### A FAMILY ROW.

The St. John Globe (independent), in commenting on the "family row" which developed at the recent Opposition convention, has this to say:

"Hon. Mr. Baxter's description of his colleagues—the three St. John representatives—as disloyal and hypocrites, was the outstanding feature of a speech in which support of Hon. James Murray as party leader was vehemently demanded. When the vote was called the three members from St. John and three other members, Messrs. Lewis Smith and Peck, of Albert, and Hunter, of York, declined to give assent. These six practically one-third of the opposition strength in the Legislature, would not stultify themselves by voting support to a leader they had in the Legislature voted neglectful or incompetent and guilty of making false returns to the Auditor General. The future course of these six members has not been disclosed, perhaps will not be disclosed, until the Legislature next meets; but it is hardly likely they will accept in the House a leadership they declined to accept in the party convention. While interest naturally centres in explanations which must sooner or later be made of the ex-Auditor General's as yet unexplained attack on the St. John representatives, the attitude of these members of the Legislature who refused to endorse Hon. James A. Murray's reelection as leader is not lightly to be overlooked. Practically one-third of the party strength is openly hostile and is expected to follow a more or less independent course. The six members—and there may be others—apparently do not see their way to support the leader they condemned, the leader who consented to their condemnation as the answer to disclosures which touched intimately his personal relations with contractors under his department and which involved the province in two grave scandals."

According to the Globe, it was Mr. Hunter of York, who comes from the good old Presbyterian village of Harvey, who voted against Mr. Murray's reinstatement as leader of the party. Those who got the idea into their heads that it was Mr. Pinder must stand corrected.

The local hold-up organ pretends to have discovered some irregularities in connection with the construction of the Valley Railway, and intimates that the facts are likely to be given to the public. If any boodling has been going on, the graft organ would naturally know about it and would be in on the ground floor if there was any chance. In this case, however, it is evident that there was no chance, and Mr. E. S. Carter, the secretary of the company, in a letter to the press, gives the organ carte blanche to pass its "information" along to the public. In other words, he has turned the tables on the hold-up organ by inviting it to "put up or shut up." Under the old regime, when the graft organ made a noise, the "putting up" was invariably done by somebody connected with the railway, but Secretary Carter does not propose to follow this precedent.

The worthy Commodore Stewart, who is a recognized authority on international law, parliamentary rules and practice, etc., is annoyed at those newspapers which have been telling the truth as to happenings at the Opposition convention. What the independent commodore should do is to give his own candid opinion of the recent gathering and of the manner in which the proceedings were conducted. ### GOOD MARKET TODAY

Prices About as Usual—High Prices Asked for Eggs—Not Paid.

A good market was collected at Phoenix Square today with a good variety of produce. Prices were about the same. Eggs sold for 65 and 70 cents a dozen although 80 and 85 cents were persistently asked by new arrivals in the market until they were made aware of the prevailing price.

The ruling prices were as follows: Beef, 10 to 16 cents per lb. Pork, 20 to 26 cents per lb. Lamb, 15 to 25 cents per lb. Mutton, 12 to 18 cents per lb. Chickens, 35 to 40 cents per lb. Fowl, 30 to 35 cents per lb. Butter, 60 to 65 cents per lb. Veal, 12 to 18 cents per lb. Deer meat, 12 to 15 cents per lb. Potatoes, \$2.50 to \$3.00 per barrel. Carrots, \$1.25 per barrel. Turnips, 75 cents to \$1.00 per barrel. Apples, \$2.00 to \$4.00 per barrel. Hay, \$24 to \$27 per ton.

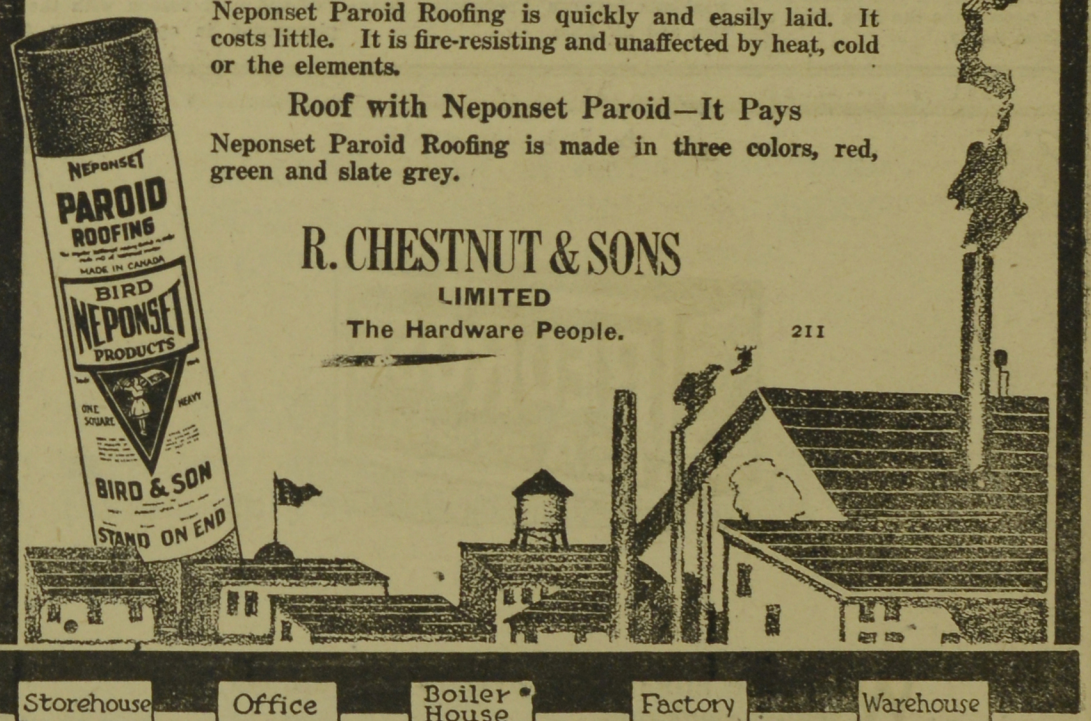

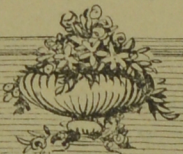
