Royal Visitor Interviewed at Halifax by Lady Correspondent of Boston Post—Says That His Principal Hobby is Outdoor Exercise in Every Form—The Prince is Very Democratic in His Manner.

Ruth Bodwell of the Boston Post writes her paper from Halifax as follows:

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 18.—A precedent was broken here today when I interviewed his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. It has stood ever since British Kings were Kings and printing presses invented. Never in the history of the royal line of Great Britain has a member of the writing fraternity approached a scion of the blood royal with a question and had that questioned answered.

Yet this morning, the Prince of Wales, emerging from the North End Military Hospital, which he had been visiting on his tour of the city, allowed Lieutenant-Governor McCallum Grant of the province of Nova Scotia to present me, and while he shook my hand, clasp I made the most of my opportunity.

"Your girls are wonderful, those I have seen," said the prince, smiling, that pleased smile of his at my question and at what must have appeared as another adventure in this land of America.

"I haven't seen so many, you know, some on the continent and a few at home in England," continued the prince, "but they were wonderful and I am looking forward to seeing more."

## Exercise His Hobby

"My hobby," repeated the gallant prince after me, while photographers of film corporations and world-renowned newspapers and the King's own photographer, Ernest Brooks, pressed about eager to photograph an historic event: "If I have one, it is outdoor exercise in any form. Anything to keep me fit, you know."

His royal highness looked serious for the fraction of a second as he thought, perhaps, of ordeals such as extended tours of England's domains, which all his life will exact heavy toll of his endurance and time.

He laughed aloud in boyish confusion when I asked him what his Queen mother's parting advice to him had been.

"Oh, I say," he burst forth, "she gave me loads. I can't pass it on, really. It was just for me—my peculiar needs, you know."

## Hopes to See Boston

"You will come to Boston?" I queried.

"I hope to," responded the still smiling royal prince.

Then it was over. The soldier heir to a mighty throne saluted, stepped into his car, and I drew back to mine; while monocular lords looked on and wondered what the bally old empire was coming to anyhow.

Now that we have his verdict about our girls, we know it will be mutual. His royal highness is of such a personality that he will be loved throughout the United States when he visits it and cities will vie with each other to entertain him. It will not be because he is a royal prince, but because he is first, last and foremost, a prince of a young man.

## Calls Host "Boss"

This afternoon at the Studley Quoit Club at the Northwest Arm, where he paused on his way from luncheon to watch this ancient game, he was loudly cheered by the crowds that flocked to pay him court as "our democratic prince." These same quoit throwers sang "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" several times around and the youthful heir drew a thunderous laugh from the people crowding about him when he referred to the president of the club as "boss."

He has a pleasing voice, very cultivated after the English manner but much crisper and more energetic than many we hear.

## No Sign of Whiskers

Close up the prince is more mature in features than he looks at a distance. And I shall have to admit that he is at least two inches taller than I judged him to be, or about 5 feet 7 inches.

His blond hair is worn parted quite low on the left side and brushed back and he hasn't a sign of a beard or a mustache. He has a very good mouth and chin and a pair of light grey eyes which look straight into the face of whomever he is speaking to. They light up when he is pleased, but they can show very, very bored depths at times.

He has a short upper lip, that with his fairness and fine color are the secret of the extreme youthfulness he at first conveys.

One of his brows, which are light in

color, but well marked, has a tendency to arch, while the left one is straight. This gives him a little quizzical expression at times, which adds to the interest of his face. When it is animated it is very bright and care-free and pleasure-loving. In repose it is possible that David as his family call him, is something of a dreamer of dreams.

## Two Rings on Little Finger

The only jewelry the Prince of Wales has worn when he has been visiting are two rings on the little finger of his left hand. One is a narrow band resembling a wedding ring and next to this he wears a small ring. Possibly it bears the wales crest.

After his royal highness had complied with all of the ceremonials of the day, such as laying the corner stone at Dalhousie University for the women's residence and that of the navy league, he was taken to Government House where a free-for-all reception ensued, such as our President and the Governor's give once in the year to all comers.

The throng that pressed into the drawing rooms was of all conditions and classes of men, women and children. The dauntless prince shook hands with every one who would. And again did monocular Englishmen and men of title of more or less importance from the homeland marvel at the sight.

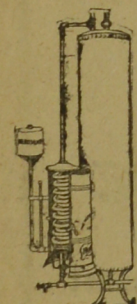
