Prices About as Usual—High Prices Asked for Eggs-Not Paid.

A good market was collected at Phoenix Square today with a good variety of produce. Prices were about the same. Eggs sold for 65 and 70 cents a dozen altoungh 80 and 85 cents were persistently asked by new arrivals in the market until they were made aware of the prevailing price.

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
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
