

APPLE DESSERTS.

Apple Pie, Baked Apples and Apple
Sauce the Sum Total of Some
Housekeepers' Use
of Apples.

And of course the members of the
family do not care to have them too
often in the same way. Here are a
few suggestions:

Bake Apple Cakes.

If you wish to serve eight people,
cut the tops from eight apples and
make cups of them. Bow out the ap-
ple from the core section you have re-
moved and chop it, adding a half cup
of chopped nuts, twelve maraschino
cherries cut into small pieces.

Sweeten the mixture slightly and
put back into the apples. Place in a
baking dish with a little water and
bake until tender. Just before serv-
ing add the cherry juice.

With Cake.

Make a plain cake and use this fill-
ing and serve very fresh. Mix two
cups of sugar and a half cup of water
and add to a pound of apples that have
been peeled, cored and quartered.

The apples should be weighed be-
fore they are peeled. Add the grated
rind of one lemon and cook all in a
double boiler until thick. Add the
juice of the lemon and cook for ten
minutes more, stirring constantly.

This also makes a very nice tart
filling.

Apple Delight.

Put a thick layer of apple sauce in
the bottom of a buttered pudding dish
and then a thin layer of canned
peaches that have been chopped. Now
add another layer of the apple sauce
and another of peaches. Pour the
juice of the peaches over, sprinkle
with chopped nuts and bake slowly
for a half hour or more.

ABOUT CURTAINS.

Try having them done without any
starch. They will hang in straight,
natural folds and soft lines. If your
windows are short don't drape your
curtains back, but let them fall
straight over the windows to the low-
er sill.

Curtains at French windows and
doors should not be allowed to hang
loose, but should be run on rods at
the top and bottom of the glass, just
as glass door curtains are arranged.

BOX TO HOLD RIBBON.

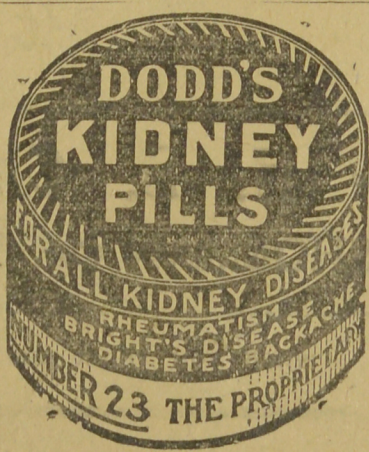
A ribbon box is so useful for so
many purposes—and especially when
one is in a great hurry—that every
scrap of ribbon that comes into the
home should be saved for it. Every
bit of ribbon that comes around Christ-
mas boxes or other parcels and around
candy boxes, is worth saving for such
uses as the odd between-season gift,
such as a birthday or wedding present,
for tying around flowers for the hos-
pital or graduation bouquet, or for
freshening the lingerie for the unex-
pected week-end visit.

Every ribbon that has seen consid-
erable service on clothing, millinery
or fancy work is worth any cleaning
and pressing that it may need, for
scraps of it will come in handy for
for more fancy work, as for instance,
the dainty ribbon flowers or fruit
clusters that are being worn in so
many ways now.

Pure white soap and lukewarm wa-
ter will cleanse light ribbon. Blue and
lavender are the colors that are most
likely to fade.

TO ADVERTISE
THE PROVINCE

A Plan to Make New Brun-
swick and Its Opportu-
nities Better Known
Outside.

The New Brunswick Tourist Associ-
ation is asking for the co-operation of
all sections of the Province, in a plan
to make the Province better known,
by a general Forward Co-Operative
Movement this year; in which special
emphasis would be laid upon the op-
portunities for Tourists, Sportsmen
and Hunters, as well as on the busi-
ness opportunities contained in its
Forests, Mines and Farms.

It is proposed early in May to hold
a convention at a point to be decided
upon, where the time would be devoted
to the inspection of local attrac-
tions, to displaying moving pictures of
Forest, and Hunting scenes, as well
as of farming, Lumbering, and Mining;
to talks by outstanding men, and to a
banquet at which there would also be
stimulating addresses. The plan has
the approval of the Provincial Author-
ities, who have promised to assist
with screens covering the above re-
sources.

The various boards of trade, Tourist
Associations, and kindred organizat-
ions throughout the Province, are be-
ing asked to co-operate in the move-
ment, the intention being to hold
these meetings yearly at different
points.

called Advice to the Married."

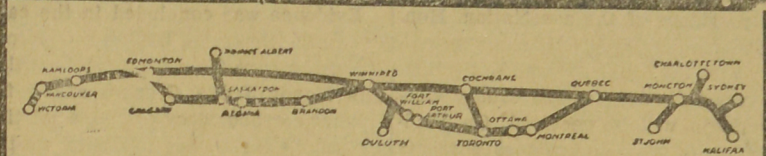

DOMINION INCOME WAR TAX ACT

TO WHOM APPLICABLE.

Every person who in 1918 resided or ordinarily resided in Canada or
was employed in Canada or carried on business in Canada, including
corporations and joint stock companies

WHO SHOULD FILE RETURNS.

1. Every unmarried person or widow or widower, without dependent
children under twenty-one years of age, who during calendar year
1918 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during calendar year 1918 received or earned
\$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded
\$3,000, during the fiscal year ended in 1918.

FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED.

- FORM T1. By individuals, other than farmers and ranchers.
- FORM T1A. By farmers and ranchers.
- FORM T2. By corporations and joint stock companies.
- FORM T3. By trustees, executors, administrators of estates and assignees.
- FORM T4. By employers to make return of the names of all directors,
officials, agents or other employees to whom was paid \$1,000
or more in salaries, bonuses, commission or other remunera-
tion during the calendar year 1918.
- FORM T5. By corporations, joint stock companies, associations and
syndicates to make return of all dividends and bonuses paid
to shareholders and members during 1918.
Individuals comprising partnerships must file returns in their
individual capacity.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

All returns must be filed IN DUPLICATE.

Forms may be obtained from the Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors
of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.
Returns should be filed immediately.

Postage must be prepaid on letters and other documents forwarded
by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.
