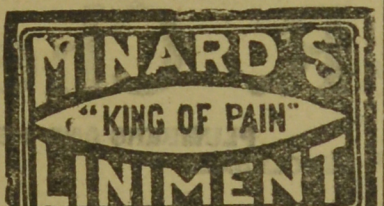

## HOW THE OLD GOVERNMENT WENT FROM BAD TO WORSE

Should Have Instituted a Housecleaning After the Flemming Exposures—A Gross Betrayal of a Public Trust—Bonds of Partizanship Were Too Strong for Tory Politicians—A Warning to All Public Men.

A newspaper published in Nova Scotia expresses satisfaction that there are no such political scandals in that province as we have in New Brunswick. Such a remark furnishes the people of this province with food for thought, for it is the people who are ultimately responsible. If they are content to be represented by men who will do such things as the McQueen and other recent sworn investigations reveal, they will have scandals in abundance. If they will permit themselves to be so influenced by partisanship as to excuse anything that may be done so long as it is done by members of the party and for the alleged benefit of the party, then graft will flourish.

There is a great lesson in recent provincial history for the Liberal party and its representatives in the legislature. The latter should never permit themselves to appear or go on record as champions or even apologists for political rascality. It would be better for a party to go into opposition than maintain power by dishonest political methods. This truth must be impressing itself very strongly upon the mind of every Liberal member of the house as he contemplates the shame of the opposition. If the present opposition had repented even after the Flemming exposure, and reorganized with a determination to retrieve its past, it might have regained public confidence and retained power; but its latter record was worse than the former one. Enough had been revealed prior to the last general election to destroy public confidence and ensure defeat; but the worst was not known at the time because the lid was jammed down by the force of a majority in the house. It was only when the Foster government came into power and lifted the lid that the people could see how their trust had been betrayed. And yet, so strong are the bonds of partisanship that the present opposition members defy public sentiment and try to apply the whitewash brush as was done in the Flemming case. It is true they presented an amendment which was a virtual condemnation of their leaders, but they wanted to go on under the same leaders, and are actually doing so. That condition will exist only until the people are given an opportunity to deal with their unfaithful stewards.

## A Useful Lesson

But, as already pointed out, the lesson is not alone to the opposition party. It stands as a warning to the present government and its supporters. Similar temptations may come to some of them, or they may be asked to overlook petty graft for the benefit of camp-followers; but the people at large want them to pursue an honest, straightforward, fearless course. Our public men must live down the sneering assertion that "they are all alike" meaning that they are all corrupt. There is a general feeling that the Foster government is trying to give the province an honest administration. It is recognized that there are difficulties because the people have become so accustomed to the reign of graft that a right public spirit is far from universal. It is for the leaders to stand upon their honor as sworn representatives and sternly refuse to

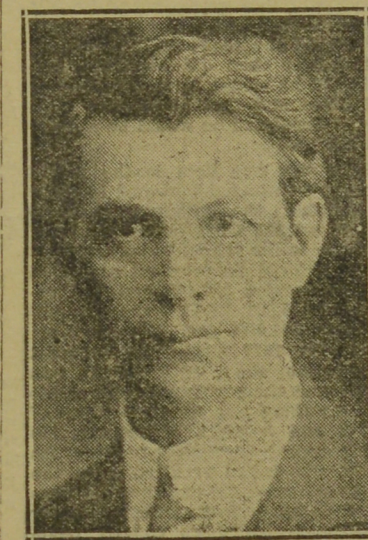
countenance in the political arena what they would scorn to tolerate in their own business relations or in private life. The double standard of morals—one for business dealings between man and man—and another for political dealings, must be abolished. Then our neighbors in other provinces will not point the finger of scorn in our direction.
