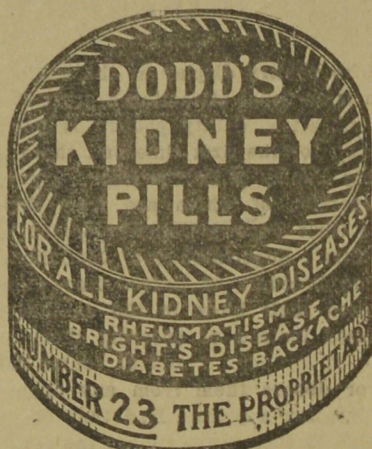

Favorites Beaten In Two  
of the Races on Tuesday

Exposer in the 2.16 Trot and Pace and Roy Volo in the 2.14 Trot and Pace Finished Only Third—Jennie Penn and Bob Mac the Winners—Driver Gerow Taken Down by Judges—Adioo Guy's Mark of 2.11 1/2 Twice Equalled in the 2.14 Class—Track was Good.

The harness meet of the 1919 Fredericton Exhibition started Tuesday with racing which gave the large crowd enough thrills to make everyone want to go back for the rest of the four-day program. The track record of 2.11 1/2 hung up by Adioo Guy in the July meeting twice was equalled in the 2.14 Mixed Class, in the first heat by Bob Mac which won the race and in the second by Royal McKinney.

Touz won the 2.30 Trot and Pace as expected but in the other races the talent was badly upset. Roy Volo which was bought against the field got nothing better than third money in the 2.14 Trot and Pace which was won by Bob Mac and in the 2.16 Trot and Pace Exposer also got third money although barred in the pool-selling. The few wise ones who bought the field against these two horses made a nice clean up. Jennie Penn won the 2.16 in straight heats.

## Change of Drivers

There were two changes of drivers during the afternoon. H. C. Jewett owner of Exposer put Driver Bill Sharon up behind his stallion in place of Driver Bert Lint but the change failed to make much difference with the horse. The other change was when the judges put Peter Carroll in to drive Royal McKinney instead of Gerow. This was on account of complaint that Driver Gerow pulled out to the center of the track in the third heat of the 2.14 and allowed the two other horses to pass him. With Driver Carroll up however, Royal McKinney failed to perform better.

## Pari-Mutuel in Use

The pari-mutuel betting machine was in operation during the races, this being its introduction to a Maritime track. A fair patronage was given it although it will take some time for race-track frequenters in this section to get accustomed to it.

## Noticeable Improvement

The management has made some noticeable improvements. Entrance to the grounds is direct from the ticket sellers' windows which is much better than the former arrangement under which one had to fight one's way out after buying tickets. The division of the grandstand into sections with numbered seats and a coupon system would be a further improvement which the public would much appreciate as it would prevent over-crowding and the blocking of aisles of the stand.

## Change in Today's Card

Starter Frank J. Power of Halifax yesterday announced a slight change in today's card the 2.25 Trot and Pace being substituted for the 2.16 Trot and Pace. The Free-for-All this afternoon is the big feature of the meet with the fastest field in the Maritime Provinces—Fern Hal, John A. Hal, White Sox and Peter Farren.

## 2.30 Mixed Class

Touz the favorite in the 2.30 Class lived right up to expectations winning in straight heats. Zua Baughman was distanced in the first heat and Tony B. and Manrico Belle were second and third respectively in each heat and the money.

## 2.16 Trot and Pace

Exposer was backed heavily to win the 2.16 Class but the field was out to beat him and succeeded. The race went to Jennie Penn the Fredericton trotting stallion getting third money. In the first heat Exposer finished in third position but was set back to fifth for pulling over on Lacopia. Driver Lint explained to the judges that he could not prevent his horse from doing that. In the second heat Exposer was second. Tommy Cotter finished in that position but was put back to third for breaking as he came to the wire. Cotter was doing well however and finished the third heat in second position while Exposer with Driver Sharon up was fourth.

## 2.14 Trot and Pace

But three horses faced the starter in the 2.14 Mixed Class the fastest of the day. Roy Volo was the favorite but finished in third place for the money. Starter Power had difficulty in getting these horses away and there was a great deal of tiresome scoring. During this Roy Volo acted very badly and the scoring made him worse. Bob Mac was similarly affected but not to the same degree. Bob Mac won the first heat in the fast time of 2.11 1/2 equalling Adioo Guy's track mark with Royal McKinney a good second. The second heat went to the

Aroostook horse in a way that made many think that he would be the winner of the race. In both heats Roy Volo was an indifferent third. The third heat was the one which caused the kicking. Royal McKinney was leading for the half but to the audible expressed surprise of the grandstand took the outside at the beginning of the second half and the others went inside and ahead. This incident resulted in the judges taking Driver Gerow down and substituting Peter Carroll. This did not seem to improve matters for the McKinney horse broke again and again in the heat. Roy Volo was a good second in each of these heats which went to Bob Mac.

HAND GRENADES  
WERE USED BY

Coblentz, —Hand grenades left over from the war were used effectively recently by enraged civilians in Zoppot in West Prussia who attacked food stores on the ground that the shopkeepers were profiteering. According to information reaching American army headquarters a mob, armed with grenades and other weapons, attacked in numbers the stores which were known to have charged high prices.

In the interior of Germany margarine has been quoted recently at 6 marks per pound whereas it formerly cost 2.08 marks per pound. This is attributed to the fact that large quantities have lately been bought abroad at higher prices than formerly owing to the low rate of German exchange. The official rate of exchange for August at army headquarters is two marks, twenty-two pennings for one franc, giving the mark a value in American money of a fraction more than six cents.

CHILDREN RULE

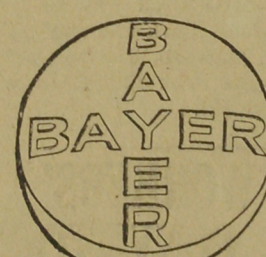
Juneau, Alaska, Aug. 15—Mere man has little voice in governing affairs on Eskimo inhabited Little Dimede, one of the Diomedes Islands that are cut in two by the international boundary line across the Bering Sea between Alaska and Siberia. Women and children do most of the ruling, according to reports reaching the Alaska Territorial Bureau of Publicity here. Before a man can make a purchase he must get his wife's consent. If a mother is living with a married son or daughter her consent must be obtained. Wealth is estimated in skins and the rich provide for the poor.
