WOMEN AND POLITICS.

A correspondent writing to the New York Herald says:

"Let the league of women voters do as it chooses, now that the women of over half the States are enfranchised the time has come to realize that they will no more be swayed by any league than men will. They will elect Mr. Wadsworth President, perhaps, rather than Senator, just to show that they do not need to use coercion to win national suffrage. The election of 1920 bids fair to be more intelligent than any in our history. The soldiers and women war workers will not fail to wield a splendid influence, and these, together with the silent majority of men and women suffragists, should kill political apathy once and for all."

Commenting on the above, the Herald says:

"In countries where equal suffrage has long since passed beyond the experimental stage, it has been found that women exert a steadying influence in both local and national politics. This is because they do not frequent the public houses or political assemblies, but do their own thinking in the quiet of their homes. And each one thinks for herself. Those who are sanguine in regard to the results of giving the franchise to women believe that they will think for themselves and vote in accordance with individual belief, a consummation devoutly to be wished. Of one thing we may be quite sure, and that is that it will be a long time before women will be willing to vote in droves at the behest of politicians. Their proverbially keen intuitions will save them from that fate."

ROCKEFELLER'S MESSAGE.

In an appeal to business men, exhorting them to apply the Golden Rule to the conduct of their business, John D. Rockefeller says:

"As the leaders of industry face this period of construction, what will their attitude be? Will it be that of the stand-patters who ignore the extraordinary changes that have come over the face of the civilized world and have taken place in the minds of men who, arming themselves to the teeth, attempt stubbornly to resist the inevitable and invite open warfare with the other parties in industry and who say what has been and is must continue to be; with our backs to the wall we will fight it out along the old lines or go down in defeat?"

The above words are from one of the greatest captains of industry the world has ever seen. It is a message that all should heed. Great problems face the civilized world today; but they must be earnestly grappled with and overcome.

New Glasgow Chronicle: Freight rates on the Canadian National Railway are sufficient to stagger the ordinary shipper these days. The Canadian National probably needs the money to develop the west and build railways to open up lands now held by Western speculators. A few days ago the New Glasgow Agricultural Society purchased two pure-bred Guernsey bulls and had them shipped here from Waterville, Kings county. They were young animals, both under two years, yet the freight on these pair was \$54. The distance they were carried was about 130 miles. Does this not seem like exorbitant freight rate?

The historic French city of Versailles now occupies the centre of the world's stage. It was at Versailles that the French peace delegates lined up after the Franco-Prussian war in 1871, and were forced to accept the harsh terms imposed on them by Bismarck. There was no question raised then as to the ability of France to pay the amount named by the Germans. It was simply a case of "sign here." There is no reason why the Germans today should receive more generous treatment than they meted out to their vanquished foe forty-eight years ago.

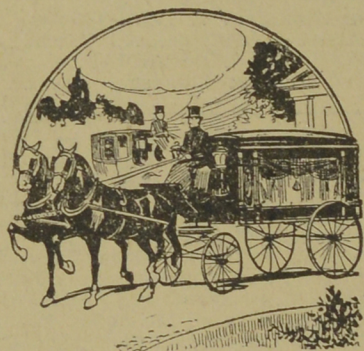

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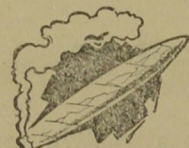
