

LOCAL OFFICER WITH KOLCHAK'S SIBERIAN ARMY

**CAPT. H. H. VANWART IS
SIGNALLING OFFICER**

**Transferred to Imperial Troops
Attached to Kolchak—In-
teresting Experiences
Recorded.**

One Fredericton man is fighting with the armies of Admiral Kolchak in Siberia in an endeavor to stem the tide of Bolshevism. He is Capt. H. H. VanWart, who is signalling officer with the British forces attached to the Kolchak army. Recent letters received from him give little information concerning military movements in Siberia but Capt. VanWart on one occasion was responsible for the removal of thirty carloads of supplies which were threatened by a forward movement of the Bolsheviks. He was successful in getting his train back to a safe place.

Capt. VanWart prior to the outbreak of the European war was signalling officer of the 71st York Regt. He was appointed to the 12th Battalion, C. E. F. in the same capacity and went overseas with it. Later he served in both France and England in staff capacities. He returned to Canada shortly before the organization of the Canadian Siberian Force and was appointed to it upon its withdrawal he transferred to the Imperial forces.

Lives in Boxcar

As the troop-movements depend entirely upon rail transportation, Capt. VanWart has his quarters in a boxcar with a Chinese cook as companion. In much of the country through which Kolchak's troops have moved money has lost almost all value and subsistence is provided by the people of the country.

Capt. VanWart is a son of the late Wesley VanWart of Fredericton and is a graduate of University of New Brunswick.

Will Issue Beaver Licenses

As beaver pelts are up in price at the present time, the charge is moderate.

F., he returned to England where he since has been on service, frequently performing conducting duty.

TWELVE DOLLARS FOR N. B. APPLES AT MONTREAL

**FAMEUSE AND MCINTOSH
REDS AT TOP OF MARKET**

Well Up to Five Thousand Barrels Shipped From Fredericton—Gagetown the Same Quantity.

New Brunswick apples are maintaining the record for quality and high price which they made this season on the Montreal market. Ten dollars per barrel for Macintosh Reds and Fameuse is the average price for No. 1's and five barrels raised by Alex. G. Dunphy of Douglas, York County, brought twelve dollars per barrel.

High Price for Carload

About a week ago a carload of apples was sold f.o.b. Fredericton at prices which averaged five dollars per barrel. This was not a car of selected stock and included but a small quantity of Fameuse or Macintosh Reds. The bulk was ungraded Wealthy, Dudley, Alexander and Milwaukee varieties. This is a remarkable price for apples of the kind.

Heavy Shipments

Between forty five hundred and five thousand barrels of apples have been shipped already this season from the Gagetown district and an equal quantity from Fredericton and vicinity. Woodstock has been the shipping point for a similar quantity. The Montreal market took practically all. These quantities although large compared with what formerly were sent out will be small compared with what will be exported within a few years when all the young orchards planted in recent years begin to bear fully. Only a few of them have borne so far.

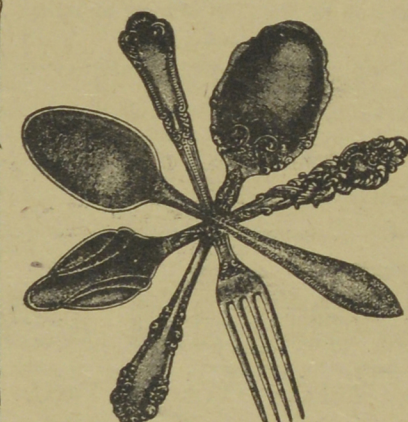
Devon Passes Objective

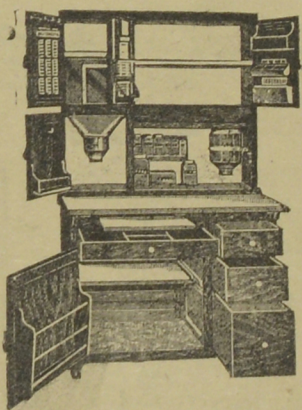
