NORTHUMBERLAND LIBERALS CHOSE THEIR DELEGATES

Successful Convention Held at Newcastle Yester-
day—Speeches by Hon. Robert Murray, Hon.
John Morrissey, Mr. W. B. Snowball and Others
—Hon. F. B. Carvell Expected to Leave the
Cabinet When Demobilization is Over.

Newcastle, N. B., July 22—The North-
umberland Liberal convention, held
this afternoon was presided over by D.
J. Buckley. He cordially welcomed all
the delegates. The death of Sir Wil-
frid Laurier was the subject of a
strong resolution. The convention ex-
pressed its joy that the war was over
and welcomed back the brave boys
from France and Flanders, besides
asking God to bless those who remain-
ed.

All men who supported the Unionist
cause at the last election were again
welcomed to the convention. The con-
vention decided to agree on one policy
that of reconstruction.

Mr. Buckley resigned as president
of the Liberal Association on account
of his health, but John Morrissey sug-
gested that he carry on the business
of the meeting.

On motion of Anthony Adams and
R. Gill that the president select a com-
mittee of five to nominate delegates to
the national Liberal convention at Ot-
tawa, the following were selected:
Hon. John Morrissey, W. B. Snowball,
Anthony Adams, Dr. Ryan of Boies-
town, and A. M. Arseneault.

Hon. Robert Murray spoke of the
great war and the success of our ar-
mies. He thought that now a leader
should be selected who would look af-
ter our country's interests. He said
there are differences of opinion both in
the East the West and the Middle, but
he hoped these differences would be
settled and a policy brought about
that would benefit all Canada.

While party men, he said, we are
Canadians first, last, and at all times.
Hon. Mr. Murray paid a glowing tri-
bute to Sir Wilfrid Laurier who was
always a Canadian and worked in the
interest of Canada. Dr. D. R. Moore
said that the interests of the people
were always promoted by the policy
of the Liberal party. Dr. Moore spoke
very highly of the Liberal party's work.
The following delegates were chosen
to go to the Liberal convention at
Ottawa D. V. Allain, James Robinson,
D. P. Sullivan; alternates, W. B.
Snowball, Dr. Ryan, and Andre Ar-
seneau.

The president regretted that no
Unionist Liberals had been selected to
attend the convention.

T. H. Whalen moved a resolution
regretting the death of the late Sir
Wilfrid Laurier, which was seconded
by Anthony Adams and carried by an
unanimous vote.

W. B. Snowball while introducing a
resolution said that he was a Liberal
and the Liberal policy was the best
for Canada. While there were differ-
ences in the last election he stood by
what he thought was right.

Mr. Snowball seconded by D. V. Al-
lain, moved that a glowing tribute be
paid to those who fought in the great
war. This resolution was carried with
enthusiasm. Speeches were made by
Hon. John Morrissey and Andre Ar-
seneau.

The officers elected are: President
J. W. Vanderbeck; secretary, W. A.
Skidds. The executive were authoriz-
ed to prepare to organize the county.

Mr. Carvell's Position

Ottawa, July 22—As promised by
Sir Robert Borden when the by-elec-
tions act was under consideration, at
the late session of parliament, an or-
der-in-council has just been passed
advising "that on the first day of Aug-
ust 1919 demobilization shall be deem-
ed completed in so far as the opera-

tion of the war time elections act is
concerned."

This draws attention to Hon. Frank
Carvell's statement in 1918 and again
at the last session that he was joining
the Union cabinet for the duration of
the war and for such time thereafter
as would elapse before demobilization
would be complete. That was the per-
iod originally intended for the war
time elections act to last but a term
is now put to it by the order-in-coun-
cil and by the by-elections act. Will
Hon. Frank Carvell accept the govern-
ment definition of the end of demobil-
ization as applying to himself as well
as to the war time elections act? He
keeps his own counsel. If he goes at
all the government would like him to
go on August 1, before the Liberal
convention, so that the exact situa-
tion in cabinet reconstruction would
be plain. As for Hon. Frank Carvell
himself it is believed that he would
like to see how the Liberal convention
shapes its policies and what leader it
adopts before deciding on his course.
Demobilization to the last soldier will
not actually be completed on July 31,
even if government considers it so
for election purposes. Therefore Hon.
Mr. Carvell can still be true to his
word and wait a bit as well if he
wants to. Apparently he wants to. If
he wants to he will. On the other hand
if he yearns to unite once more with
his Liberal friends, this order-in-
council gives him a fighting opportu-
nity.

Position of Other Liberals

It gives a chance for other Liberals
in the cabinet to do some thinking.
Most joined for the war and a vague
period thereafter. Hon. C. C. Ballan-
tine alone thought that a Union gov-
ernment would be needed for three
or four years after the war and the
others spoke vaguely of a period from
six months to two years.

Before the year ends everyone must
take his choice. However there is
nothing to indicate that the fateful
step will be taken before the Liberal
convention by any of them.

It is not expected that the whole of
reconstruction will be accomplished
as soon as Sir Robert comes back. The
vacant portfolios will doubtless be al-
lotted. The fate of others has been
practically settled in view of the resig-
nation expected and events foreseen
but the whole process will probably
last over three months.

HEAVY CARS WORK INJURY TO THE ROADS

made in Mayor Hanson's automobile
and was much enjoyed. In speaking of
the condition of the roads Mayor
Hanson stated that he was satisfied
that Hon. Mr. Veniot was making an
honest effort to give the people of the
province good roads and had certainly
brought about a great improvement.

He said that the river road from St.
John to Fredericton was splendid, and
the back road was also good. His Wor-
ship expressed the opinion that a lot
of injury was being done to the roads
by the owners of big, high power
touring cars. Many of these cars he
said, are driven at a speed of 30 and 35
miles an hour and undoubtedly do a
lot of damage. They are as a rule
equipped with shock absorbers and
can therefore be driven much faster
than an ordinary car without inconve-
nience to the occupants. Some of the
offenders he pointed out, come from
points outside the province and he
was inclined to think that some steps
should be taken to curb them.

Gunner Martin Horncastle arrived
home Monday from overseas having
landed at Halifax on Saturday from
the Royal George. He is one of three
brothers to serve overseas and went
overseas with a draft of the 9th
Siege Battery from Partridge Island.
He was badly wounded in the summer
of 1918 and for a time all hope was
given up of his recovery. One brother
Roy served with the First Contingent
infantry and Guy, recently returned
served with the Engineers.

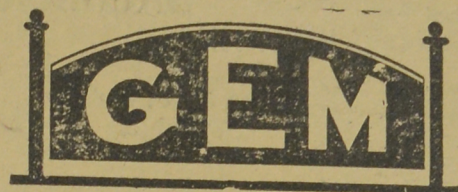
