

MIDSUMMER RECIPES.

Individual Shortcake.

Sift one cup of flour and one round teaspoonful of baking powder three times. Place one tablespoonful of butter in a cup and put on the stove to melt. Break one egg in the cup and without stirring add enough milk to nearly fill the cup. Add to the flour mixture and stir until well mixed. Bake in gem or cup cake pans. When cold cut and put between them mashed and sweetened berries. Place some berries on top of each little cake, sprinkle with powdered sugar and top each with a spoonful of whipped cream. Any kind of berries may be used.

Orange Custard.

Peel four sweet oranges, remove all white pith and cut in circles. Lay the slices in a glass dish and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Pour over them a custard made of the yolk of two eggs, one tablespoon of sugar, one cup of milk and vanilla flavoring. Put above mixture in a saucepan and set in a larger pan of boiling water. Heat slowly and stir till it begins to thicken. Do not let it boil or it will curdle. Add whites of eggs, beat thoroughly and pour over oranges. Serve cold.

Hollandaise Sauce.

With a wooden spoon cream one-half cupful of butter and beat into it the yolks of two eggs, one at a time. Add one-fourth teaspoonful each of salt and pepper. Set the mixing bowl in a pan of boiling water, add one-half cupful of the boiling water and stir hard until the mixture thickens. Turn into a cold bowl and beat in the juice of one-half lemon. Should be the consistency of mayonnaise.

RANDOM REMINDERS.

Try powdered mace to flavor custard instead of nutmeg.

Discard worn kitchen linen. The lint may clog the drain pipes.

Whiten your clothes by boiling a tablespoon of turpentine with them.

To take grease out of leather, apply white of an egg, dry in sun; repeat if necessary.

Cold tea used on varnished floors or woodwork of any kind will give it a beautiful lustre.

There is nothing like buying vegetables out of season for running up the household bills.

Newspapers soaked in water for 24 hours make an excellent pulp with which to fill cracks.

To prevent mold from forming on top of the liquid in which pickles are kept, put in a few pieces of horse-radish root.

EX-KAISER'S
LETTER NOW
MADE PUBLIC

Berlin, July 19.—A letter written by former Emperor William on July 28, 1914, to Dr. Von ethmann HollweggB, then Imperial German Chancellor, is published here. The letter says that after having read the Serbian reply to the Austrian ultimatum, it was the opinion of the Emperor that all Austria's wishes had been et and that all ground for war was removed. It adds, however, that as the Serbians "are Orientals and untrustworthy," that the Austrians should occupy Belgrade until the Serbian promises are fulfilled. "On this basis," said the Emperor, "I would be ready to arrange peace in Austria."
