PEACE DAY PROCESSION PRONOUNCED A SUCCESS

Entries of All Classes Were Numerous and Considering the Short Length of Time for Preparation, Fredericton and Vicinity Produced a Creditable Turnout—The Award of Prizes—Many Interesting Floats Shown.

The procession which was the chief item of the morning celebration of the Peace day on Saturday, June 19th, in Fredericton, was declared on all sides to be a most creditable effort considering that the first step was taken only on Monday last and the arrangements not completed until sometime after that. No doubt had more time been taken the entries in all classes would have been more numerous and the decorations and floats more finished. As it was the procession covered about three quarters of a mile of street and was witnessed by thousands. All departments were well represented.

Award of Prizes

The judging in the various classes was placed in the hands of two gentlemen who were strangers to almost everyone in Fredericton, Messrs C. P. Avery of Toronto and F. W. Storm of St. John. Their award was as follows:

Peace and Patriotic Floats.—1st, Scapa Flow, 2nd, Canada.

Industrial Floats—1st Canadian Cottons; 2nd Fraser Companies Limited.

Comic Floats—1st Ford Delong and John Chase, "How Ya Gonna Keep Them Down on the Farm After They Have Seen Paree? (Fredericton)"; 2nd, Michael McDonald, "Rev. Sam Hornbeam on the (Lemon) Keg."

Decorated Motors—1st, Harold Limerick; 2nd G. T. Feeney.

Decorated Bicycles—1st Frank Stephens "H. M. S. Queen Elizabeth"; 2nd Grace Noble and Jean McLeod "French Girls"; 3rd, William Irvine "Airplane."

Returned Soldiers' Float — New Brunswick Military Hospital, "Advanced Dressing Station."

Society or Organization Float — Daughters of the Empire.

Hobo Band—1st Labor Council; 2nd Five "Peace" Orchestra.

The judges also were of the opinion that the John Palmer Co. and the fire departments deserved honorable mention.

The Procession

The route covered was that announced. Music was furnished by the G. W. V. A. Band and the Fredericton Brass Band which marched and by the Marysville Brass Band which occupied a large wagon.

The marshals were Lt. Col. W. J. Osborne and City Marshal James Roberts.

The first section of the procession was a group of young ladies from the store of the F. B. Edgecombe Company, all mounted on horses and bearing colors of nations of the Allies. They were Miss Lou McKeil as Canada, Miss Hazel Mosher as Britain, Miss Myrtle Forsey as France, Miss Vona McKeown as America, Miss Helen Stairs as Belgium.

This was followed by two young ladies in the uniform of the C. E. F. and also mounted, Miss Ruby Coombes and Miss Haines.

The returned soldiers of Fredericton and vicinity, several hundred strong, marched next under the command of Col. H. F. McLeod, M. P., with the G. W. V. A. Band at their head. Disabled soldiers were accommodated in motor cars placed at their disposal by citizens.

Floats of various kinds then were given a place. The Marysville Band preceded the Canadian Cottons float which was followed by the three fire departments. After more floats and other entries the Fredericton Brass Band came heading the Fredericton Labor Council and the York County Millmen's Union. Miscellaneous items completed the procession.

It is greatly to the credit of the committee and officials who had the procession in charge, that it moved off from Smythe street, the place of assembly, only five minutes behind scheduled time.

Cars for Soldiers

Upwards of one hundred returned soldiers appeared in the procession riding in motors furnished by residents of the city. Among the cars which were placed at the disposal of the returned men were those of the following:

Industrial Floats

Canadian Cottons Limited through its Marysville mill put a very fine float in the industrial section. Mr. Joseph Dolphin, mill superintendent, was present in person on the float and subordinate heads also were present. The float represented the difference between the old time and modern methods of cotton manufacture. Mrs. Thomas Clayton represented the old-time method, operating a hand-loom in the front portion of the float and Marvin Minue, modern method with an automatic loom of the latest type at the rear of the float, power being furnished by a gasoline engine. Roving bobbins with yarn of different colors were built into a railing about the float and rolls of the finished product were arranged in the centre. A huge bale of raw cotton which formed the driver's seat represented the raw material.

Fraser Companies Limited also had a striking float in the procession. A miniature logging camp was shown with smoke pouring from the chimney and the cook preparing a meal, while in the rear axes and other tools were being sharpened in orthodox style.

The John Palmer Company's float represented the various products of that firm with specimens of oil-tanned footwear actually on the feet of a soldier, a farmer, a lumberman and a sportsman.

The Landry Shoe Repairing Shop also had a good float showing the actual processes of modern shoe repairing by machinery.

The Hartt Boot & Shoe Company had a float which represented the output of its factory. Five young ladies employed by the company were on the float each wearing samples of the goods turned out by the factory and the men's footwear also was represented. A huge boot formed the centre-piece of the float which was under the charge of Messrs Fred Dibb and George Jonah and was the result of the labors of a committee of departmental heads of the factory.

J. Clark & Son had a unique entry in the form of a tractor disguised as a tank with Hanford Kingston and George Tennant aboard.

Decorated Cars

Mr. Harold Limerick had the best decorated motor car in the procession with Misses Eva Brewer, Myrtle and Edith Staples as passengers. Mr. G. T. Feeney also drove a handsomely decorated car with Master Sanford Pond "driving" from an elevated position.

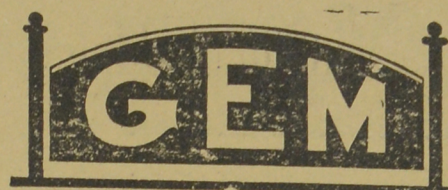
Fire Departments in Line

The fire departments of Fredericton, Marysville and Devon were in line. The Marysville motor truck was driven by H. A. Gailley. Chief John G. Hall was in command of the Devon firemen and Assistant Chief W. M. Clark of the Fredericton Department. The Fredericton apparatus was in the procession but there was little in the way of decoration as it was desirable that the pieces be ready for use in the event of fire. The reserve hose wagon was decorated however and on it Miss Teena Clark daughter of the Assistant Chief represented Britannia. The judges Messrs Avery and Storm expressed themselves as of the opinion that the fire departments deserved especial mention inasmuch as no prize was provided for competition among them.

Societies and Organizations

The most ambitious attempt on the part of societies and organizations was the float of the Central Committee, Daughters of the Empire, which represented Britannia surrounded by
