CANADA'S FUTURE DEPENDS ON LOAN

OPPOSITION BEAR GARDEN CONVENTION

(St. John Globe.)

The Standard is vainly endeavoring to make an issue of the Globe's report of the opposition convention to divert attention from the convention row precipitated by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter's denunciation of his three St. John colleagues, Dr. Campbell, Mr. Tilley and Mr. Potts' as disloyal and hypocritical. That attack Messrs. Campbell, Tilley and Potts answered with a direct and positive declaration that in voting for a resolution declaring Hon. James Murray neglectful or incompetent and guilty of making false returns to the Auditor General, they were voting for a resolution suggested by Baxter himself, approved by both Baxter and Murray and endorsed by a party caucus. Although Hon. Mr. Baxter himself made no answer to this astounding expose, the Standard on three separate occasions has declared his loyalty attack in Messrs. Campbell, Tilley and Potts had no connection with the resolution which made their support of Hon. James Murray as impossible as it has made public support. If Messrs. Campbell, Tilley and Potts were all wrong in assuming that the disloyalty charges hurled against them with such force and vehemence by their colleague referred to that resolution, why did not Hon. Mr. Baxter say so in the convention? Why did he not explain? Why does not the Standard explain? If Messrs. Campbell, Tilley and Potts are guilty of wrongdoing which merited the castigation the ex-Attorney

General took it upon himself to deliver there should be no withholding the facts from their constituents.

Their exposure in the party councils of Hon. Mr. Murray's and Hon. Mr. Baxter's connection with the resolution which held Hon. Mr. Murray up to the country as neglectful or incompetent and as covering his tracks by false reports to the Auditor General, Hon. Mr. Baxter's failure to deny that his attack was connected with this proceeding, and the Standard's own failure to produce evidence to support the assertion that something else was in the ex-Attorney General's mind, stand as reasons for continuing to accept as correct the interpretation put on the attack by the three St. John men themselves. If there is something else, tell it. St. John is entitled to know anything the ex-Attorney General knows, if he really knows anything, to the discredit of the St. John representatives in the Legislature. In the meantime a fact to keep in mind is that the opposition party vote declaring Hon. James A. Murray neglectful or incompetent and guilty of making false returns to the Auditor General, was suggested by Hon. Mr. Baxter and approved by Hon. Mr. Murray himself.

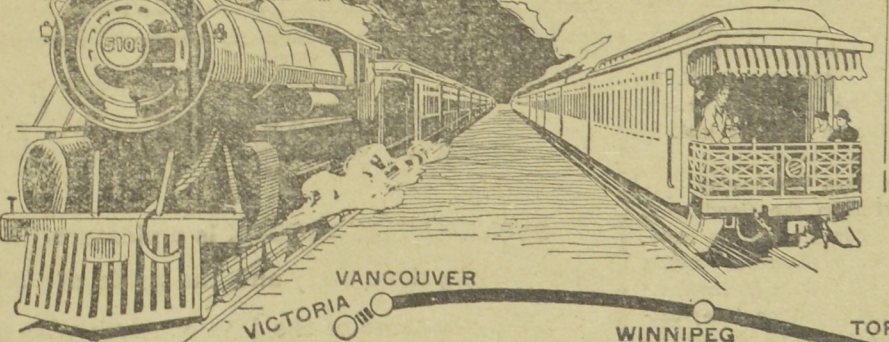
