## THE PRINCE OF WALES HAD BUSY DAY AT QUEBEC

Presented With an Address By the Chairman of the Battlefields Commission—Placed Wreaths on the Wolfe and Montcalm Monuments—The Quebec Bridge Officially Opened by His Royal Highness.

Quebec, Aug. 22—At 3 o'clock this afternoon the Prince of Wales attended by his chief of staff and his suite motored from the citadel to the Montcalm monument on Lansdowne park, where the prince amidst the acclaiming crowds deposited a wreath. He then proceeded along Grand Allee to the battlefields park, where he laid another wreath on the Wolfe monument and afterwards unfurled the Union Jack at the new flag staff for the park, and as the flag fluttered in the breeze the prince was cheered to the echo. He was then presented with an address by Sir George Garneau, chairman of the battlefields commission.

His royal highness in his reply said: "I feel it not only a great pleasure but also a great privilege to inaugurate the Quebec Battlefields park."

"I have just laid a wreath upon the memorial to Wolfe and Montcalm and before I leave this park, I hope to lay another upon the monument Aux Braves."

The great war from which we have just victoriously emerged enables us to look back to our forefathers of that time with pride of men who feel that they have justified their ancestry and maintained its great traditions. I thank you for your loyal reference to my father the king, and I wish a rapid completion to the plans of this fine park."

The Great War Veterans were then reviewed by the prince and sixteen of them were presented decorations. This scene was attended by fully ten thousand people and they gave the prince a mighty cheer as he motored to another section of the park and deposited a wreath on the monument of Aux Braves.

### Ceremony on Quebec Bridge

His royal highness and his suite arrived at Quebec Bridge about 4.30 o'clock.

The officials and guests on the train numbered about one hundred and fifty and at the north entrance to the bridge, the prince unveiled the plates, upon which were inscribed the names of the federal ministers, the engineers and the contractors, who had a hand in the construction of the giant structure. The train then proceeded slowly across the bridge and on the south side the prince unveiled two more plates. As the train crossed and re-crossed the immense span, the engineers who had erected it explained to the royal guest, how the undertaking had been successfully accomplished. On the return of the train to the south shore, the prince declared the bridge officially opened.

The prince was then presented with an address by Mayor Lavigneur to which he replied in French as follows:

"Mr. Mayor and Gentlemen:—I thank you for the honor you have done me in inviting me to come and preside at the official inauguration of this magnificent enterprise. I feel it a great pleasure in crowning today the initial undertaking inaugurated by my ancestor King Edward at Victoria Bridge Montreal in 1860."

"Since that time the construction of Canadian industries records the vast and intrepid conception of your statesmen, your financiers and your engineers, which has permitted the two races who founded Canadian civilization to make of it a new nation, and thus bound in a firm unit the coast of the Atlantic to that of the Pacific."

"Gentlemen, in inaugurating the great Quebec Bridge, I salute the indomitable genius and the bright destiny of the Canadian nation, the imperishable jewel of the British crown."

### Normal School Opening

Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, principal of the Provincial Normal School announced this morning that the Normal School opening would take place on September 2nd. So far the number of applications for admission are as follows: 1st class, 57, 2nd class 98, 3rd class 45, making a total of 200. The applications will without doubt be increased before the opening of the Normal School and it is expected that the number of students in attendance will be about the same as last year.

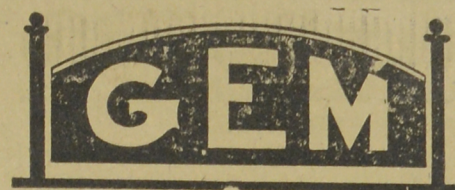
