### THE ROYAL VISITATION.

The reception in honor of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales at St. John on Friday was provincial in its character and reflected the greatest credit upon all those who had to do with the arrangements. The Prince was on shore just seven hours and every feature of the very strenuous program arranged for him was carried out without the slightest hitch. The weather throughout the day was very disagreeable, but it utterly failed to dampen the ardor of the thousands of people who gathered from far and near to welcome our future King. It was a most auspicious opening of the royal tour which is to embrace all Canada.

The Prince certainly made a great hit with all who came in contact with him during his stay in St. John. Although small of stature and very youthful in appearance, he acquitted himself like a veteran. At the armory two addresses were presented to him and in his reply he did not show the slightest trace of nervousness. He proved himself to be a democrat as well as a diplomat, and his charming manner won all hearts. The general verdict of all who have seen His Royal Highness so far during his stay in Canada is that "He's all right."

Lieutenant Governor Pugsley, Premier Foster, Mayor Hayes and the others who looked after the arrangements of the Royal visit to St. John, are certainly deserving of hearty congratulations on the great success which attended their efforts.

### SOME GOOD ADVICE.

The following taken from a recent issue of the Montreal Gazette, "a staunch Conservative journal, is commended to a certain class of politicians fairly well known in some sections of the province of New Brunswick:

"The everlasting twanging of the strings of race and religion is nauseating. Have public men in Canada no higher mission than to perpetuate ancient feuds and prolong early prejudices? Is the heritage given the people of this country deserving of no better service? Are there not problems touching their material and social and moral life of sufficient moment to absorb all the time, tax all the energy and employ all the talent of the best minds in Canada? The compact of Confederation has not been kept by those who seek selfish ends by stirring up strife. It was to put away the very situation into which the country is drifting that Confederation was formed, and he who kindles anew the animosities which arrayed an English party against a French party in the old provinces of Upper and Lower Canada is an enemy, however unconsciously so, of the Dominion. It ought not to be too much to expect a decent

regard for, and a steady emulation of, the patriotism which caused men like Cartier and Brown to sink personal predilections for the general good, and if restraint under provocation is shown on both sides; if public men and the press will rivet attention upon the higher purposes, disdaining the darts thrown by petty partisans for mischievous or selfish purposes, irritation and distrust will soon give way to contentment and confidence to the advantage of all."

### THE CHILDREN'S PART.

While the military features in connection with the visit of the Prince of Wales to St. John were spectacular and impressive, the outstanding event in the opinion of many people was the part taken in the reception by the school children. There was upwards of one thousand of them located on a large stand at the head of the wharf, and as the royal visitor made his appearance they rendered the doxology, followed by "God bless the Prince of Wales." The Prince, accompanied by the Governor General and the Duke of Devonshire, paused in front of the stand to listen, and while he stood there the children sang in a spirited manner "The Maple Leaf," and "Our Own Canadian Home." It was a very pretty incident and deserved the hearty cheers which it elicited from the thousands of spectators. That His Royal Highness was duly impressed was evidenced by the fact that later in the day he sent for Mr. D. Arnold Fox, the conductor, and personally congratulated him. The committee in charge are to be highly commended for their thoughtfulness in arranging to have children participate in the welcome to our future sovereign.

Sir Robert Borden who arrived at St. John on Thursday last to assist in the welcome to the Prince of Wales, was the guest of General H. H. McLean, M. P., at Rothesay. Other guests included Sir J. D. Hazen and Senator W. H. Thorne. It is generally understood that matters not in any way connected with the royal visitation furnished a fruitful topic for discussion. If Hon. Mr. Carvell's successor in the cabinet is to be a Liberal Unionist, General McLean is believed to stand a chance of landing the prize.

The Dragon, which bore the Prince of Wales from Halifax to St. John, and her consort, the Dauntless, are light cruisers of the very latest type. They burn oil for fuel and are said to be very speedy craft. The Prince left St. John at six o'clock Saturday morning and reached Halifax at 11 o'clock on Sunday. From Halifax he will proceed to Charlottetown on the battleship Renown, and thence to Quebec.

Lieut. General Sir Arthur Currie, who commanded the Canadian forces in the field during the late war, arrived at Halifax yesterday and was tendered a royal welcome.

Will Re-occupy Residence Soon

### MIXER NOW IN USE

Arrived on Friday—Traprock Still being hauled—Regent Street Work Progressing.

City Engineer McDowell announced this morning that the new concrete mixer which was ordered for use by the city arrived at the city yards on Friday and is now at work there. Traprock is still being hauled to the city yards by R. T. Baird and the crusher is being kept busy. Mr. Baird expects to complete his contract of hauling one thousand tons of the trap-rock to the city yards from Douglas about the last of the month.

The "missing link" on Regent street which has been in the hands of the City Engineer for a short time has been excavated and the holes are being patched up prior to the laying of the concrete. The catch basins are also being put in on Regent street and the "missing link" promises to soon be as good as the remainder of the blocks on the street.

### VISIT OF PRINCE OF WALES

Rev. Father Carney made Reference to Visit of Heir Apparent and to Excellence of British Form of Government.

Rev. Father Carney during service at St. Dunstan's Church yesterday referred to the recent visit of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales to New Brunswick and the hearty welcome given him at St. John by the people of the province. The Prince as the future ruler of British territories deserved the homage and respect of all British subjects. The preacher made extended reference to the excellence of the form of British government and the liberty enjoyed by all under it and contrasted it with conditions prevalent in other parts of the world. If free government existed it made little difference whether the titular head was Emperor, King or President.

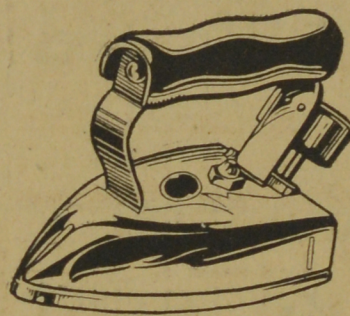

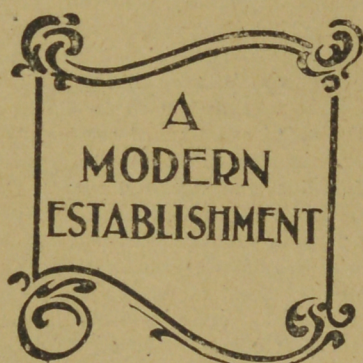
