## SOLDIER MEMBERS ARE OPPOSED TO GRATUITIES

Some Plain Talk on the Subject Heard in Parliament Yesterday—Col. J. A. Currie Thinks the Request of the Soldiers is Reasonable—Dr. Manion, "Chubby" Powers and Colonel Peck Go on Record as Opposed to the Grant.

Ottawa, Sept. 16th—Apart from Colonel J. A. Currie, the proposal that all returned soldiers should receive an additional gratuity of \$2,000 did not receive much support from returned fighting men who are members of the house or Colonel Currie, who moved the adjournment of the house in order that the matter might be discussed, closed a fairly long speech with an unqualified approval of the proposal and also advocated special consideration for university graduates who have served overseas.

Captain R. J. Manion who won a Military Cross in France and Major D. L. Redman, who was wounded at Ypres, both thought that the seven or eight hundred million dollars involved in the proposal would be more than the country could undertake to pay, but both favored additional aid for men who really need it. Dr. Manion spoke of the magnificent services rendered by the Canadian corps and thought that many soldiers would not care to sell the great heritage of gratitude they have earned for a mess of pottage. Some system he said, should be devised to help needy cases and young soldiers who desire to go to college should be aided.

Major Redman expressed his satisfaction with the government's decision to name a parliamentary committee. This committee, he said, would report before the end of the session and any necessary money bill could be passed.

#### Shifting Responsibility

Major C. G. Power, Quebec South, another Military Cross winner thought there was too much disposition on the part of returned men to spend their gratuities before going to work. He was opposed to the payment of any further bonus to returned men. He expressed his disapproval of the plank in the platform of the Liberal party which advocates the payment of cash bonuses to soldiers. The government in deciding on a committee he said, was shifting the responsibility to private members.

Major G. H. Andrews was sympathetically inclined toward the soldiers but did not express a definite opinion as to an additional gratuity. The unrest among soldiers, he attributed to inevitable injustices arising out of war. Colonel C. H. Peck, V.C. who has more war decorations than any other member disassociated himself from the question of cheap demagoguery being played to the returned soldier. All the soldier wanted, he said, was a square deal. Something should be done for the men who had served longest.

Captain P. McGibbon said the demand for money was due to unrest which arose from the success of those who stayed at home.

Speakers other than ex-soldiers, included Dr. Michael Clark, who was inclined to blame parliament for the present situation and favored a gratuity sufficient to put soldiers through the winter months.

#### Will Not Take it Up

The proposal put forward by returned soldiers that a gratuity of \$2,000 shall be paid to every man who served at the front and that \$1,500 and \$1,000 shall be given to those who served in England and Canada respectively would not be considered by the government. Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, speaking in the house tonight, stated that the parliamentary committee which will be appointed to deal with the new soldiers' civil re-establishment bill will not take up this matter. He stated that the proposition that every returned man, regardless of his financial situation, shall be paid this gratuity, is not in the interests of the country or the men themselves.

Mr. Doherty's statement came after a large number of members had expressed their views on the matter in a debate, precipitated by Colonel John Currie on a motion to adjourn

the house in order to discuss the question of gratuities.

The minister of justice declared that the government had given every opportunity to representatives of the soldiers to state their views and had given them every courtesy. "There was no slamming of doors in the faces of any soldiers," he said. The government after giving every consideration to the proposal had decided that it was not feasible and had stated its decision frankly.

As far as the appointment of a royal commission was concerned Mr. Doherty stated that the government could not see what good end could be served by such action. The prime minister in a letter to the secretary of the G. U. V. A. had offered to place at the disposal of representatives of the soldiers all the facts which led to the government's decision. What reason was there for appointing a commission to ascertain facts which were already in the possession of the government.

#### Forward Movement

Rev. R. J. D. Simpson gave an inspiring address upon the Forward movement. A great spiritual program is planned to begin Sept. 28th and to culminate in the last week of February 1920. The Anglican Presbyterian Congregational and Methodist Churches are co-operating and each week has a definite objective. The President of the Conference commended the movement and pointed out methods by which it could be put into operation, which were later adopted by the meeting.

Rev. E. A. Smith gave a stirring address as the organizer in New Brunswick for the Interchurch Movement.

#### Support is Pledged

The District by resolution approved the program, pledged its hearty support to the project and accepted as its share of the financial objective the raising of a sum of \$20,000 for missions, colleges, social service, and the Supperannation Fund of the church.

#### Executive Committee

An executive committee consisting of Rev. Geo. M. Young, Rev. John J. Pinkerton and Mr. J. M. Lemont was appointed to apportion this amount to the various circuits and to report to the November meeting of the District. Considerable enthusiasm was shown and it was regarded as altogether feasible.

Rev. B. W. Turner was reappointed Statistical Secretary. The next meeting will be with the Keswick church in November next.

Mr. Donald Innes of Tobique River a veteran agriculturalist is among the welcome visitors at the provincial exhibition.

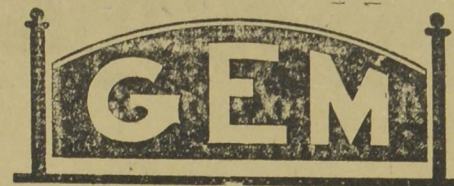
## TENDERS FOR COAGULATING BASIN
