The annual Election for Mayor and Aldermen for the City of Fredericton will be held on

MONDAY, MARCH 10, 1919

Polling Places—At the City Hall for Division No. 1, and at the County Court House for Division No. 2—will open at 9 o'clock a. m. and close at 4 o'clock p. m. the said day.

HOW TO VOTE.

The voter shall use the official ballot paper and shall strike out or mark through with a pencil of black lead, or a pen with black or blue-black ink, the names of all except the name of the candidate or the names of the candidates for whom he wishes to vote, and a ballot so marked, if otherwise good, shall be counted.

Not more than one elector, shall at any one time enter the polling place, and such elector, upon entering, shall declare his name, surname and addition, and if the name of such elector is found on the list of voters, he shall receive from the presiding officer an unopened envelope, on the back of which the presiding officer shall write with a pencil of black lead or with pen and ink, his initials, in the presence of the voter.

The elector, on receiving the envelope, shall forthwith proceed within the screened compartment, and shall there, having marked his ballot, or, having previously done so, replace his ballot within the envelope handed to him by the presiding officer, and shall, without any delay, hand the envelope containing his ballot, unsealed, to the presiding officer, who shall ascertain by examining his initials that it is the same with which he had furnished the voter, and if so satisfied shall immediately and in the presence of the voter, place the envelope containing the ballot in the ballot box, and the voter shall immediately leave the polling place. No such ballot shall be received by the presiding officer until the voter has proceeded to the screened compartment within the polling place, and while there placed his ballot in the envelope furnished him by the presiding officer.

The poll clerk shall, under the direction of the presiding officer, then enter the name of the voter on the check list.

MARYSVILLE TOWN COUNCIL
HELD ITS REGULAR SESSION

Legal Opinion Against Paying Claim of Coun. Sloat for Injury to His Daughter by Shooting—Income Tax Question to be Discussed at Later Date—Fredericton Curlers to be Entertained Friday Night.

Marysville, N. B., March 6, 1919—
The town council met in regular monthly meeting, Tuesday evening in the Knights of Pythias Hall. The only absentee was Coun. P. G. Long. The minutes of former meeting were read and adopted. The bills for the month were read and on motion were ordered paid. Moved by Coun. C. Finnamore and seconded by Coun. T. McDowell that a cheque for \$100.00 be issued in favor of Victoria Hospital. Carried; this money was assessed for and granted to Victoria Hospital at the beginning of the fiscal year but owing to an oversight, was never before issued. Moved by Coun. Finnamore and seconded by Coun. Sloat that a cheque for \$2.50 be issued in favor of N. E. Stewart for work on sidewalks; carried. Coun. MacPherson, chairman of Police Committee, reported everything quiet in his department. A cheque for \$1.50 in favor of Mr. E. Peterson for work on sidewalks; was ordered. Coun. McDowell, chairman of Finance Committee submitted his monthly financial statement. Mayor Stafford reported on Memorial to fallen heroes, and stated that he was in communication with Ottawa re Marysville receiving a war trophy. The report was received as a report of progress. His worship also reported on an interview that he had with Messrs Slipp and Hanson regarding Coun. Sloat's claim for damages against the town, on account of injuries sustained by his daughter being shot on November 11th, to the effect that in their opinion Coun. Sloat had no claim against the town; the report was received and on motion was taken up for discussion. It would appear that from sentiments expressed that the majority of the council are opposed to paying the claim.

A letter was received from the Town Clerk of Devon, on the matter of income taxes, which contained a proposition that Fredericton, Devon and Marysville enter into an agreement whereby citizens who work in either of these places, while they may reside in another, will pay their income taxes where they reside; the matter was laid over for consideration.

A copy of the proposed legislation for the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Co. was submitted by Gregory Winslow for the inspection and approval of the council. A committee was appointed to watch the progress of the bill before the Legislature.

A letter was received from Dr. Melvin in reference to the case of Ernest Tibbitts, who had been from Sunbury County, in which he advised the Council to take the matter up with the Board of Health of that county. A cheque for \$15.00 was ordered in favor of Bernard Stafford for board for Tib-

bitts. Moved by Coun. Finnamore and seconded by Coun. Sloat that Town Marshall Armstrong be recommended as inspector of Board of Health; carried. On motion the meeting adjourned.

The Marysville Curlers will entertain the Fredericton curlers at the Dawson Club Friday evening. The Marysville curlers hope to win back some of their laurels on that occasion, when they will meet their friends in a bowling contest.



THRIFT PLAN

Necessities of State Demand
Exercise of Thrift by the
General Public at the
Present Time.

F. B. McCurdy, M. P., who represents Colchester in the House of Commons and is also known as one of the prominent financial men of Canada, endorses the War Savings movement in the following statement, recently issued:

"The advantage which systematic saving confers on the individual who practices economy and thrift is everywhere recognized.
