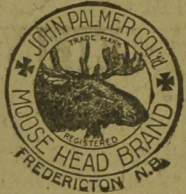

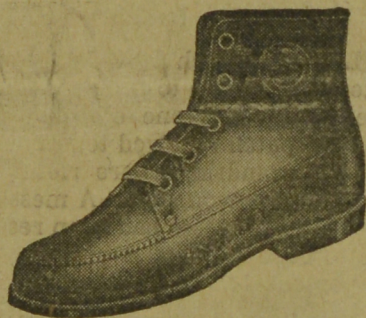

Paris, March 13—Each new day of the armistice over here in Paris is marked by the appearance of some new kind of cake in the patisserie windows. All over the city, where no sweets have been seen for more than four years, there is a slowly spreading epidemic of small confections. As yet their price is prohibitive to most people, but the crowds as they pass along stop to gaze upon the debut of the pastry with a little of the same expression of reverence with which they look upon the French flag.

On the Rue Faubourg St. Honore the other day one traffic cop and two regulation gendarmes were doing their best to keep a mob in order with very little effect. It pushed nearer and nearer the big plate window, laughing and chattering so excitedly that one who didn't know the language couldn't have helped feeling a little uneasy. An American soldier stopped one of the gendarmes.

What's the matter here—accident?" he asked.

The gendarme said something very voluble and entirely unintelligible, and passed on. Little by little the American soldier pushed nearer the window, and looked in, still without understanding. An old Frenchwoman saw his bewilderment and explained in English:

"It's the French pastry, monsieur, don't you see," she said. "It's the first the Paris has seen since the war. Now we feel that peace has really come."

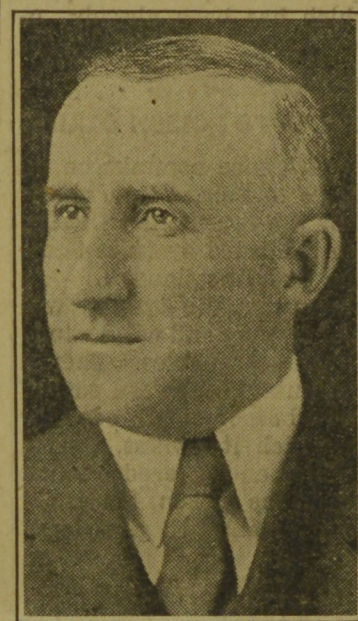

MR LeBLANC CONTRIBUTES
FIGHTING SPEECH TO DEBATE

Young Member for Restigouche Handles the Patriots of the Opposition without Gloves—A Crushing Reply to the Diatribes of Mr. Potts—The Story of the Tory-Nationalist Alliance Told to the House.

The debate on the address which has been dragging along in the Legislature for nearly ten days took on a lively turn last evening. The speakers were Mr. Sutton of Carleton and Mr. LeBlanc of Restigouche. The latter delivered a very vigorous speech in which he got after the purists of the Opposition in fine style. Mr. Campbell of St. John moved the adjournment of the debate, which was made the order of the day for this afternoon.

MR. LEBLANC said that the last session it had been suggested that by mutual arrangement speeches on the address might be limited to two or three on each side. Apparently the idea had not gained headway, for hon. gentlemen insisted upon making speeches each one as long as the other. However, it was not this intention to speak at great length. He congratulated Hon. Mr. Speaker upon his elevation. He occupied the office held for the last two sessions by Hon. William Currie, who, fortunately, had been compelled by ill health to vacate the position, and he regretted that his colleague for four or five weeks had been seriously ill in hospital. It had been with considerable regret that he saw the office pass from the old county of Restigouche, but was pleased to see it go to the County of Queens. No hon. member of the House was better fitted or more entitled to the office than the hon. gentleman who had been appointed. All qualities required for a good Speaker were assembled in the person of the present incumbent. The appointment had taken some of the hon. gentleman opposite by surprise, and had made them very rapidly swap horses, at the opening of the session, and the process of horse-swapping was usually rather annoying. However, the hon. member from St. John had been given the opportunity to drive the other horse to death. He heartily congratulated the mover of the address. He had noticed that the speeches made had not been confined to matters touched upon in the speech from the throne. Many matters entirely foreign to it had been brought in. At the preceding session the hon. member for St. John (Mr. Potts) had carried the House back as far as 1815. This year he had gone a little better and had gone back as far as the Treaty of Paris 1763. With a fair wind and a smooth sea next session he might get as far back as the Flood. All features of the speech had shown that a skillful hand had been at the helm for the past few years. All matters which should be touched upon by a careful administration had been mentioned, principal among them had been the development of natural resources and the New Jury Act. The latter was much needed. In the selection of juries sheriffs were the important officials, and it might be better if some of them had not been reappointed on May 1st. He knew of cases which had fallen little short of a miscarriage of justice, as a result of partisanship shown in selection of a jury. In his own county a lumberman had brought action against a newspaper for an alleged libel. He managed to have chosen a jury which for the purpose of his case could not have been improved

and render a verdict accordingly. He merely cited this case to show the defects that existed in the present Jury system. He was very glad that the government had given the matter attention, and proposed to bring down a new Jury Act during the Session.

Hon. members opposite had taken up a lot of time discussing Union Government and the connection they had had with it. They had seen fit to abuse the hon. Premier, because he did not dance to their tune at the last election. Union Government had no connection with the business of the

House, but in bringing it up hon. members opposite were merely rehearsing a story which they planned to tell in every school house at the next election. In speaking of Union Government it would be necessary for him to go back beyond the period of the War to the year 1911. He would tell them an old story, but one that could never die of age. In 1911 the Liberal government led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier was defeated on two issues—Reciprocity in Ontario, Manitoba and the Maritime Provinces and the Naval issue in Quebec. Where did the great patriots opposite, who now talk of Union government, stand in 1911. Sir Wilfrid Laurier had been opposed in Quebec because he was too British. The young men of that province were told that they should have nothing to do with the Wars of Great Britain. They were not told that by back benches—but were told by the hierarchy from the ex-priest upwards. Hon. L. P. Pelletier, Henri Bourassa, and other nationalist politicians had gone about the country inflaming the passions of the young men by telling them that Britain had never done anything for the French Canadians, and that they had to shoot the British flag full of holes in order to breathe the air of freedom. As a result of those false canvasses Quebec in that election returned 27 Tory-Nationalist Members and the government was defeated. And more than that, the campaign carried on against the Liberals was financed by the gold of the Tory manufacturers of Montreal. When Sir Robert Borden came to form his cabinet he had to bow the knee to Henri
