HON. DR. BELAND DISCUSSES CAUSE OF LABOR UNREST

Extract from Speech Delivered in the House of Commons —
How the Cost of Living Might be Reduced—Law of Supply
and Demand Has Been Ignored—The Profiteer Should be
Given No Quarter.

(From the speech of Hon. Dr. Beland,
in House of Commons, June 10.)

In my estimation Mr. Speaker, these
are the causes of labor unrest: First
the conviction, properly arrived at,
that the war was carried to a success-
ful end by the masses; second, a keen-
er realization on the part of the mas-
ses of the people of the shocking in-
equalities of the social world; the
third a common suffering everywhere
because of the high cost of living.

What is the remedy?
It is to try to afford a better stand-
ard of life to the labor community,
and to reduce the cost of living.

Reduce the cost of living, is a fine
phrase, but how are you going to do
it? It seems to me Mr. Speaker, that
you can reduce the cost of living by
applying yourself to the three follow-
ing activities; increase production, re-
duce the taxation on consumption and
in particular bring the profiteer to ac-
count. The two former methods I have
already referred to during my re-
marks; but whatever may be the amount
of production, be it ample or small,
the cost of the consumer may not be
diminished by reason of an im-
moral disposition on the part of some
human beings to take undue advan-
tage of a faulty system of distribution.

There exists the law of supply and
demand. If that law is allowed to
have freedom, if it is allowed to fol-
low its natural course, it will oper-
ate according to reason and will pre-
vent the oppression of the masses.

But, the just and free operation of
the law of supply and demand has
been ignored or rather interfered
with. Contact has been lost between
the original producer and the ulti-
mate consumer. Between the two a
parasite or tremendous dominating
power has entrenched himself. He is
to be found in the warehouse, in the
cold storage plant, where he accumu-
lates and holds for a rise in price and
a scandalous profit. You would have
found him between the consumer and
the producer seven or eight weeks
ago when the price of butter was sent
up to seventy-five cents a pound. Had
not spring threatened him, the price
might have been carried to \$1 a pound.

Have we not in this country an act
known as the War Measures Act
which gives to the government almost
unlimited powers? By the War Meas-
ures Act brick can be changed into
stone. What was the reason for non-
interference in this particular in-
stance on the part of the government?

When such exactions are perpetrat-
ed can we wonder at the industrial
and social restlessness in Canada? It
is claimed that there are dangerous
leaders, that there are men who are
agitators, that there are in this coun-
try—as was affirmed by the hon. So-
licitor General (Mr. Guthrie)—men
who want to overthrow our establish-
ed institutions.

No quarter for them, is my advice.
But sir, no quarter also for another
objectionable, and not more desir-
able party—the profiteer. Let us try to
assist the honest endeavor of labor to
gain in this country a better standard
of life. This effort is commendable and
anything in reason that can afford a
better standard of living, together
with some of the comforts of this
world, should not be denied the most
important, after all, of the factors of
production and wealth. It seems to me
that if this condition should be reach-
ed, social life would come to an end.

Mr. Speaker after my release and
as I entered Holland passing out of
Germany, I experienced emotions
which it is beyond my power to de-
scribe. It was on a spring day when
nature awakens to new life. I passed
from a world of peace and happiness.
It was, as I said, on a day in spring
when nature takes on new life. The

as an illustration only, and I will ask
the House, whether in this morally
tormented world the point may soon
be reached where the mighty and the
rich can extend the hand to the poor
to the workingman, a point of contact

above and a movement of reasonableness
on the part of the one below.

for the ills from which society suffers
at the present moment. It is nothing
more nor less than the adequate ap-
plication of the law of Christianity.
