LIBERALS AT OTTAWA TO HOLD CAUCUS ON MONDAY

Will Select a Leader for the Session of Parliament—State Funeral of the Old Chieftain to be Held on Saturday—Two Archbishops Will Deliver Funeral Orations—Parliament Not Likely to Get Down to Business Before Next Week.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—A Liberal caucus has been called by the chief whip, J. A. Robb, M. P., for Monday morning next. The main question to be considered is of course the temporary filling of the leadership for the session. Opposition members who are now in the capital state that the sudden passing of Sir Wilfrid and the sharp grief of his loss have for the moment superseded all other thoughts. Nothing definite as to the probable action can be forecasted for a day or two, at least pending a quiet canvassing of the new situation by the leading representatives of the opposition now gathering here from all parts of the dominion. There is a growing feeling, however, in favor of bringing back if it can be arranged, Hon. George Graham for the temporary sessional leadership. It is known that some members of the government at least are willing to agree to an acclamation for Mr. Graham for the vacant Gengarry seat if the opposition so requests.

A similar arrangement might be made for Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King if desired. The caucus on Monday next will have these two suggestions before it, but as has been already said, the whole question is still only vaguely speculated upon by the politicians now here. The permanent filling of the leadership will be left in all probability until later on, pending further developments and the assembling of a national Liberal convention next summer.

Like the great statesman whose mortal remains it will house, the casket in which Sir Wilfrid Laurier's body was placed typifies at once elegance and solidity. It is of solid bronze with little ornamentation save the massive pall-bearers' rail and decorated cornered corners. The lining is of white quilted satin with white satin pillow. The casket was taken to Sir Wilfrid's late home this morning and the body placed within it, embalmed and prepared for the grave. The late statesman preserves the appearance of having fallen asleep. His face, always pale, does not convey the impression of death, and were it not for the funeral trappings surrounding the casket one could easily imagine that Sir Wilfrid but slept. At the graveside the casket will be encased in a steel shell, very heavy and substantial, before it is lowered into the earth.

Addresses in French and English

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—The arrangements for Sir Wilfrid Laurier's funeral while not yet complete are to be carried out with all the impressive pomp and ceremony of the Catholic church. Archbishop Mathieu of Regina, one of the most distinguished prelates of the church in Canada and a personal friend of the dead statesman, will likely pronounce the funeral oration in French, while it is expected that Archbishop McNeill, of Toronto, will deliver the oration in English. The high mass of requiem will be celebrated in the Church of the Sacred Heart, where, for many years Sir Wilfrid worshipped. The parish priest, Rev. Father Laflamme, will be the celebrant.

Government leaders and opposition representatives high state officials

and many church dignitaries will be present at the services while thousands are expected to walk in the funeral procession. Hundreds of cables and messages of condolence are arriving from all parts of the globe. One was from His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, who in the course of his tenure in Ottawa became one of Sir Wilfrid's closest friends.

Tribute in House Tuesday

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—Out of respect to the memory of Sir Wilfrid Laurier the parliament will adjourn from Thursday afternoon until Tuesday. The proceedings on Thursday will be brief. There will be the formal opening of session followed by brief references to the loss which the country and house have sustained. On Tuesday tribute will be paid to Sir Wilfrid's memory. The house will then proceed with debate on the address.

It had originally been arranged to adjourn the house from Thursday till Monday. The longer adjournment has been made to enable the opposition to make necessary arrangements for the session. Although a formal caucus has not so far been called opposition members will meet on Monday to discuss the situation.

Last Visit to London Recalled

London, Feb. 18.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier's last appearance in London was at the imperial conference in the coronation year, 1911, which met under Premier Asquith's presidency when Louis Hercourt was colonial secretary. Laurier was then the oldest member at the conference.

"I represent a country which has no grievances," declared Sir Wilfrid at the formal opening. Later he declared that Canada was absolutely satisfied with the existing system of negotiating through the colonial office, although if the other governments suggested a standing advisory committee to the imperial conference Canada would offer no objection. He also expressed the conviction that Canada would strongly object to a scheme directly promoting emigration from Great Britain.

Sir Wilfrid did not have a very good English press reception during the conference. The now defunct Standard declared that he was the wet blanket of the conference. One point which Laurier did approve was the All-Red land line through Canada "that could by no possibility get involved in the American strategic, telegraphic, or economic system."

Canada during Laurier's visit was of course almost on the eve of the reciprocity election. The Canadian premier in London made only one direct reference to this domestic matter. It was while speaking at the Constitutional Club that he said:

"This agreement is no solemn treaty but one which could be put an end to. There is no occasion for alarm."

An interesting incident occurred at the Dominion Day dinner when Laurier announced that Lord Strathcona owing to the orders of his physician had given notice to relinquish his position as high commissioner. Despite the premier's announcement however Lord Strathcona died in harness nearly three years later.

Sir Wilfrid also during his visit attended the unveiling at the Westminster Palace hotel of the tablet in the room where the confederation delegates met in 1867. It was, of course a non-political gathering. Much amusement was therefore caused when Sir Charles Tupper then well past ninety, and the only surviving confederation delegate delivered a vigorous speech advocating protection.
