## NOTICE

NOTICE is hereby given that appli-  
cation will be made the applicants  
hereinafter named, pursuant to "New  
Brunswick Companies Act, 1916," and  
the Acts in amendment thereto, in-  
corporating the applicants and such  
other persons as may become share-  
holders in the proposed Company, a  
body corporate under the name of  
"The Capital Hydro-Electric Company,  
Limited," for the purposes hereinafter  
mentioned:

1. The objects for which incorpora-  
tion is sought and the proposed pow-  
ers of the Company, are as follows:

(a) To carry on the business of an  
electric light, heat and power Com-  
pany in all its branches.  
(b) To provide, purchase, lease or  
otherwise acquire and to construct,  
lay down, erect, establish, operate  
maintain and carry out all necessary  
works, stations, engines, machinery,  
plant, cables, wires, lines, generators,  
accumulators, lamps meters transform-  
ers, apparatus, appurtenances and ap-  
pliances connected with the genera-  
tion, accumulation, distribution, trans-  
mission, supply, sale, use and employ-  
ment of electricity and to generate, ac-  
cumulate, transmit, distribute, supply  
and sell electricity, for the purposes of  
electric lighting, heating, traction and  
motive power, and for industrial and  
other purposes, and to undertake and  
to enter into contracts and agreements  
for the lighting of cities, towns, streets  
buildings, and other places, and for  
the supply of electric light, heat and  
motive power and hydro-electric power  
for any or all public or private pur-  
poses.

(c) To make, build, construct, main-  
tain and operate reservoirs, water-  
works, cisterns, dams, canals, culverts,  
conduits and other pipes and ap-  
pliances, and to execute and do all things  
necessary for obtaining, storing, sell-  
ing, delivering, measuring and distri-  
buting water for the creation, main-  
tenance and development of hydraulic,  
electrical or other mechanical power,  
for any other purpose of the company.

(d) To construct, improve, work,  
maintain, carry out or control and to  
purchase, lease or otherwise acquire,  
and to hold, use, sell, lease or other-  
wise dispose of any lands, works,  
mains, machinery, or any roads, ways,  
bridges, reservoirs, watercourses, elec-  
trical works, shops and other enter-  
prises and work which may seem cap-  
able of being used in connection with  
the Company's undertakings for the  
time being, or calculated to benefit the  
Company, and to equip, maintain and  
operate by electric, hydraulic or other  
mechanical power, all works belong-  
ing to the Company, or in which the  
Company may be interested, and to  
contribute towards or otherwise assist  
in the construction, improvement,  
maintenance, management, carrying  
out or control thereof.

(e) To apply for and receive by en-  
actment, transfer, grant, lease or other-  
wise, and to exercise and carry out  
any statute or concession, license,  
power, franchise, right or privilege re-  
lating to the generation, accumulation,  
development, distribution, supply, sale  
and employment of electric energy,  
water powers or water which any Gov-  
ernment or authority, or any corpora-  
tion or public body may be empowered  
to enact, make or grant, and to pay  
for, aid in and contribute towards car-  
rying the same into effect, using any  
of the Company's shares, bonds and  
assets to defray the necessary cost,  
charges and expenses thereof.

(f) To carry on any other business  
capable of being carried on in con-  
nection with the business or objects of  
the Company, or calculated to render  
profitable directly or indirectly the  
Company's properties or rights.

(g) To purchase or otherwise ac-  
quire the shares, bonds or securities of  
any Company or Corporation not-  
withstanding the provisions of Sec-  
tion 49 of the "New Brunswick Com-  
panies Act, 1916," and pay for the same  
in shares or other securities of this  
Company, and to hold, sell, hypothec-  
ate, vote upon or otherwise deal in  
the said shares or securities so pur-  
chased, and to guarantee payment of  
or dividends and interest on the  
said shares or securities, and to  
promote any Company having objects  
altogether or in part similar to this  
Company.

(h) To sell or otherwise dispose of  
the property, rights, franchises and  
undertakings of the Company, or any  
part thereof, in any way the Company  
may think fit, and in particular for  
shares or other securities of any com-  
pany having objects in part or altogeth-  
er similar to those of this Company.

(i) To consolidate with any other  
Company having objects similar in  
whole or in part with this Company.

(j) To purchase or otherwise ac-  
quire all or any of the property, fran-  
chises, good-will, rights and privileges  
held or enjoyed by any person, firm, or  
Company carrying on any business  
similar to that which this Company is  
authorized to carry on, and to pay for  
the same wholly or partly in cash, or  
wholly or partly in shares of this Com-  
pany or otherwise, and to assume the  
liabilities of such person, firm, or Com-

## AROUND THE CITY

The formal opening of the Valley  
Railway from Fredericton to St. John  
is going to add materially to the grow-  
ing importance of Fredericton as a  
railway centre. There are now eleven  
trains a day departing from Frederic-  
ton, six of which are on the Frederic-  
ton and Gibson branches of the C. P.  
R. The C. N. R. has four trains  
daily each way (the Valley Railway  
included) and the Gibson and Minto  
but one. The Canada Eastern branch  
of the C. N. R. was acquired by the  
Federal government in 1904, since  
which time the train service has been  
greatly improved and the traffic, both  
freight and passenger, has increased  
enormously. The inauguration of a  
trunk line service from St. John to  
Quebec by way of Fredericton will  
mean a further large increase in  
traffic for this road. It must be ap-  
parent to all now that the Federal  
government made no mistake when it  
acquired from the late Mr. Alexander  
Gibson the property of the Canada  
Eastern Railway. The road had open-  
ed up a rich section of country and  
had served a very useful purpose in  
connection with the great lumber in-  
dustry which was carried on by Mr.  
Gibson in his palmy days. The govern-  
ment, through the department of Rail-  
ways and canals, then presided over  
by the late Hon. R. H. Emmerson drove  
remarkably good bargain when they  
bought the road for \$800,000, a sum  
which would not today pay for the  
purchase of the rails and sleepers. The  
building of this road and its sale to  
the government was only one of many  
benefits which the late Mr. Gibson  
conferred upon the people of his na-  
tive province.

Speaking of the old Canada Eastern  
Railway it is well to recall the fact  
that the movement which culminated  
in its acquisition by the government or-  
iginated in Fredericton about twenty  
five years ago. Somebody proposed it  
at a Board of Trade meeting and sug-

gested that a delegation be sent to  
Ottawa to urge the matter upon the  
Federal authorities. It was then that  
the late F. B. Coleman, a versatile  
hotel keeper of mammoth frog fame,  
rose to his feet and questioned the  
wisdom of going on a pilgrimage to  
Ottawa. Said he: "The road  
is owned and controlled by Mr.  
Gibson and why not send a man to  
Marysville and see if he is willing to  
sell. When we get his consent it will  
then be time enough to take the mat-  
ter up with the Dominion govern-  
ment." The common sense remark by  
Mr. Coleman impressed those present  
and resulted in a delegation, of which  
he was one, being sent to Marysville.  
They talked the matter over with Mr.  
Gibson, who told them that he had the  
road, which was serving the public  
and paying its way, but as he had  
other interests which demanded his  
attention he would be quite willing  
to consider an offer from the Federal  
government. The next move was a  
public meeting in the city opera house  
which was attended by citizens of  
Fredericton and a big delegation from  
the North Shore. Hon. John Morrissey  
who afterwards became Minister of  
Public Works, was one of the latter  
and delivered a characteristic speech  
in favor of the government purchase
