All the ministers of the Fredericton District of the Methodist Church with a large number of laymen met in the Methodist Church, Fredericton, Tuesday at 10 a. m. The chairman Rev. Geo. M. Young presided. There were also present Rev. R. J. D. Simpson of Toronto, Rev. H. E. Thomas, President of the Conference and Rev. E. F. Smith of St. John in the interest of the Interchurch Forward Movement.

Rev. Dr. George Steele Supt. of Missions was also in attendance.

The assessments for the contingent and general conference funds were made upon the circuits of the District Resolution Re Insurance

Attention was called to the fact that many churches and parsonages were without insurance and a resolution was adopted calling upon the trustees to insure them as far as possible.

ATTENDANCE RECORD FOR FIRST TWO DAYS OF THE EXHIBITION WERE SMASHED LAST NIGHT

Everything in Full Swing Now—Judging in All Departments Well Advanced—Fredericton Winners in Many Sections—Open-air Free Attractions Seen Today—The Whip Making a Big Hit—Turnstile Record Shows Big Margin Over 1915 So Far—New Features Among Midway Freaks.

Favored with two days of fine weather the New Brunswick Provincial Exhibition of 1919 in this city broke attendance records, the turnstiles registering a total of \$661 up to last night. For the corresponding period of 1915 the attendance was 6,007 giving the fair a big margin to the good. A comparative statement of the two exhibitions by days is as follows: First day 1919, 3,576; 1915, 1,912. Second day, 1919, 5,085; 1915, 4,095.

Midway Running Full-blast

Today the Midway is running full blast. The rain of last night did little damage to anything and did not dampen the spirits of those who attend the exhibition and big crowds are reported today. All night long crews were at work erecting the Merry-go-round, the Ferris Wheel and the Whip and to day all are being patronized extensively.

Brand New Feature

The whip is a brand new feature of this or any other fair in New Brunswick and is taking well with the crowd. The big tubs in which the patrons of The Whip are "whipped" are well filled.

Open Air Attractions

The free open air attractions also are in operation today and the program announced by Secretary Hooper for tomorrow gives them good positions. They are two in number The Tasmanian Troupe and Los Rodriguez. One will show on the big platform at the rear of the grounds and the other is an aerial act.

Thursday's Program

A half holiday on Thursday in factories and mills is possible. The full day's program for Thursday is announced as follows:

Band Inside Building

A change in the band arrangements has been made and after this the band will play inside the main building at night and during the day on the platform at the rear of the grounds as well as in the front. The Milltown Cornet Band is on the second day of its engagement today. The G. W. V. A. Band will play Friday afternoon and the Fredericton Brass Band Friday night. On Saturday the G. W. V. A. Band will play at night and the Fredericton Brass Band in the afternoon. The engagement of the Marysville Brass Band has been cancelled by the band.

Sideshows Well Patronized

The principal sideshows of the Midway are doing a good business. The Dreamland Shows have some features which have not been seen before in Fredericton notably Capt. Walters the Blue Man with Skin and flesh a clay-blue color, Miss Lillian the Albino, The Living Skeleton, Baron Paucci, who stands all of twenty seven inches in height and is a strong favorite with the girls, and a Filipino head-hunter who served in the American Expeditionary Force in France. The Palace of Wonders also is showing some unusual features, the armless and legless man who shaves himself, makes and smokes a cigarette and does other remarkable things attracting much attention.

Rapid Progress in Judging

Rapid progress is being made in the judging and by tomorrow it will be well toward completion. Boswell Bros. of P. E. I. are making a good showing in the sheep section and Dickie Bros. of Truro and the Hardings of Welsford are showing well in the cattle. R. A. Snowball of Chatham is a heavy winner with horses. H. C. Jewett with Exposer was first this morning with Standard-bred Horses and his Harvest Hope was second. H. G. Kitchen's The Nanor was third. In the packed boxes and barrels of apples in the Horticultural Section the St. John Valley Nurseries of Burton were heavy winners with F. E. & H. G. Smith of Long Reach and S. B. Hatheway of Springhill also coming in for prizes. John Bebbington of Fredericton was a heavy winner in Floriculture. Grains and Swine showed the prizes pretty well divided.
