, F. B. Edgecombe and W. E. McMullen.

Advertising Maps Approved

Mr. McMullen submitted the proposed map to be used on the merchants' letter heads and envelopes for inspection. The proposed map was generally approved of and a few minor changes were suggested by the various members present. The map shows Fredericton's advantageous position as a distributing point.

C. P. R. Wants Information

A request was read from the Industrial Commissioner of the C. P. R. Mr. H. P. Timmerman, asking for information respecting opportunities in the city for industrial expansion. This communication was considered and the Publicity Commissioner Mr. R. H. Simonds was requested to prepare an answer and submit the same for approval to the chairman of the committee and to the President of the Board of Trade.

A quantity of letter heads and envelopes having the map of the city on them were ordered for use at the Board of Trade rooms.

Will Take Moving Pictures

It has been announced by Mr. E. S. Carter Secretary to Premier Foster that the Provincial Government has agreed to contract for motion pictures of scenery, natural resources, industries, etc., in New Brunswick for exhibition in common with similar pictures from other parts of Canada.

Pictures Will be Diversified

The views will be diversified showing mining, lumbering, farming, manufacturing and other activities. The Messrs. Fraser have made arrangements to have a camera-man film the Tobique and other streams on which the lumbering operations of the various Fraser companies are carried on. The pictures taken will show salmon-fishing, stream-driving and rafting also pulp-mills, sawmills and other manufacturing plants at Edmundston, Plaster Rock, and other places.

G. Y. DIBBLEE HOUSE BOUGHT BY DR. HOLDEN

ESTATE OF DECEASED
IS BEING SETTLED

Bequests to Victoria Hospital
and Anglican Church—Be-
quests to Relatives
and Friends.

The residence of the late George Y. Dibblee whose death occurred at St. John on Monday last, was sold yesterday the purchaser being Dr. C. P. Holden of this city. The price was in the vicinity of \$10,500. The sale of the property was in connection with the settlement of the estate of the deceased. The estate is valued at \$24,000. It is understood that life insurance amounts to \$7,000. Executors are Cortland A. Robinson of St. John and A. J. Gregory. The will was drawn on November 5th last.

Many small bequests are contained in the will as well as a number of public bequests. Victoria Public Hospital is left \$1,000, the income to be applied as desired. The Pickett Memorial Fund a trust administered by the Diocesan Synod to provide nurses in the families of clergymen is left \$2,000.

Mrs. J. deLancey Robinson, mother-in-law of the deceased is given the proceeds of a \$3,000 policy in the Royal Arcanum with the proviso that any balance go to St. John's church, Douglas.

Executors are directed to convert the balance of the estate into money and use it for the bequests mentioned before and the following: \$500 for care of the deLancey Robinson burial lot in St. John's churchyard, Douglas; \$200 for care of the Sutherland family lot, Old Protestant Burying Ground, Fredericton; \$1,000 to Walter deLancey Carr, New York; \$500 to Constance Mary Carr and a like amount to Frances Eliza Carr, New York; \$250 each to George Dibblee, John W. Dibblee and Mrs. Margaret Kelly; \$100 each to Mrs. W. H. Robinson and Mrs. Fred P. Robinson of Fredericton; \$200 to Graeme Taylor, Fredericton; \$500 to Cortland Robinson of St. John; \$200 to William H. Robinson and \$750 to Alfred J. Hanlon, employees at the drug store of the deceased; \$100 to Hiram Lodge A. F. & A. M., Fredericton.

The residue of the estate is to provide \$100 per year for Mrs. Hetty Barker, aunt of the deceased and on her death to go to the Bishop and Chapter of Christchurch Cathedral.

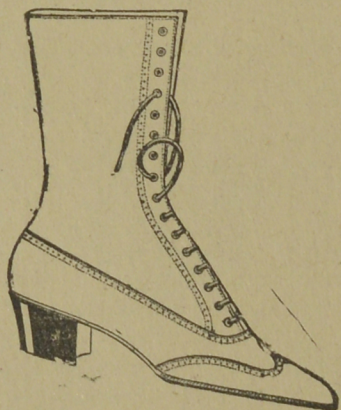
