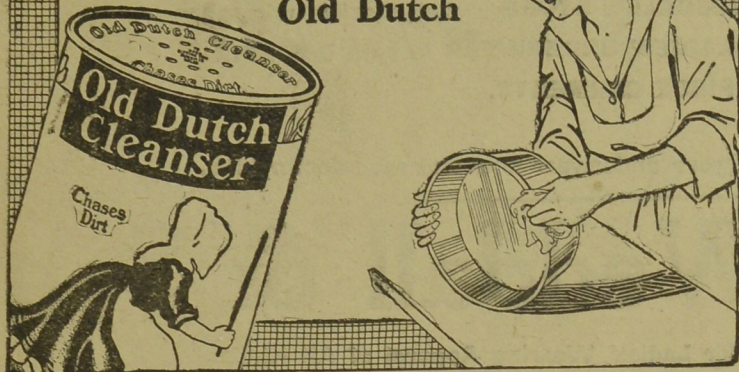

## AROUND THE TOWN

The generally mild and pleasant weather which has favored this season of the country for several weeks past recalls to mind the fact that not every autumn has been without heavy rains and storms. Some have been marked with such heavy rains that floods resulted with tremendous damage to highways, bridges and railways. The autumn of 1900 was marked by the most disastrous storms which had been seen in years. All railways suffered but the main line of the Canadian Pacific from Fredericton Junction to St. John was so badly washed out that it was several weeks before traffic could be restored to its ordinary routine. The storm incidentally placed Fredericton on a main line of travel where it remained for some weeks. This was through the C. P. R. chartering the principal steamers on the St. John River and routing its traffic in mails and passengers through this city. The Montreal train came into Fredericton and passengers baggage and mails were transferred to steamers which took them to St. John, boats running by night as well as by day. Expenses at local hotels were met by the railway. Early in November the rail service was restored but was slow on account of the numerous temporary bridges over washouts between Fredericton Junction and St. John.

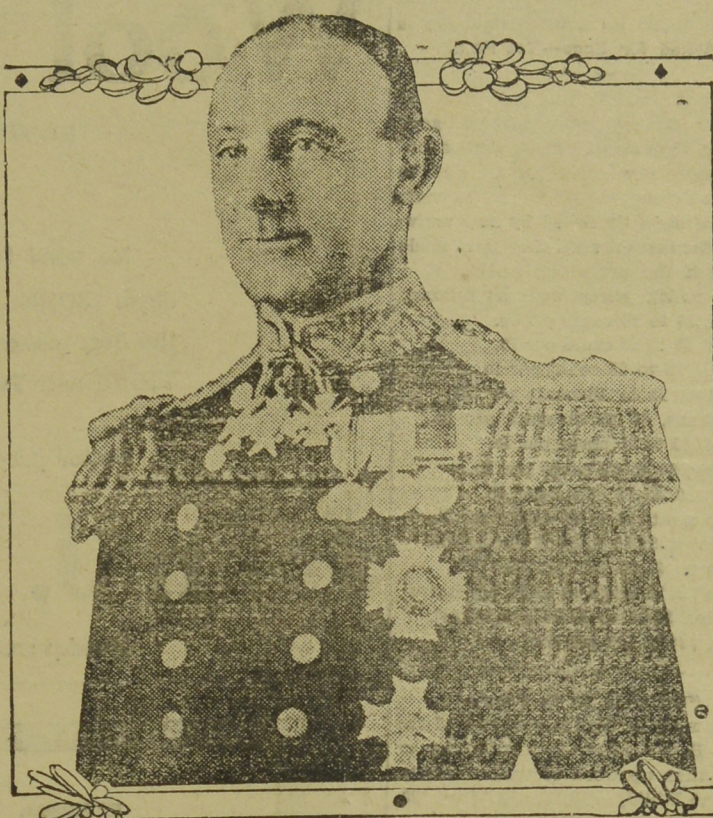

## JELLCOE IN CANADA

That season saw the longest tour ever attempted by a Fredericton City Rugby team. The team had to go by steamer as far as St. John and thence went to Sackville and Truro. Mt. Allison was played to a draw but the Truro team won 3 to 0 in a game marked by fistfights and other diversions. It was the same season at a later date that Fredericton City defeated Dalhousie University here and on that account claimed the Maritime championship although it had been beaten in Truro.

A Fredericton City team after that date never played farther away from home than St. John and after 1902 did not get that far except in 1910. It is difficult to tell why there has been such a slump in Rugby in this as well as other cities of the province. Perhaps next season with the public playground in operation on Queen's

Square, there will be sufficient interest to get a City team going.

The oddities of the climate of New Brunswick are well illustrated by the summer-like temperature which has been experienced during the last week with the closing of navigation by the freezing of the St. John River not more than three weeks away and probably nearer than that, for it is very seldom that the river is not sealed before the end of the present month. 1915 was a remarkable year for the fact that the river was not closed until December 11th. The latest closing on record was in 1878 when the date was December 18th. In 1913 the river froze December 1st.

The tragedies connected with the importation of "booze" during a protracted dry spell like the last two years are numerous and terrible. With in the past few months a local business man had occasion to visit Montreal and while there had an opportunity to purchase a quantity of Scotch "licker" at a bargain. All that remained was to get it home past the vigilant sleuths who operate under Chief Inspector "W.D." Strategy was employed and the wet goods consigned by express to a well known firm which deals in goods which keeps the feet dry and not the interior wet. To make assurance doubly sure the owner kept his eye on the package and is positive that it reached Fredericton Junction intact. When it was opened in this city each bottle contained excellent samples of water similar to that supplied by the C. P. R. to its passengers.

No such bad fortune attended a Woodstock man who imported some "wet goods" from Montreal. The container was in the centre of a barrel of cucumber pickles and arrived safely. There was a profit on both pickles and "booze."

In intercollegiate Rugby matters seem to have reversed themselves. Some fifteen years ago it was Mount Allison which was regarded as the stumbling-block of U. N. B. aspirations and Acadia as the team with which the local University could get an even break or better. In late years the position has been reversed. Acadia has given U. N. B. serious upsets and Mt. Allison has not played as good football as the Red and Black.
