### THE HANDY PAPER BAG.

Don't Throw Away Paper Bags—At any Rate Not All of Them.

Don't throw away your paper bags, or at any rate not all of them. When there is sickness in the family and the rooms are heated by stoves, it is very disturbing for the patient to hear coal put on. Fill a lot of paper bags with coal at the bin and fill a hod with them, then, when the fire needs new coal, drop a bagful on—the bag will burn, so will the coal. It's a neat way to do all of the time, saves lots of coal dust from flying around the room.

The large sized bags are fine for putting away fur, velvet and woollen things. No moths will ever get to them. Paste the top together, put in one bag and draw another one over the paste; save using the smelly moth-balls, etc. For a great many of us it is more convenient to use things out of the bags in which they come from the store, like sugar, rice, meat, etc.

If you will turn the top of the bag over an inch or two as if you were going to hem it on the right side, it makes the edge firm and you can dip out the contents without spilling. Try it and prove it.

When you want to rub off the stove, slip your hand into a strong paper bag. It will save the hands from the stove blacking.

Have a paper bag in a tin tomato can to put the table and sink scraps in. You can close the top of the bag; no odor will come from it until it can be disposed of by burning or carried to the garbage can.

If you want to save seeds from plants tie a small paper bag over when the flower is nearly ripe and the wind will not scatter the seeds, you will have them in your paper bag, and if you want to have a good laugh some time, slip small paper bags over katie's feet and tie them on.

### STOCKS AND JABOTS.

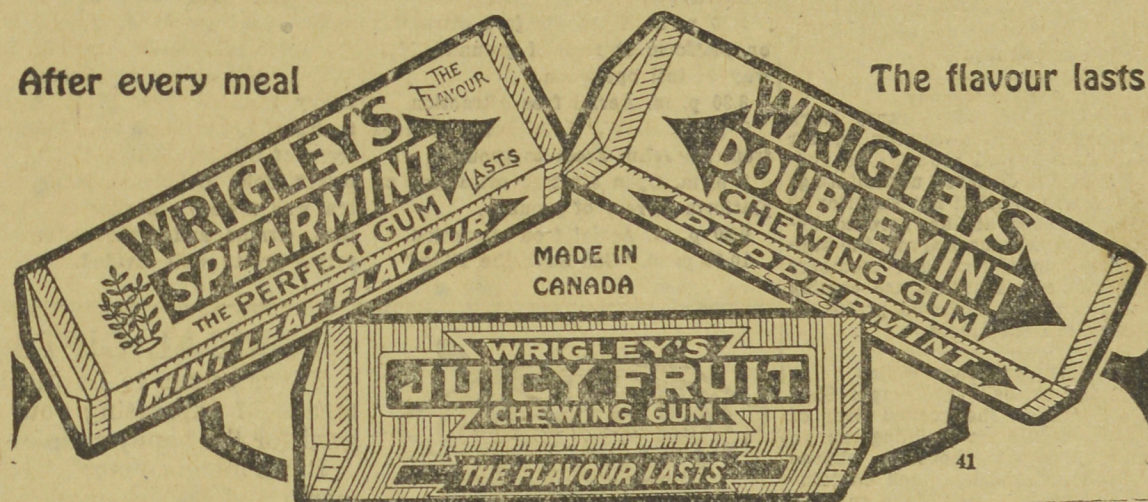
